

# Norwalk still masters Sailors for first win

NORWALK — The return of Eric Lendrum signaled the end of the Norwalk drought.

The Truckers, who were blanked in their first two games of the season, continued their mastery over Vermilion Friday, 17-6 at Whitney Field.

Norwalk (1-2) now has an 8-2-1 record against Vermilion (1-2), including four straight victories.

After going scoreless for the first nine quarters of the season, Norwalk got its first points of the season on a 37-yard field goal by senior guard Eric Lendrum.

"His return to the lineup after missing the first two games with an injury was important since he's a leader," noted Norwalk coach Bob Hart.

The field goal, which came with just 49 seconds left in the half, was also the longest in school history, eclipsing the previous mark of 29 yards set by Jim Arlin last year.

Norwalk got its first touchdown of the season with 2:11 left in the third stanza as quarterback Charlie Rice completed a 29-yard scoring toss to Bill Seitz. Lendrum added the PAT for a 10-0 lead.

Seitz was another senior veteran making his first appearance in the lineup.

Both teams scored in the fourth quarter with Vermilion junior Jeff Mey, who had 91 yards in 22 carries, going in from one yard away with 11:30 left in the game.

Norwalk's Brad Thornton iced the win with a one-yard plunge with just 57 seconds left in the contest and Lendrum was again successful on the point after attempt.

"At times, our offense was still erratic, but the passing was much improved," added Hart.

Rice completed five of 10 for 56 yards, four of which were caught by Seitz, the Norwalk slot back.

"In the first two games, we weren't able to supplement our running attack with a successful passing game. Therefore, teams were using an eight man line against us and were able to stop the running game. That all changed with the pinpoint passing of Rice."

Defensively, the Truckers were paced by the play of senior tackle Steve Tubbs and junior Scott Spencer. Both had interceptions.

"It's somewhat unusual to see a lineman get an interception, but we had a special stunt on at the time and Tubbs was in the right place."

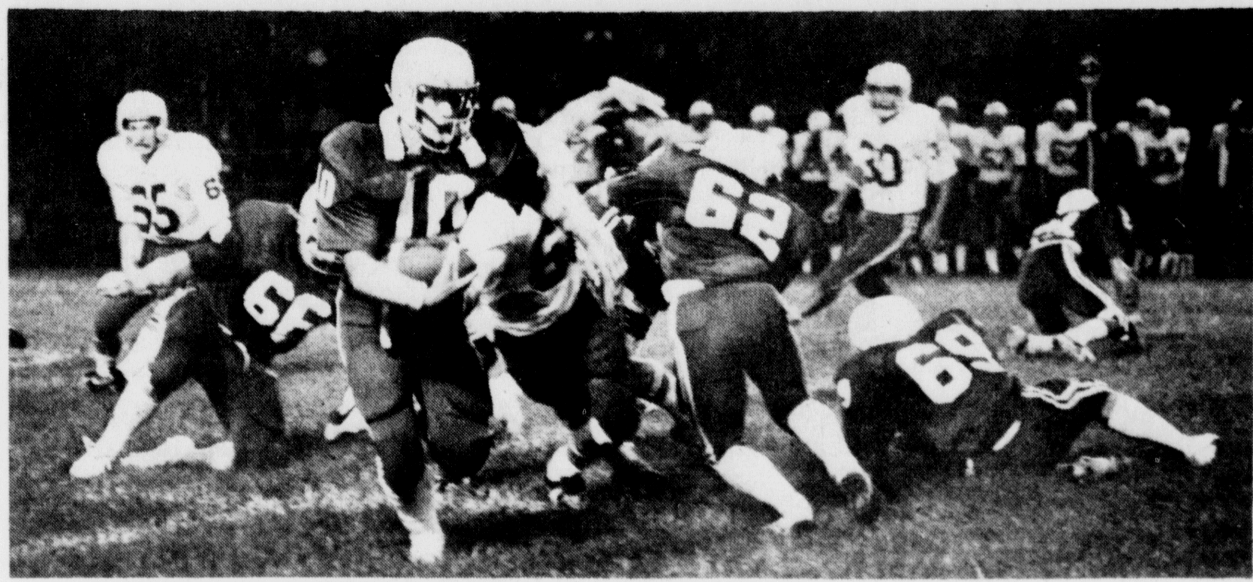
"This win was very important because now we can breathe a sigh of relief. Because we could not score, there was tremendous pressure on us, but it means we can now begin league play on an even keel with everyone."

Norwalk opens Northern Ohio League play Friday, visiting Bellevue, who remained winless following a 14-6 loss to Perkins.

# Polar Bears liberated in Oak Harbor contest

CASTALIA — Give me liberty or give me death.

Pardon Patrick Henry's classic line, but Margareta's football team seemed doomed for the inevitable Friday night after frittering away a 10-point, third-quarter lead.

But, in the end, the Polar Bears regrouped to stay alive.

Coach Dana Woodring's team scored two touchdowns during the last five minutes to dump Oak Harbor, 31-20, in non-league action.

"It was justice," Woodring insisted. "I thought we outplayed them ... except for the dropped punt snap, the (alleged) fake punt and fumble of the second-half kickoff return."

Offensive-minded Margareta, leading 17-7 at halftime on the strength of 203 yards rushing, stormed out of the lockerroom for the third quarter like a team of Barney Fifes.

A confident, overpowering team suddenly was shaky and error prone. The result was confusion from the offense and the punting team.

The visiting Rockets cashed in to grab a 20-17 lead. Margareta's defense toughened up, giving the Woodring Wishbone the pigskin back with 6:18 left in the game.

Two plays later, the Polar Bears were faced with a third-and-three on their own 32-yard line.

"I called (the coaches) upstairs and told them we were going for the game right here," Woodring said. Halfback Don Pfeil took a pitchout and heaved a pass that came closer to being an interception instead of a completion.

Fourth-and-three. Time remaining, 4:51. Woodring calls time.

"We felt our best chance was running the veer for the quarterback."

It worked, keeping alive the winning touchdown drive. Kent Zabel, sick with the flu but playing the entire game, cut outside right tackle for 10 yards and a first down.

Zabel followed with his only complete pass of the game, an 8-yard sideline strike to Craig Wobser to

## Firelands Rovers up record to 2-0

ELYRIA, Ohio — The Firelands Rovers' Division D team (12 years and under) won their second straight game in the Greater Cleveland Soccer League Friday, blanking Elyria, 9-0.

The Rovers, 2-0, play host to Medina Sunday at Osborn Park.

Ashley Pimsner and Gerald Coifard had three goals each for the Rovers while Bill Herzog added two goals and David Darr had one.

In between, Stallkamp capped a 36-yard, seven-play drive following a fumble recovery with a three-yard burst.

Monroeville enjoyed a 21-0 halftime lead and added its final tally with 3:42 remaining in the third quarter as Stallkamp clicked on a five-yard toss to Ted Caldwell.

"I'm pleased with the offense except for the fact we couldn't push the ball in the first time we had possession," second-year coach Steve Ringholz stated. The Eagles were stopped on the one-foot line.

"The coaches upstairs felt they (Marion Catholic) were going to fake a punt and the punter lost the ball apparently try to pass. We had a special return on this week and both of their ends were cut down and he (the punter) had nobody to throw to," Ringholz noted.

Monroeville is still unbeaten with Ringholz at the helm and the Eagles' string of games without a loss has reached 14. They were 9-0-1 in Ringholz's first season a year ago and also won the Firelands title.

"Mickey Hofacker had three sensational catches and Gene (Stallkamp) put the ball right in the arms of the receivers tonight and Roger Anderson had a big first half with 94 yards rushing," Ringholz continued.

Stallkamp ws 10 of 18 for 159 yards in the air and Anderson finished with 163 yards in 18 rushes. Hofacker nabbed five receptions for 81 yards and one score.

"I thought our defense looked good again and we shut them off," Ringholz stated.

Marion Catholic, which hadn't allowed a touchdown in winning its first two games, scored with 8:03 to go in the game on a fourth-down one-yard pass from Pete Schuler to Jim Boltz. It was the lone completion of the night for the losers.

"We going into the frying pan next week," Ringholz stated in reference to the opening conference clash with rival New London.

The same two teams locked horns in the Firelands finale in 1978 and Monroeville pulled out a dramatic 14-13 triumph in the final minutes to sew up its first undisputed FC crown in history.
