Calvert defense shuts out Tigers

TIFFIN — For the third straight year, Huron's offense was shutout by Tiffin Calvert

The Senecas held the Tigers to 76 total yards and just 15 by rushing in the second half to win an important Sandusky Bay Conference clash, 13-

Calvert's win puts it at 4-0 atop the SBC and 5-1-1 overall.

The winners took the opening kickoff and marched 67 yards in nine plays, capped by John Kuhn's 2-yard run. The kick failed but Calvert led 6-0 just six minutes into the game

Kuhn rushed for 108 yards in 25 carries to be the game's leading ball carrier. Huron's top runner was Jim Legando with 32 yards in nine tries.

The turning point of the game came on the fourth play of the second quarter during Huron's second possession of the night. The Tigers, thanks to a pair of facemask penalties, had moved the ball down to the Senecas' 4-yard line.

But on the next play, quarterback Scott Hoffman was hit as he was handing the ball off to halfback Jim Legando. Hoffman fumbled on the second-and-goal play and Calvert recovered.

Calvert led 6-0 at halftime, but Huron threatened again late in the third quarter.

The Tigers moved the ball from their own 47-yard line to the Calvert 25-yard line and Hoffman passes to Legando and Marc Munafo.



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No trade-in needed.

However, on a fourth-and-six play, Larry Ritzler intercepted a Hoffman pass to thwart Huron.

Those were the only two times the Tigers, now 4-3 overall and 1-2 in the SBC, came close to scoring.

Calvert blitzed defensively all night to confuse Huron's offensive

"In order to score, you have to block," Huron coach Tony Munafo said. "We didn't block tonight."

Munafo said Calvert controlled the line of scrimmage, which was the key to the game.

Scott Pfahl, Rob Delamatre and Tim Esposito all were sidelined with injuries, hampering Huron's defense, but Munafo had nothing but praise in that category.

'I really don't faults with our defense," Munafo said. "Our offense just wasn't blocking.

We have a lot of guys out of the lineup,'' he said. "The replacements did a good job."

Lee Hammond, both ways at offensive end and linebacker, got special mention from Munafo. It was Hammond's first start, both STATISTICS

Wilson added 50 yards in six tries. Wilson and Mark Everett were top defensive stars for the JVs, while Jeff Piurko was lauded for top

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

"We lost three fumbles and never had field position in the first half and we just didn't execute the way

we've done in the past," he added. "We had a costly penalty on a punt that helped them get good field position and they made it count in scoring and they also gave us some new looks that we had trouble with," Woodring continued.

"St. Mary's came to play football tonight and Margaretta didn't," he concluded after a lengthy 'talk' with

The loss dropped the Bears to 3-1 in the SBC and 5-2 overall with Tiffin Calvert coming up next Friday night at Margaretta.

MILAN - Monroeville must have felt shell-shocked after Saturday's game with Edison.

The Chargers remained on top of the Firelands Conference standings after downing the defending king,

Coach Jim Whittington's squad is now 4-0 in the FC, 6-1 overall while Monroeville drops back to 1-3 in the conference and 4-3 overall.

The Edison trio of Corky Field, Keith LaVine and Jeff Lake did more than their share in the destruction of the Eagles. · Field scored three touchdowns

on runs of one, seven and eight yards. He finished with 80 yards in 16 carries and also caught six passes for an additional 50 yards.

• LaVine reached paydirt once on a three-yard-run and led the Edison ground game with 101 yards in 13

· Lake completed eight of 14 passes, good for 73 yards and also carried the pigskin himself eight times for another 82 yards.

The Chargers found themselves trailing by a 7-0 score before many of the fans on hand could even get

Monroeville scored on its first possession of the contest.

Bob Adelman lost a yard on the Eagles' first play from scrimmage, but Roger Anderson made that up with plenty to spare as he broke through a gapping hole on the right side of the offensive line and was never touched as he sprinted 68 yards for the first score of the game.

Mickey Hofacker converted the point after and Monroeville claimed a 7-0 lead with 9:07 showing on the

It took Edison just 70 seconds to get on the board itself as the hosts drove 83 yards in five plays, capped off by the first of Field's three scores from one yard out.

LaVine picked up five and 37 on the first two plays of the drive and a 15-yard personal foul penalty aided the cause. After a three-yard run by sophomore Mike Moyer, Lake rambled for 22 moving the ball to the Monroeville one.

The Chargers went for two points on the conversion and it failed as Monroeville hung on to a 7-6 lead.

Edison assumed the lead for good early in the second period. A 27-yard punt return by senior Jim Unger gave the Chargers excellent field

position at the Monroeville 23. It took just four plays to reach paydirt with Lake climaxing the drive with a 14-yard run around left end. Two Monroeville defenders knocked themselves out of the play and Lake dove for the end zone.

Again, the Chargers were unsuccessful on the try for a two-point conversion, but did hold a 12-7 lead at intermission.

The Chargers scored on their first two possessions of the second half. On both drives, they stuck primarily to the ground as LaVine and Field gained chunks of yardage every time they carried the ball.

LaVine scored first on a threeyard run with 7:45 left in the third period and Field followed with a seven-yard gallop around left end at the 1:45 mark. Jim Hillman converted after both scores as the Chargers took a 26-7 lead to the final

With 5:28 left in the game, Field scored for the third time on an eightyard-run and Hillman converted for the final 33-7 count.
