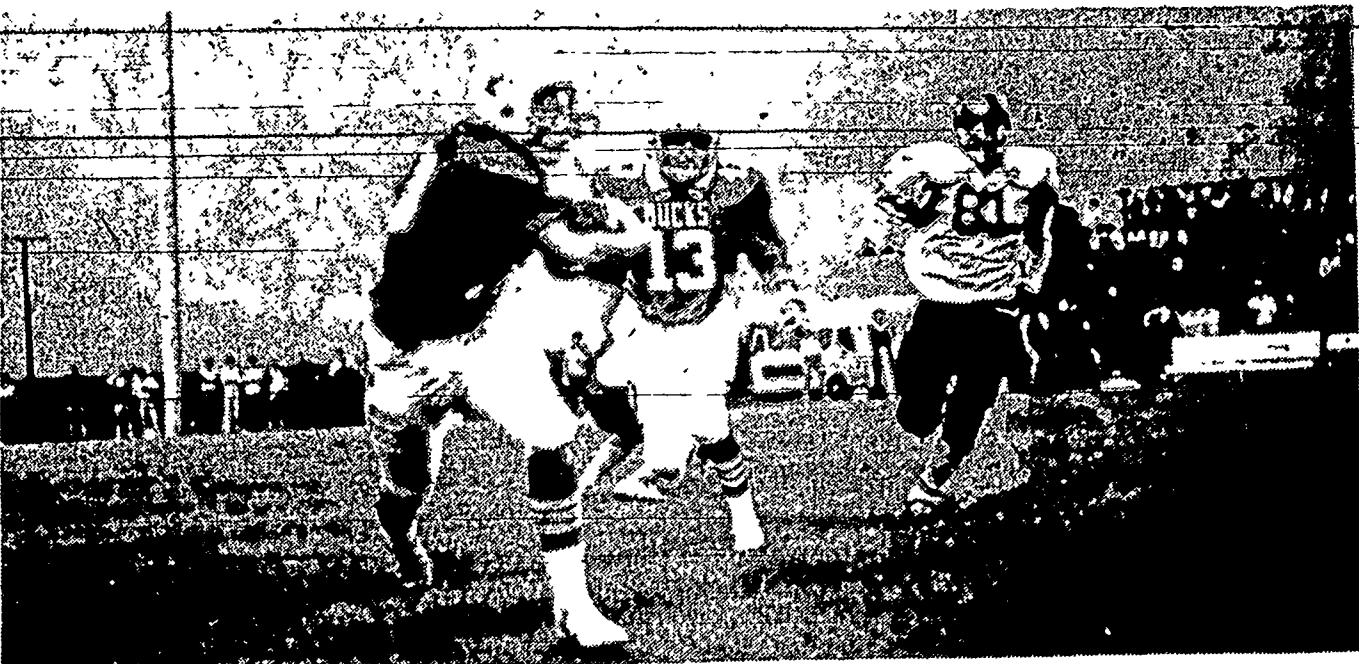

BC romps over Big Red

Vikes crush Browns

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. (UPI) — Minnesota played to its strength and Cleveland let it, revealing a secondary in need of tuning before the NFL season begins in earnest. The Vikings, rebounding from an 0-4 preseason in 1979, bombed the Browns with a relentless passing attack Saturday night to take a 38-16 victory and wind up with a 3-1 exhibition mark. Cleveland, finishing 1-3, showed life in the first half behind Brian Sipe's passing but folded after intermission allowing backups Mike Livingston and Steve Dils to pass for touchdowns after already being burned twice by starter Tommy Kramer. "We're going to mark the film of this game 'dead on arrival and not even look at it,'" Browns Coach Sam Rutigliano said after his squad yielded 297 net yards by air. "We'll worry about New England (which Cleveland plays Sunday) now. "You like to win preseason games, and particularly your last one because it can give you some good momentum, but they don't mean a damn thing anymore." Kramer initiated the aerial blitz by hitting Ahmad Rashad with a 16-yard TD pass on his fifth straight completion in the opening Viking series. Before heading for the bench he lobbed a 9-yarder to tight end Joe Senser to give Minnesota an early two touchdown lead. "I think this team is 200 percent better than it was last year," said Kramer, entering his second season as a starter. "My protection was outstanding, and the receivers were doing great jobs in getting clear. All I had to do was get the ball to them."

Navratilova upset

NEW YORK (UPI) — Martina Navratilova, due to gain American citizenship in October, just can't seem to get anywhere in the tennis tournament she feels will gain her true acceptance from her adopted compatriots. Navratilova, who has never reached the final of the U.S. Open despite the fact that she has dominated the women's rankings for much of the past three years, Monday was upset once again at Flushing Meadows — this time by a youngster from her native land who supposedly idolizes her. "If she idolizes me so much, she shouldn't beat me," Navratilova said jokingly of Hana Mandlikova, the 18-year-old Czech who upended Navratilova 7-6, 6-3 to move into the quarterfinals. "She should show some respect." Two years ago she was stunned by 16-year-old Pam Shriver in the semifinals, and last year teen-ager Tracy Austin did the damage. But Navratilova, surprisingly at ease after her loss doesn't think the situation is hopeless. "I felt like I played better than I have recently and I think I still have a chance at being No. 1 by the end of the year."

Browns get guard

CLEVELAND (UPI) — Joe DeLamielleure, the Buffalo Bills' All-Pro guard, is coming to the Cleveland Browns for undisclosed future draft choices, and backup quarterback Mark Miller will be going to the Green Bay Packers. Both deals were announced Monday. Miller went to the Packers for a conditional draft choice. Miller, a former Bowling Green State University star in his third season with the Browns, lost out in a three-way race to play understudy to starter Brian Sipe. The Browns retained third-year quarterback-punter Johnny Evans and rookie passer Paul McDonald of Southern California. Bills' spokesman Budd Thalman said DeLamielleure was notified of the trade moments before he was to take the field for his first practice session after reporting to the team Monday. Thalman would not disclose the number of draft choices Buffalo acquired from the Browns or what year the choices would be made. DeLamielleure, an eight-year veteran from Michigan State, had been asked to be traded in April after he made it clear he was unhappy with his situation in Buffalo.

Lopez-Melton wins

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UPI) — It always takes something extra to be a winner. For Nancy Lopez Melton, that something extra was a 10-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole Monday — a shot she needed to crack a neck-and-neck home stretch tie with veteran Jo Anne Carner and take the \$125,000 LPGA Rail Charity Golf Classic for the \$18,750 top prize. Lopez, 23, of Cincinnati, ended the 72-hole tourney with a solid 13-under-par 275, just one stroke ahead of the veteran Carner, 41, who began the final round with a two-stroke lead over Lopez, finished with a 12-under-par 276, 1-under-par for the day. Carner, who takes home \$12,250 in second-prize money, watched her two-stroke lead melt on the back nine with a bogey on the 12th hole. She missed a 4-foot putt on the 17th hole. On the 18th hole, she hit a chip shot against her own divot, then made a 14-foot pressure putt for a par that dashed any hope for a win

Buckeye Central lit up the scoreboard in the first quarter with 4:34 left in the opening stanza on a six play, 44 yard drive. The Bucks fielded a Plymouth punt on the Big Red 44 yard line and ripped off a first down before Scott Moore hooked up on a 18 yard pass with Dan Wurm for the first six points of the season. Karl Mahaffey then booted the extra-point kick for a 7-0 lead. Buckeye Central threatened in the second quarter but the Bucks failed to convert on a fourth down and 12 play where Plymouth took over on their own 28 yard line but handed the ball back over two plays later. Plymouth was sitting on their own 29 yard line and Buckeye Central's Randy Kaple chased down Plymouth quarterback Steve Tackett and then took the ball right from his grasp before being tackled at the Plymouth 16 yard line with 5:53 left in the half. On the first play of the drive Scott Moore found Wurm at the five yard line with another connection and Wurm pranced into the endzone at the 5:47 mark. Mahaffey then added his final boot of the night before leaving the game due to an ankle injury. Buckeye added three touchdowns in the last half with three different players scoring. Shelby Settlement product Dale Niese added a 30 yard score but missed the extra-point kick. Doug Shell made the score 26-0 on a 55 yard run. The Bucks last score of the game came on a one-yard run by Dan Shell and Niese added the extra point kick for a 33-0 cushion. "It's hard to be satisfied because we can't afford to give up 145 yards in penalties and

win ball games," said Coach Bill Pierce. "I was pleased with how the younger kids stepped in and helped out," remarked Pierce. "Plymouth came out in the first half and dictated how we would do things but we came out in the second half and dictated what they would do when they could have gotten back into the game if they could have dictated things in the second half, but they didn't," said Pierce. Offensively, the Bucks chewed up 335 yards of total offense while Plymouth managed a total of 135 yards. Buckeye Central ran off 38 running plays and collected 223 yards with Dale Niese being the leading rusher with 78 yards on 11 carries and one touchdown. "Doug Shell added the winning cause with 61 yards on six carries while also scoring one touchdown. The Bucks completed seven of 16 passes for 112 yards with Dan Wurm snaring five passes for 81 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Plymouth rattled off 40 running plays and collected 121 yards while the air attack for the Big Red was two of nine for 14 yards. Buckeye Central will travel to Marion on Friday and open their North Central Conference schedule against River Valley while Plymouth will travel to South Central in an independent contest.

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Liberty Center falls, 37-0

Blues gain first win

The offensive problems that plagued the Shelby Blues through the first three games this season appeared to be solved Saturday night as they handed the Liberty Center Bengals another loss 37-0.

One of the changes the Blues made after being held to three points by the Canton Bulldogs two weeks ago placing Todd Albert in the offensive backfield, paid off this weekend as he scrambled with the ball 14 times for 92 yards.

The last time the Blues played before their hometown followers the running backs lost more yardage than they gained. Against the Bengals the offense ran for 233 yards on 42 carries. Blues head coach Jim DeVito agreed Albert sparked the offense but Steve Dorsey and Ray Webb charged through the Bengal defense as well.

Shelby quarterbacks Bill Bower and Brent Weikle handed the ball to Webb just four times, but he gained 72 yards.

Bower led the most productive aerial attack the Blues have mounted this season, passing for 196 yards.

Bower completed 10 of his 22 passes for 149 yards. Weikle took over signal calling late in the game and passed for the remaining 47 yards, connecting with two of his 13 passes.

The Blues' offensive performance complimented play by the defense. The Blues' defense, who have been tough all season forced Liberty Center into fumbling the ball six times, including their first two offensive plays. The Blues recovered four times including the first two which they returned to for touchdowns.

The first two Bengal fumbles occurred less than two minutes into the game. With 13:18 left in the first quarter Shelby held a 14-0 lead.

The first touchdown came on runs by Dorsey, who scored the touchdown and Albert. The four plays covered 31 yards.

Greg Ammons kicked the extra point.

Bower passed to Mark Abbott to set up the next touchdown. Dorsey again crossed the line and Ammons kicked the extra point the second of four.

Liberty Center held off the Blues until third quarter when Albert rated 30 yards for a touchdown.

The Blues defense played a part in another third quarter touchdown. They sacked Bengal quarterback Brent Fruchey on the third yard line, one of five times the Blues downed him for a loss. Webb returned the following punt to the 11 yard line.

In a less than awesome display of offensive skill, the Blues took six plays to score. Bower passed to Abbott for eight yards and ten yards on the last two plays to reach the end zone. Tom Moore missed the extra point but Shelby led 27-0.

Shelby scored twice more. Early in the fourth quarter Ammons kicked a 27 yard field goal.

With 28 seconds left in the game Weikle ran six yards for a touchdown after setting the play up with a 38 yard pass to Rick Shelton. Ammons kick made the final score 37-0.

Rod Hopton led the Shelby defenders with seven tackles.

The victory improved the Blues record to 1-3 while dropping Liberty Center to 0-4.

Next week Shelby gets to find out if the offense is real when they play Tuscarawas. The game begins at 3 p.m. on Sunday at Skiles Field.

In other Ohio Football League action Saturday, Canton downed Toledo 28-13. Tuscarawas swamped Fostoria 33-12, and Springfield beat Sidney 20-10.
