

Reed rushes for 186 in 34-6 victory

Whippet offense back in high-gear

BUCYRUS — Several years ago, famed Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin made a goodwill visit to the United States. Taken to a professional football game in San Diego, Gagarin was asked what he thought of the sport. In broken English, the first man in outer space replied "all fall down, all get up, all fall down again."

A stranger to the game of football might have had the same feelings about Friday's game between the Shelby Whippets and the Bucyrus Redmen. The two squads pounded away with their running games, getting off an almost equal number of plays.

The Whippets, however, were far more equal than the Redmen. Shelby's offense, extremely quiet for three straight games,

exploded for 346 yards Friday as the Whippets demolished Bucyrus, 34-6, to up their Northern Ohio League record to 3-1 and make the overall mark stand at 6-1.

Curtis Reed inflicted the heaviest damage on the Redmen. The sophomore tailback touched the ball 20 times, rushing for 186 yards and two touchdowns.

One of those touchdowns came on an 89-yard dash, the longest play from scrimmage so far this season for the Whippets. The 186 yards Reed racked up also represents the most ground gained by a Shelby griddier in 1980.

"Curtis is a real fine player and had a real good game tonight," said Shelby coach Bill Varble of his newly found star. "He had a fine running game, sure, but he also made a lot of good decisions and helped us a lot in a lot of ways."

Reed started out the campaign toting the ball for the reserves, but moved up to the varsity after injuries to front-liners Brad

Nothacker and Doug DeVito depleted Shelby's ranks.

"I'm real satisfied tonight," Varble commented. "We've overcome a lot of setbacks. It hurts when two-thirds of your backfield is missing."

"You can say we're deep and we're this or we're that, but we're still playing against teams with their first-string intact." Even with two substitutes at the running back positions, the Whippets gained 328 yards on the turf. Tim Sherman followed Reed in the running attack with 43 yards on seven carries.

Bucyrus ran 46 running plays to Shelby's 43, picking up 149 yards. Tailback Homer Naveja had a sterling night for the Redmen, churning up 107 yards on 21 carries and tallying Bucyrus' only touchdown of the evening.

Shelby got the first score of the night by way of the defense. Faced with a third down and long situation, Bucyrus quarterback Dereck McDonald tried to dump off a short pass to one of his backs when linebacker Scott Garverick stepped in front of Jerry Miller, grabbed the ball and rumbled 44 yards to the end zone.

Bucyrus' only strong drive came following the kickoff. The Redmen marched 51 yards in 17 plays before the Whippet defense finally stiffened at the Shelby 14-yard line. The charge died when a Chris Baldy field goal attempt went awry.

Shelby proceeded to trek 80 yards to make it 14-0 shortly before halftime. Scott Lysinger got the six as he took an 18-yard pass from quarterback Don Strine all alone in the end zone for his second TD pass reception of the year.

The Whippets went 71 yards in 16 plays at the start of the third quarter, eating up eight minutes, nine seconds before Bucyrus could get a hold of the ball. Reed carried on 11 of those plays, gaining 56 yards and picking up his first TD of the night on a two-yard plunge.

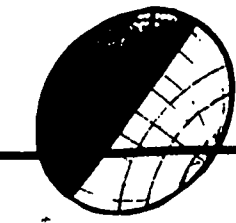
Getting the ball back via a fumbled Bucyrus punt attempt at the Redmen's 19, Shelby took four plays to get into the end zone. Sherman galloped 12 yards and Strine ran the final nine to make it 27-0.

Reed's 89-yard jaunt for Shelby's final TD came after Eric Gifford unloaded a 41 yard punt down to the 11-yard stripe.

The Redmen finally connected as Naveja took it in from 30 yards away.

Neither team did much passing. Shelby threw four times, completing only the Strine-to-Lysinger TD. Bucyrus heaved the pigskin twice, completing one for five yards.

Garverick, Julis Mahon and Tim Swanger led the tackling for Shelby with 11 each. Larry Cross and Mike Robinette each chipped in with nine.



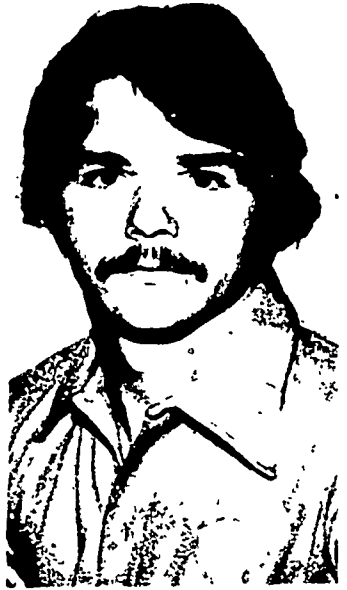

K C finally wins out

NEW YORK (UPI) — George Brett struck out for Middle America Friday night.

Kansas City finally survived the New York experience when their incomparable star clouted a towering three-run homer to the upper deck of right field off Yankee relief ace Rich Gossage in the seventh inning, lifting the Royals to a 4-2 triumph and a stunning three-game sweep of their American League playoff series.

"Our fans in Kansas City will think we've already won the World Series," said Brett. "For us to beat New York is the ultimate for the town ... but there was no real revenge from the past years. The Yanks are a great team, I respect them and hope they respect us. But for the city of Kansas City, it's a very special moment."

Brett beat the Yankees' best, but the All-Star third baseman actually prefers Gossage's fire to starter Tommy John's

hnesse.

"I'm glad I faced Gossage because John has great location on his pitches," said Brett.

Brett's sixth playoff homer set an American League Championship Series record and vaulted the Royals into the first World Series in their 12-year history. Kansas City had been beaten by the Yankees in three straight playoffs beginning in 1976.

"If I'm gonna get beat, you can't get beat by a better hitter," said Gossage. "I feel I'm the best and he's the best — he beat me this time."

The Yankees, who posted the major leagues' best record (103-59), finally discovered the playoff coin has two sides.

"I would've liked to play in a World Series, but it was still a good year," said New York's Bob Watson, who had three hits Friday night and was robbed of a fourth when Royals' second baseman Frank White — the

game's Most Valuable Player — made a leaping stab of his sixth-inning liner. "I wish the Royals luck. They represent the AL and all I can say is, go beat 'em."

Dan Quisenberry pitched the final 3 2-3 innings for the victory in relief of Paul Splittorff. The Yankees scored twice in the sixth to take a 2-1 lead before a rabid crowd of 56,588. Reggie Jackson lined an opposite-field double to left with one out and pinch-hitter Oscar Gamble then hit a bouncer to White's right.

Quisenberry's off-balance throw to third to get Jackson sailed over Brett's head and ended up in the dugout. Jackson scored on the play and Gamble advanced to third, where he scored on Rick Cerone's single.

White hit a solo home run in the fifth to give Kansas City a 1-0 lead and his 6-for-11 hitting keyed the Royal sweep.

"These have been the happiest three days of my life," said White. "This victory is going to feel good for the rest of my life."

Following Brett's home run, the Yankees loaded the bases with none out, off Quisenberry in the eighth. But Cerone lined into a double play and pinch-hitter Jim Spencer grounded out to end New York's final threat.

"It had to end sometime," said gracious New York Manager Dick Howser. "We had our chances to put them away, but we couldn't do it."

Kansas City rookie Manager Jim Frey, who admits he knows little about Philadelphia or Houston, isn't about to be swept away in the euphoria of the Royal flush.
