Monroeville blanks Danbury again

MONROEVILLE — Monroeville continued its hex on Danbury Friday night, 8-0.

The defensive-minded Eagles have defeated Danbury 10 straight times during their brief series and seven of the victories have come by the shutout route.

In fact, Danbury has scored just 12 points during the span and reached the end zone on just one occasion during a 12-6 loss in 1972. The Lakers also kicked field goals while losing by scores of 17-3 in 1978 and 14-3 in 1979.

Friday, the Eagles scored with 1:15 left before intermission on a three-yard run by Tony Ames and made it stand up against stubborn Danbury.

Also, Ames ran the conversion to account for all the scoring by coach Steve Ringholz's team.

The Eagles had the edge in all offensive categories.

They rushed for 143 yard to just 36

for Danbury and passed for 31 more while the Lakers had just nine yards through the air.

Ames paced the Monroeville running game with 51 yards in 18 tries while Mark Sauvey totaled 21 yards in eight totes for Danbury.

Monroeville travels to Seneca East Friday for another independent clash while Danbury is also on the road, at Otsego.

Cooke's 2 TDs pace New London

SOUTH AMHERST — Chad Cooke reached paydirt twice in the first half while leading New London to a 17-0 blanking of South Amherst Friday.

Cooke ramblled 11 yards for the first score with just 1:20 gone in the game and it proved to be all the Wildcats needed. Tim Scheerer booted the PAT and New London led, 7-0.

Later in the period, Scheerer booted a 14-yard field goal to up the New London lead to 10-0.

Cooke scored for the second time in the game during the second period, scooping up a fumble by the hosts and returning it 55 yards for a touchdown. Again, Scheerer converted for the final 17-0 count.

Eric Puder led the New London running game, rambling for 93 yards in just nine carries while South Amherst, which was outgained by a 128-52 margin on the ground, was led by Ray Sliman's 58 yards in 10 tries.

South Amherst, which has install-

ed the run-and-shoot offense this season, completed 12 of 23 passes for 153 yards while New London hit on just four of 14 aerial attempts for 40 yards.

The hosts were also victimized by five turnovers including three fumbles and a pair of pass interceptions.

Northmor whips Trojans, 31-6

GREENWICH — Last year, Galion Northmor had to watch South Central's Doug Fidler roll up over 300 yards as the Trojans raced to an easy opening season victory over the Knights.

But this year, the situation was different.

Fidler has since graduated, and it was Northmor's turn to unleash a great running performance, as senior Randy Tyler compiled 168 yards and scored two touchdowns for the Knights in a 31-6 victory over South Central.

The Knights scored in every quarter. They led 13-0 at the half, and added six points more in the third quarter and 13 in the final quarter to take a commanding 31-0 lead before the Trojans scored with just over four minutes remaining.

Cregg Fetter broke lose for a 44-yard touchdown run, giving the Trojans their only score of the night. A run for the two-point conversion failed.

Big plays by Keegan, Rodriguez lead Clyde past Willard, 3-0

CLYDE — Scott Keegan didn't play football last year. However, Clyde mentor Butch Spaeth is glad he decided to this season.

The junior sprinter did more than his share in helping Clyde to a 3-0 win over Willard Friday night.

Midway through the first period, Keegan hauled in a Willard punt and

returned it 22 yards to midfield.

That began the lone scoring drive of the game.

The Fliers quickly drove for a first down at the Willard 33. Two

plays later, however, they were sitting at the 45 facing a third-and-22 situation.

Again, Keegan came on the scene. Quarterback Tedd Baker, another junior, found Keegan wide open downfield and the two hooked up for a 42-yard pass completion to the Willard three-yard-line.

Three plays later, the Fliers were still at the three.

That's when Spaeth called on senior Ruben Rodriguez for a 20-yard field goal attempt. The kick split the uprights and proved to be the only points scored in the contest.

Willard threatened twice in the second period, driving to the Clyde 37 one time and the 28 on another occasion. Both times, the Flashes failed to make necessary yardage on a fourth-and-two situation.

St. Paul opens on winning note

LaGRANGE — Norwalk St. Paul held off a late Keystone rally to secure a 10-8 victory Friday.

The Flyers opened the scoring on a two-yard run by Scott Jaworski in the second quarter, with Marc Weisenberger adding the extra point, giving the Flyers a 7-0 lead.
