Davidson finds TD Avenue, Munaf0 wins 100th

Munaf0 explained the breakaway plays to three reasons — Trip Davidson, of course; Jim Legando, and Fremont's man-to-man defense.

"Legando is such a weapon," Munaf0 said. "The threat of him throwing opens up so many avenues for us."

Davidson found Touchdown Avenue on a bypass of Fremont's defense.

"When they give us a man-to-man defense," Munaf0 said, "it's the most disastrous thing they could do. Once we get through the line of scrimmage, it's all over. I thought for sure they would come out of it (man-to-man) after we broke the first one. And after the second one,

I thought they would get out of it. They didn't. They were very stubborn about it."

Although Huron allowed Darr 207 yards and Fremont's offense 333, Munaf0 said the game belonged to the Tigers' defense.

"Wouldn't you say this game belonged to our defense?", Munaf0 asked an assistant coach. A nod. "Yeah, it was their game. It sounds terrible that Darr had 201 (207) yards, but it really wasn't. The defense never really broke."

The Crimson Streaks broke onto the scoreboard first.

After consuming more than nine minutes of the clock with nine plays, Ken Mosser threw a fourth-down, five-yard touchdown pass to Jack Hoffman, who made a sticky, one-

handed catch. The key play in the drive was the first one when Darr went around right end for 30 yards to the Huron 35-yard line.

Davidson then tripped the scoreboard for Huron.

On a first-and-ten trap play from Fremont's 35, Davidson ran through a tackle at the line of scrimmage and then outran everyone for a 65-yard touchdown.

The score was 7-6 Huron at the half.

The Tigers must have gotten a helluva halftime pep talk.

On the first play from scrimmage, Davidson, on another trap, ran 75 yards for a touchdown.

The next Huron score came after a Fremont mistake. On a screen pass by Mosser, the ball was in-

tercepted by Terry Levine on the Fremont 20. After a run, Legando and Tapp finally connected for 19 yards putting the ball on the one. Davidson took it into the endzone on the next play.

Munaf0 said it was the fewest number of completions (3) Legando has thrown all year.

"The run-and-shoot wasn't shut down," Munaf0 said. "You have to keep in mind that there were a couple of balls dropped. And you also have to realize the way Jimmy throws. We try to teach Jim how to throw like Otto Graham. He throws a different kind of ball; he spikes it. It floats end up and when you are throwing into the teeth of the wind, the ball tends to sail."
