

Everyone gets in on 28-6 Bucyrus win

Before a chilled gathering of 2,047, the Shelby Whippets raced past the outmanned Bucyrus Redmen, 28-6, at W. W. Skiles Field Friday evening.

More than 80 players saw action for head coach Bill Varble, and Shelby finished the year 8-2, 5-2 in the Northern Ohio League. Bucyrus ended the season mired in a nine-game losing streak, going 0-7 in the league.

The Redmen played on nearly even terms for the opening 12 minutes, limiting the Whippets to one first down and forcing a fumble to snuff a potential scoring drive at the Bucyrus 12-yard line.

After the opening period, Bucyrus never threatened as the Whippets exploded for 21 points during the span of five minutes in the second frame.

Shelby's defense battered Bucyrus for most of the game, limiting the Redmen to 28 yards passing on four of 15 completions and 67 yards rushing on 37 attempts.

Leading the bone-crunching defense was senior strong safety Craig Ridenour with nine tackles. Filing in next with six tackles each were seniors Brad Mikolajczyk, Rick Coleman, Ken Greter and junior Jeff Eldridge.

Coleman pilfered one Bucyrus pass while sophomore defensive end Mike Jones recovered a fumble at the Bucyrus two-yard line. Sophomore linebacker Steve Stiefel also pounced on a Bucyrus fumble.

A total of 27 Whippets were represented in the final sheet for tackling during the game.

Shelby's offense scored in the decisive second period on drives of 49, 21 and 50 yards.

A 29-yard punt gave the Whippets their first field position opportunity at the Bucyrus 49-yard line.

Martin bulldozed for five yards, and Buddy Baker sprinted down the right sidelines for 31 yards before being run out of bounds at the Bucyrus 13-yard line.

On the next play, senior quarterback Chip Fugate riddled the Bucyrus defense with a scoring pass to senior wingback Doug Gwinner, and sophomore kicker Tim Amstutz added the first of four successful PAT kicks.

The TD pass was the first of the season for Gwinner.

On Bucyrus' third play of the next series, Coleman ripped off a pass at BHS 34-yard line and returned it 13 yards.

Fugate flipped a pass to Tom Keller in the end zone, but it was batted away. Baker got the call on the next five plays with the Whippets scoring on a fourth-and-one call in which Baker twisted his body through the line into the greener grasses of the end zone at 6:12.

Ninety seconds later, the Whippets got the ball at midfield and struck in two plays. Fugate found Baldrige floating deep in the Bucyrus coverage and completed a 22-yard pass. A 15-yard late hit penalty put the ball on the 13-yard line and Baker broke loose from there to score on a trap play with 4:42 left in the first half.

The Whippets iced the contest on their first drive of the second half when they drove 64

yards in eight plays while using only two minutes and 59 seconds. Shelby mixed the run and the pass in this drive with Keller hauling in the pass from six yards out at 9:01.

The Redmen stumbled through the second half against the second, third and fourth stringers before Don Laek lofted a pass to Jeff Williams for the only Bucyrus score with 3:34 left in the game. The drive started from the Shelby 42 after an interception. The extra point run failed.

Statistically, eight Shelby runners gained 180 yards. Baker capped off a fine two-year varsity career at fullback with 114 yards on 12 carries.

Senior Scott Martin drove for 40 yards from the tailback slot, while junior John Yates rambled for 20 yards and Ron Roberts carried for 18 yards.

Fugate finished the game with five of nine completions for 51 yards while reserve quarterback Mike Stanford was zero for five with a pair of interceptions. Sophomore wingback Terry Baldrige snared a pair of passes for 31 yards to lead the Whippets in that department.

Baldrige punted three times for a 35.6 average while Gwinner boomed three punts for an average of 32.0.

Leading the Bucyrus ground attack was Dana Foght with 45 yards on 15 totes while Dave Williams led the Redmen receivers with one catch for 15 yards.

The gang of Shelby tacklers included: Ridenour (9), Coleman (6), Mikolajczyk (6), Roberts (6), Eldridge (6), Greter (6), Jim Moore (4), Ed Yetzer (2), Todd Schaub (1), Tom Lewis (1), Mike Shaughnessy (4), Jeff Murray (1), Tim Hess (3), Bruce Kehres (3), Bryan Kreinbrink (4), Doug Love (2), Bill Potts (2), Rob Yates (3), Ed Ingle (4), Matt Steele (2), Shaun Hollenbaugh (2), Stiefel (1), Jeff Ebersole (1), Keller (1), Mike Lybarger (1), Gary Hockenberry (1) and Jones (1).

"We did what we wanted and just outmaned them," Varble said. "We finished with a good first half and played all 82 kids."

Varble was short on words after the contest, but was obviously happy with the performance turned in by the outgoing seniors.

In other NOL games Friday, Tiffin Columbian won its first outright title with a 17-0 beating of Upper Sandusky while Gallon upset heavily favored Bellevue 13-10, and Norwalk battered Willard 33-22.

The Whippets tied for second in the NOL with Upper Sandusky while Bellevue finished fourth.

Plymouth goes to 9-1 with victory

POLK — Plymouth reserved a spot in next week's Firelands Conference playoff by pasting Mapleton Friday evening 21-8.

The Big Red finished the regular season with the school's best-ever record of 9-1 and were 4-0 in the southern division of the league. The previous best mark was compiled in 1976 when the Plymouth gridders were 7-0-1.

Plymouth will be keeping its eyes on the Western Reserve-E Edison game to see who will be representing the northern division. Currently Edison is 3-0, while Western Reserve is 2-1 and Monroeville is 3-1.

Mapleton held Plymouth scoreless through the first 20 minutes, 18 seconds of the game before Rod Hampton broke the ice with an 18-yard pass to Darren Branham. Mike McKenzie's first of three PATs was good enough for a 7-0 lead.

With 4:02 remaining in the third period, McKenzie balled his way into the endzone from five yards out and added the extra point kick for a 14-0 advantage.

Then with 22 seconds remaining in the quarter, Hampton, a left-hander, rifled a 35-yard pass to Tom Baker.

Mapleton got on the board with 3:25 left to play on a 45-yard pass from Jim Goon to Mike Wargo. The same scoring combo hooked up on the PAT try.

Plymouth, which did not punt once in the contest, ripped up 206 yards rushing while Hampton had his best percentage passing night going 10 of 13 for 144 yards. McKenzie was the leading rusher with 120 yards on 30 carries. Branham was the top receiver with six catches for 80 yards.

Mapleton was limited to 142 yards rushing and 63 passing. The Mounties held an 11-7 advantage in first downs.

The Firelands Conference playoff game will be next Friday at Norwalk's Whitney Field. Plymouth's opponent and starting time will be announced next week.

Tiffin Columbian snares first outright NOL crown with 17-0 blanking of US

After a two-year grasp on the Northern Ohio league title, the Bellevue Redmen Friday were unseated from the top spot by Tiffin Columbian.

The underdog Tornados won their first outright title after sharing in 1971 and 1974, by beating Upper Sandusky 17-0.

Tiffin claimed first with a 6-1 league mark in which the Tornados proved winning the close games will pay off. This year TC outscored its NOL foes 77-75.

In other NOL contests, it was Gallon clawing Bellevue 13-10, Norwalk pouncing Willard 33-22, and Shelby taking a 28-6 victory over Bucyrus.

Tiffin 17, Upper Sandusky 0

The Tornados of Tiffin held the Upper Sandusky ground attack to 141 yards after the Rams had gained almost 2,400 yards rushing in the first nine contests.

Scott Ogg did not figure in the game as the US standout hobbled out in the first quarter with an injury.

Tiffin held a 15-7 edge in first downs and gained 241 yards on the ground as Bob Bean led the winners with 60 yards on 13 carries.

At 8:01 of the second period, Bean scampered into the endzone from three yards out, and Mark Hoar's PAT kick made the score 7-0.

With 23 seconds left in the first half, Hoar booted a 32-yard field goal and moved Tiffin to a 10-0 lead.

Mark Stephens scored the last TD of the night for Tiffin with a 14-yard run in the third period with 11:16 on the clock.

Tiffin was 7-3 overall while Upper dipped to 7-3 and 5-2 in the

NOL, good enough for a second place tie with Shelby.

Gallon 13, Bellevue 10

Rob Monnett scooped up a Bellevue fumble and returned it 28 yards for the winning score as the Tigers surprised Bellevue.

Monnett's score came at the 10:04 mark of the second quarter after Gallon's Guy Wagner had just scored on a one-yard run at 10:14.

Bellevue's points came on a 24-yard field goal by Greg Hogue in the first period while Ed Green hit Craig Pocock with a 23-yard pass for the final score.

Defenses ruled the second half of scoreless play.

Gallon had 139 yards rushing as Monnett ran for 78 yards while Bob Szeznek led Bellevue with 71 stripes. The Redmen had 161 yards rushing.

Gallon passed for 98 yards while Bellevue hurried for 82.

The game was marred by nine turnovers, five by Bellevue.

Bellevue finished 6-3-1 overall and Gallon was 3-7-0 during coach Lee Owen's first year at the helm with the Tigers.

Norwalk 33, Willard 22

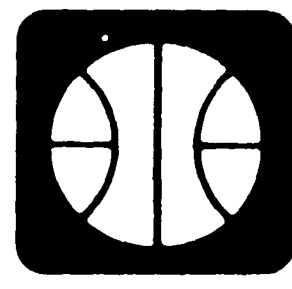
The Flashes scored 22 fourth quarter points, but that was not enough to overcome a 27-0 deficit after three.
