Plymouth sophomore spent summer on the go

PLYMOUTH — Fayette Hudson had a summer she'll never forget — sore feet, aching legs and overworked lungs.

She is a runner — and a good one. More importantly, she's a dedicated one. A 15-year-old sophomore at Plymouth High School, she ran some 287 miles during her 1980 summer vacation, on her own.

"That averages out to about three miles a day," indicated Plymouth track coach Paul McClintock. "Of course, there were days this summer when she couldn't run at all, so she had to run six miles some other days to break even."

That figures also doesn't include the numerous organized runs she participated in over the vacation. She placed high in nearly all of them.

This fall, Fayette is a member of the Plymouth High School cross country team. Since Plymouth is too small to afford the luxury of both a boys and a girls team, Fayette ran with the boys and competed only against girls in open meets.

McClintock indicated that Fayette is not the best female runner he's ever seen, or

even the best for her age. She is, however, the hardest working runner he's ever been associated with.

"There are two or three girls I can think of right off who have more raw ability than Fayette," the coach pointed out, "but they never came near the number of miles she ran during the summer."

While most teenage girls were dangling their feet in a swimming pool or wading in a cold stream, Fayette was pounding hers on the gravel-strewn roadsides between Plymouth and her home in Shiloh, or the hilly cross country course at Mary Fate Park.

"She's a self-motivator," commented her mother, Margaret Hudson. "A lot of our neighbors ask me 'why do you let her do that?' I tell them it's just something she wants to do."

"I guess a lot of people don't understand why someone wants to run all the time."

The spark was lit in the slender, blond-haired harrier in the eighth grade, and she hasn't slowed down since.

The torturous hours of roadwork have paid off. Fayette placed second in the Firecracker 10,000-meter Run at Ontario

and fourth in the prestigious "Tiffin Merchants' Run" in the 13-15 age group.

During the regular cross country season, she took first in open runs at Tiffin and Crestview, placed third out of 91 runners at Tiffin and 16th out of about 100 harriers at the Old Fort Invitational.

When asked about her future goals in running, the shy sophomore, who averages about a 17½-minute time over the two and one-half mile cross country course, revealed no concrete targets she's shooting for, although she and her coach both cited continued improvement as a hope for the next two years.

"I sure hope she hasn't peaked," joked the coach.

When asked if she plans to run in college, Fayette wasted no time in nodding her head in a definite "yes."

"I offered any girl who could run over 200 miles this summer a free T-shirt," McClintock said, adding that one other girl reached the plateau.

"It wasn't much of an incentive but it was the best I could do."

Fayette Hudson received her T-shirt with miles to spare.

NL champs up 2-0 Phils eye 4-game sweep

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — Garry Maddox guarantees if something manages to detour Philadelphia in the World Series, it won't be overconfidence.

"If there's one thing we learned in the pennant race, it was that you can't be overconfident," the center fielder said Thursday, while preparing for Game 3 tonight against the Kansas City Royals with the Phillies holding a 2-0 lead.

"As soon as it looks like you have it won, the other team can come right back at you," continued Maddox. "I don't think we'll feel confident until this thing is over."

He says it so nonchalantly, you would scarcely suspect that if Dick Ruthven, 17-10, can outpitch Rich Gale, 13-9, the Phillies would stand within one victory of winning their first World Series.

Even if George Brett can rebound from Thursday's minor surgery for his hemorrhoid condition, the Royals must wake up or risk becoming the first team since the 1976 New York Yankees to be swept in four straight games.

Phillies' Manager Dallas Green nevertheless remains cautious.

"Kansas City is more than capable of winning two in a row, too," Green said.

Royals' Manager Jim Frey would love to see that.

"I can't say that we've been flat," he said. "We've scored but we haven't been able to control their offense."

Frey, due to a morning rain, gave his team the day off. Meanwhile, outfielder Clint Hurdle admitted the Royals might already have played their own World Series — against the Yankees.

"We all want to win, no question about it," Hurdle said. "But you have to remember that with the Yankees it was a do-or-die situation and when we got to the World Series it didn't have as much intensity as with the Yanks."

Maddox says the pattern of the respective playoffs may provide the reason for Philadelphia's edge.

"After we won the pennant," Maddox said, "we had such a tremendous feeling of relief. (But) before we had a chance to even think about it, we had to go right out there and play again."

On the other hand, the Royals, after beating the Yankees, had to wait two days to even learn who they would face in the Series.

"I don't know if that's a factor," said Maddox. "But I know you need to play to stay sharp. We haven't had a chance to relax."

The ones who could make a difference in today's game include Brett and left-fielder Willie Wilson. Brett will remain in the hospital time to leave for the game. Dr. John Hervey said he undoubtedly will play at less than 100 percent efficiency.

That makes it doubly important for Wilson to resume his role as team catalyst.

But, said Frey, "You can't expect anybody just to go out there and get base every time. It's unfair to point your finger and spotlight anyone."

Computer ratings Shelby drops to ninth

A win over weak Division III rival Bucyrus last week didn't do the Shelby Whippets any favors in this week's computer football rankings. The Whippets fell a notch to ninth in Division IV, Region Six.

Shelby pummeled the Redmen, 34-6, but gained only 10 points on the computer and now stand at 46.

"Galion, the Whippets' closest rival in the Northern Ohio League, dropped from sixth to eighth after defeating lowly Bellevue last week.

Buckeye Central, following a heart-breaking loss to Mohawk Friday, plummeted from ninth in Division V, Region 18 to 14th. The Bucks have 17 points.

Shelby's region is lead by Perryburg, with 63 points. Buckeye Central's region is paced by Tiffin Calvert, who moved a 2 625 points ahead of Liberty Center, last week's leader.

The remainder of Division II, Region Six has Columbus Bishop Watterson second at 62, Sylvania Northview third with 59.77; Vermillion fourth with 59.42; Toledo St. Francis-DeSales holding the fifth spot with 55.25; Mansfield Malabar sixth at 48.17; Pataskala Watkins Memorial in seventh place with 47.5; and Wapakoneta 10th at 42.75.

After Calvert at LC in Region 18 comes Fremont St. Joseph (33.25); Bluffton (29.5); Ayresville (23.08); Cory-Rawson (23); Delphos Jefferson (22.83); Pandora-Gilboa (20.75); McComb (19.25); and Carey (19).

Division I leaders this week are Massillon Washington, Cincinnati Moeller, Stow (replacing Austintown Fitch) and Upper Arlington.

Other Division II leaders are Solon, Youngstown Cardinal Mooney and

Lebanon. All four Division II leaders were in first place last week.

In Division III, schools enjoying the lead in the computer ratings are Cleveland Benedictine, Fostoria, New Concord John Glenn and Hamilton Badin. Division III ratings for first place are unchanged from last week.

The top Division IV schools include North Central Conference member Mohawk, which reached the highest plateau by beating Buckeye Central. The Warriors replace another NCC squad, Bucyrus Wynford.

Other Division IV leaders are Burton Berkshire, Tiltonsville Buckeye South and West Jefferson. All three held first last week.

Other Division V leaders include Lorain Clearview, Beallsville (replacing Glouster Trimble) and Covington.

HS football Plymouth, Ontario seek first win of 1980

PLYMOUTH — Talk about a pair of hungry teams. The Philadelphia Phillies and the Kansas City Royals might not have anything on the Plymouth Big Red and the Ontario Warriors.

The World Series combatants may be playing for higher stakes, but the Red and the Warriors have been down for so long, one has to think both teams believe this is the week to put the "Big W" next to their name.

Neither team has won a game this year. Plymouth had some powerful teams two and three years ago, but since 1979, when Coach David Coulter took over the Red, they have only a solitary win over a team that went winless.

Ontario has been a traditional "also ran" in the Mid-Ohio Conference. The Warriors changed coaches this year, but so far the attempt to turn the program around has been considerably less than successful.

"One of us will be smiling after tonight," said Coulter.

The Plymouth mentor said his squad would make some "dramatic personnel changes" to make sure he's the one with the smile tonight.

"Ontario's strength is defense, and we haven't exactly been a scoring team."

The Big Red have only seven points through seven contests this season. The fellow who has all of those points, Bill Hudson, was lost for the campaign with a dislocated shoulder.

Coulter indicated he wants more effective running in his realigned offense. The Big Red coach said he hopes to be able to score with the big play on the Warriors' restrictive defense.

"We've had good running so far," Coulter indicated, "but we haven't been able to punch it in. We have to look for a place to go."

Coulter said he does not expect Plymouth to run straight at Ontario's line. The Big Red line averages only 150 pounds and lacks the muscle to push aside opponents.

All of Plymouth's changes have been masked in secrecy by the Red coaching staff.

"I didn't even give these guys a scouting report on Ontario," the coach said. "The only team we're concerned with now is Plymouth."

"Last week was the first time we really stunk up the field," Coulter said, referring to the devastating 38-0 loss to Seneca East. "We had played good football up until then."

"Every team that comes off a loss like that goes back to stressing fundamentals. That's what we've been doing this week."

Game time is 8 p.m. Friday at Mary Fate Park.

Bucks face critical Carey contest Saturday

NEW WASHINGTON — It's do-or-die for the Buckeye Central Bucks and the Carey Blue Devils Saturday night at Wynford. Both teams have two losses in the North Central Conference and another one would knock the defeated team out of the tight race.

Both BC and Carey are 5-2 in all games and 4-2 in the rugged NCC. They are tied for fourth place, behind Mohawk (5-0-1), Wynford and Colonel Crawford (5-1).

"Both teams are similar in style," indicated Buck coach Bill Pierce. "We both

pass about a third of the time and both teams have strong defenses."

Carey is coming off a 33-0 win over River Valley. The Devils' two setbacks have come courtesy of Mohawk (7-6) and Colonel Crawford (20-7).

Buckeye lost to Mohawk last week, 3-0. They've also fallen to Wynford this season, 14-0.

Pierce feels the Devils have the best quarterback in the conference in Craig Blair, a returning starter from last year's NCC co-champions. The BC coach also

praises Carey tailback Steve Miller, whom he considers a better runner than the Blue Devils highly touted Tim Spulock of last season.

The Bucks' biggest worry of 1980, injuries, isn't as big a problem this week as it was in earlier weeks. Linebacker-running back Steve Kehres should be back in action, along with lineman Clark Weekly. Another lineman, Eric VonStein, will probably be rested another week to "get him completely recovered" from an ankle injury.
