Ball control key for Pirates

All week, Jim Stauffer stressed the importance of ball control in preparing the Perkins griders for the showdown battle with Clyde.

And, it was ball control which proved instrumental as the Pirates downed Clyde to gain at least a share of the Sandusky Bay Conference crown.

The Pirates ran off 61 offensive plays to just 39 for the visitors and the hosts held a 34-13 edge at intermission. "Once we got going, we seemed to be able to drive the football effectively. I think both teams were a bit nervous in the early part of the game and that's one reason for the numerous mistakes," said Stauffer, who is in his sixth year at the helm.

"The kids did a heck of a job. Our team was a very disciplined team and we were going on different counts throughout the game which seemed to keep them (Clyde) off balance. "There were some awfully big penalties tonight and several played a key role in our first two scores."

Clyde was penalized 10 times for 98 yards with six of them (58 yards) coming in the first half.

The first Pirate drive for a field goal in the opening quarter was kept alive following a 15-yard face mask call against the Fliers and another major penalty was called against the Fliers in the second quarter for roughing the kicker when Perkins was facing a punting situation.

It allowed the hosts to keep possession of the ball and eventually led to a second period touchdown which helped Perkins assume a 10-0 lead at halftime. "Mistakes are the whole name of the game. It is uncharacteristic of our team to make so many mistakes. They had the ball so much that it simply wore our defense down as they were on the field much of the time," said Clyde mentor Butch Spaeth.

"We gave them (Perkins) more breaks than we've given anyone else this season.

"Their game plan was to keep the ball away from our offense and it worked. The early fumble also took the starch out of us. We had momentum after the in-

terception by (Scott) Keegan but came right back and turned it over to them on the fumble.

Stauffer cited the play of tailbacks Chris Kenne and Mike Coleman for doing a fine job of running.

"They complement each other well. Chris had sprained his ankle in gym class Thursday and we used him sparingly on offense in the early going as we wanted him more on defense."

Kenne, who has gained more than 800 yards this season, rushed for 82 yards in 22 carries, 13 coming in the second half. Coleman, meanwhile, carried a bulk of the load in the first half and finished with 19 rushes for 63 yards. In the first half, he was 14-for-35.

The Pirate defense did an admirable job against the explosive Fliers, who had averaged nearly 30 points per outing.

"We felt the key to stopping Clyde was to contain (Jesse) Garcia and we did a pretty good job on him."

Garcia finished with 63 yards in 17 carries.

Stauffer pointed to the second quarter touchdown as a crucial score in the game.

The Pirates drove from their own 35 to paydirt with Kenne going the final yard.

But, there was a bit of controversy surrounding the score. On a second-and-goal situation from the Clyde two, Kenne went

over left guard for what appeared to be a touchdown.

The official ruled a touchdown but it was later discovered that another official had already whistled the ball dead before Kenne had reached paydirt.

It took the Pirates two more scores to get the ball across the goal line with Kenne again doing the honors.

"We felt we had scored but they blew an early whistle on the play and nullified the score. That meant the kids had to get up again and it was an important touchdown because it allowed us to go ahead by a 10-0 score and helped us assume control at that point.

"We've been close so many times before and it's really nice to be where we are now. We've got a share of it (title). Now we want it all and stop No. 7 comes next Friday at Port Clinton."

Crestview still perfect

Ashland Crestview moved one step closer to finishing the 1982 season with a perfect record following Friday's 19-0 win over Black River.

The win allowed the Cougars to take over first place in the Firelands Conference South Division.

They are now 9-0 overall and 5-0 in the FC, one game ahead of Black River which drops to 4-1 in the conference.

It was also the eighth time this season the Cougars have shut out an opponent as Edison has been the only team to score on the new member of the loop last week in a 21-7 setback.

In other FC action Friday night, South Central improved its record to 5-4 overall and 3-2 in the conference with a 27-12 win

over Plymouth, which is now 2-7 overall, 1-4 in the FC.

Crestview scored in each of the first three quarters and completely dominated the contest.

The Cougars gained 303 yards on the ground while their defense held the Pirates to just 23. Up above Crestview hit on four-of-seven for 97 yards giving them an evening total of 400 yards.

A touchdown in each of the four quarters led South Central to a 27-12 win over Plymouth.

Sophomore Mike Tuttle, who tips the scale at 218, rushed for 239 yards in 32 carries and two touchdowns to claim offensive game honors. The Trojans finished the night with 399 yards on the ground.

The Big Red managed 71 yards on the ground and 3-of-14 in the air for 32 yards giving them 103 for the night.

South Central had 24 first downs compared to just six for the visitors.

Senior Jeff Music also tallied two touchdowns for the winners on runs of one and ten yards.

Tiffin Calvert rally in fourth period too much for Margaretta

CASTALIA — Tiffin Calvert, based on two consecutive state football championships, knows how to win. Margaretta, young and inexperienced, is finding out the hard way what it takes.

And while there will be no computer playoffs or even a Sandusky Bay Conference title for Tiffin Calvert this year, they have continually been able to come up with big plays all season long.

In short, they know how to win.

Following that scenario again, Calvert took advantage of critical mistakes by Margaretta and made several big defensive plays Friday to beat the Bears, 16-7, scoring all its points in the final period.

Margaretta is now 2-7 overall and 2-4 in the SBC, while Tiffin is 5-3-1 overall and 3-3 in the league.

The Bears had a 7-0 lead and had forced the Senecas to punt from their own 31 yard line late in the third quarter. A Margaretta player called for a

fair catch, then threw a block instead. The play resulted in a 15-yard penalty that gave Tiffin the ball back at the 46.

Calvert gladly took the opportunity and drove in for a touchdown, with Paul Werling going over from one-yard out to cap the drive. Werling added the two-point conversion on a run, giving the Senecas an 8-7 lead early in the fourth quarter.

Margaretta then began to drive on the Senecas, but were faced with a fourth-and-two from the Calvert 45. They were stopped short on the play, and Calvert got the ball back and drove for a touchdown.

Mark Pardee scored from one yard out, and also added the two-point conversion with a run to finish the scoring at 16-7.

Margaretta had a scoring chance in the second quarter, but Calvert intercepted a pass at the 10 yard line to deny the Polar Bears a score.

Later in the period, a 38-yard pass play from second-string quarterback Jim Bodey to Rick Napka setup a scoring drive. Bodey went the final two yards for a touchdown to cap a five-play, 52 yard drive.

Bodey then kicked the extra point, and Margaretta had the 7-0 lead they held until the fourth quarter.

Statistically, the Bears had more passing yardage — 102 to 38 — and more total yards — 234 to 189.

But it was that intangible ingredient — knowing how to win, or, maybe more appropriately, knowing how not to lose, that was the difference.
