Whippets dispose of Ashland, 24-0

ASHLAND — Running and shooting — the Ashland Arrows did plenty of both Friday. Unfortunately for the Parents Night crowd, it didn't get them anywhere.

Shelby made Ashland its third victim of the 1980 football season with a 24-0 victory that was sometimes methodical, sometimes opportunistic.

On the methodical side, the Whippets opened the game by marching 73 yards in 13 plays to their first touchdown. The defense, entering the game allowing only about two yards per carry, did even better by holding the Arrows to 22 yards in 23 rushing plays.

The opportunism manifested itself in two recovered fumbles being turned into TDs in a total of seven plays.

The win gives Shelby a 3-0 record entering Northern Ohio League play next week. The Whippets have racked up 91 points, have scored in every quarter and have limited opponents to a solitary touchdown.

Ashland fell to 1-2 with the loss. The Arrows' run and shoot offense, which was supposed to throw a more varied attack at the Whippets, worked only occasionally and not enough to prevent Shelby's second shutout of the year.

"I thought Ashland moved the ball fairly well," said Shelby coach Bill Varble. "The turning point had to be the field goal at the end of the first half. It put pressure on them to come up with two scores to go ahead."

The field goal came with 51 seconds to play before incompletion when Scott Garverick sent one through the uprights.



highlighting an otherwise lack lustre second period for both teams.

"It did give our guys a lift," added offensive assistant coach Roger Ebersole. "It gave our guys a little more confidence by proving we can score more than just on the ground."

"That whole second quarter could have been a disaster," Ebersole mentioned. "The blocking definitely picked up in the second half."

Shelby got off to a 7-0 advantage when Brad Nothacker bulled his way over from the one-yard line. For the Shelby tailback, it was the first of two six-pointers on the evening and the third game he's reached the century mark in yards gained.

Following the initial score, both teams were unable to generate any punch, trading punts back and forth until Garverick's 39-yard kick fashioned a 10-0 Whippet lead.

The Arrows held to only two passing first downs in the first half, began to move the ball on the ground in the second half. Running backs Bill Seder and Mike Goschinski attempted to lift an option pass to flanker John Garrett. Don Strine stepped in front of the leather and intercepted the pass.

That was only the first of Ashland's disastrous turnovers, which snuffed out potentially fine second half drives. The

Arrows followed Strine's pick-off with three fumbles in their own territory.

The first fumble happened late in the third quarter when Ron Malone lost the handle to the ball at the Arrows' 34-yard line, where it was smothered by a host of Whippets. Four plays later, Nothacker got his second TD on a four-yard jaunt.

It took about two minutes for Ashland to give Shelby an encore. Larry Cross pounced on an Arrow fumble at the home team's 42 after Ashland had advanced 22 yards on four plays.

Quarterback Don Strine led the charge from there, running 18 yards and passing 22 to John Johnson who scampered down the sideline and into the end zone.

For Strine, it was his first touchdown pass of the year. The senior signal barker also had a fine night running the ball, churning up 94 yards on nine carries.

Ashland quarterback Bill Grindle put his arm to use following Shelby's last score, completing 5 of 7 passes, bringing his team from their own 32 to the Whippets' 25. Ashland, however, relinquished possession when Goschinski mishandled a Grindle forward lateral and Troy Lusk scooped up the ball for Shelby.

Grindle took to the air lanes 22 times, completing 10 for 111 yards. His Whippet counterpart, Strine, hit on four of nine throws for 47 yards.

Nothacker continued his march to a 1,000-yard season by running for 101 yards on 24 carries. The junior sensation now has 372 yards in his first three games.

Other Shelby leaders were end Scott Lysinger, with three pass receptions, and middle guard Tim Swanger, credited with 10 tackles.

Shelby will enter Northern Ohio League play at Willard with a clean 3-0 mark. Only Upper Sandusky has a comparable record.

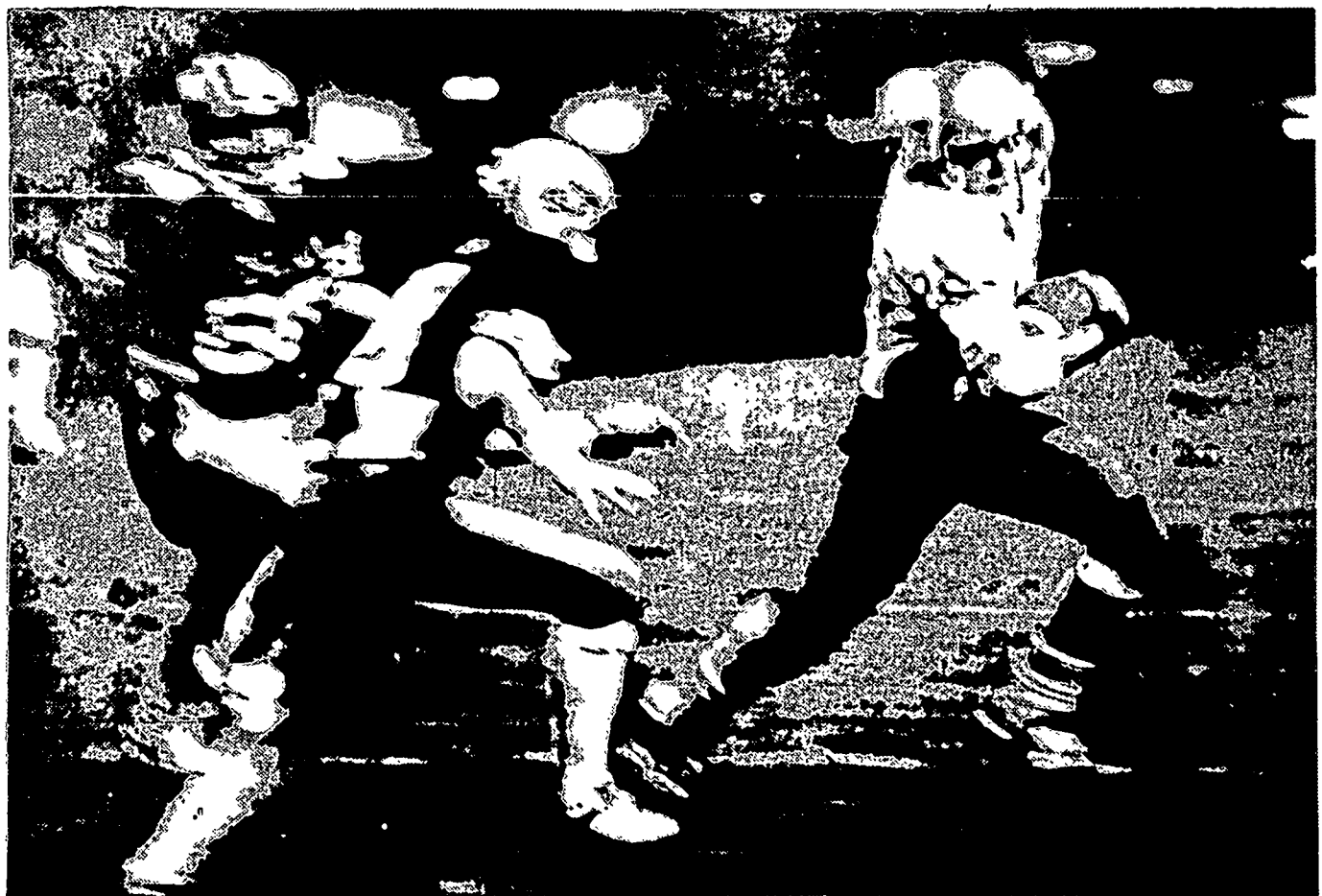

Hopewell-Loudon blanks Plymouth

PLYMOUTH — Hopewell-Loudon put on its offensive shoes for the first time this season and registered a 21-0 triumph over the Plymouth Big Red Friday.

Plymouth, now 0-3 on the year and still without a point to show for three games, fell behind in the first quarter when Hopewell's Chris Goshe got the Chieftains' first points of 1980 on a one-yard plunge.

The visitors made it 13-0 in the third period when linebacker Steve Arbogast deflected a pass from Big Red quarterback Steve Tackett at midfield.

Teammate D. J. Brickner snatched up the loose aerial and rumbled 50 yards for H.L.'s second tally.

Plymouth's hopes were dashed for good when Paul Bishop hit paydirt for the Chieftains from two-yards away. Wayne Stombaugh flipped a two-point conversion pass to Andy Clouse to complete the scoring.

The Big Red picked up 120 yards of total offense, 80 on the ground and 40 by air. Hopewell, previously scoreless, gained 191

yards, 160 of them rushing. Plymouth plays a Black Fork Valley Conference game Saturday, Sept. 20 at Lucas.
