# Big Red rallies in 4th for win

# Plymouth kicks Edison around 13-6

NORWALK - After years of being kicked around, the Plymouth Big Red enjoyed ouir share of kicking opponents

It would only be fitting for the Big Red to get that last good kick against Milan Edison, the tough class AA team in the Class A dominated Firelands Conference.

In the north-south division second annual battle for the Firelands Conference championship, Plymouth manhandled the Chargers Friday evening during snowy and windy conditions at Whitney Field before a iced crowd of 1,000.

The Firelands Conference champs finished the year at 10-1, with the only loss being to Edison back in the fifth week, 39-6. The Chargers ended their year at 9-2 and had their four-year stronghold on FC titles broken by the large underdogs from Plymouth.

The loss for Edison was a gracious payback for that slaughter administered many weeks ago when the Big Red had to play without the services of bruising fullback Richard Cunningham. Cunningham missed the first meeting due to an injury, but he

made up for lost time by sloshing through the mud for 90 yards on 24 carries. It was Cunningham's great second and third efforts which sustained the scoring drives of 81 and 45 yards. "Richard (Cunningham) was outstanding and so were Bill

McVey (right guard) and Chad McGinnis (center)," said coach Richard Roll, who keyed a turn around of 8 games. Last year Plymouth was 2-8. 'Cunningham was amazing," said losing coach Jim Whit-

tington. "He came up with some great individual efforts even after we had him in our grasps. I've said all week that his presence made Plymouth a better running team. Tonight we found out why." The Chargers jumped out in front in the first quarter when a

Plymouth fumble was recovered at the Big Red 30-yard line and then an 11-yard run by Jeff Springer gave Edison its only points of the evening. In the second half the Big Red got many big plays towards the

title drive. -During the third period the Big Red started an 81-yard journey

to the endzone from their own 19. The drive appeared to be in death's hold with a fourth and sixth situation, but Edison was slapped with a 15-yard penalty for roughing the kicker and the drive was alive.

Coach Roll showed that he could probably go out to Las Vegas and be successful, by taking chances on the long drive with two critical fourth down calls. On those two calls it was Cunningham who fired out of the backfield and shredded the Edison defensive line for a pair of pickups for first downs.

After a shaky first half of passing, Hampton completed his only pass of the final 24 minutes, a 27-yard scoring pass to end Tom Baker, who was racing down the left sideline on the third and-one-situation:-Mike-McKenzie's-kick-was-blocked-with-8:52 left to play and the score stayed 6-6.

An inspired Plymouth defense was swarming and forced Edison to punt the ball away on the next series. The Big Red got the break needed with a short punt to the Edison 45-yard line.

Cunningham and McKenzie pounded their way towards paydirt and during the drive McKenzie squirted loose for a 15yard gain to the one-yard line. The 25-yard run was the longest of the game. Two plays later McKenzie burrowed his way through the left side at the 2:07 for a 12-6 Plymouth lead. McKenzie then booted the PAT kick but Edison came storming

The Chargers drove from their 43-yard line but ran out of downs when Baker drilled fullback Kurt Ostheimer in the flats on a pass that was five yards short of the first down at the

Plymouth eight-yard line with 15 seconds left to play. "Earlier this week we showed the team a movie about the 1980 U.S. Olympic Hockey team. We felt that it kind of fit what we've been through as a team, being the underdogs for such a long time," said Roll.

"It's a funny thing about this group of seniors. They never showed one bit of emotion in practice all week and that kind of worried me, but they had all the emotion necessary to do the job tonight. The kids wanted this win very badly.'


