Martin bulls way to 132 yards

Shelby turns back Rams with 3rd quarter spree

Globe Sports Writer MANSFIELD - Like a soaring eagle waiting to exterminate an unsuspecting rodent, the Shelby Senior High football team waited for the right moment to dispose of Mansfield Madison in the season opener at Ram Field Friday night.

The Whippets roamed about the field for the first 31 minutes of action before swooping into the Ram endzone for a pair of third quarter scores and a 12-3 comefrom-behind victory before 3,500 spec-

Providing the spark in the Whippets during the second half was a starving defense which played inspired football during the second half and held Madison to minus yardage on the ground that half.

The Whippet defense surrendered 150 stripes on the ground in the first half but Madison's only direction was backwards in the second half as 11 rushing plays accounted for minus 25 yards.

The Hungry Hound defense also helped Shelby with its winning score.

Madison put the second half kick-off in play on their own 19-yard line when the SHS defense pushed the Rams back to the two-yard line and forced MHS to punt out of their own endzone.

Shelby put the ball in play on the Madison 30 after Buddy Baker completed a two-yard return on the punt.

Two plays later Shelby coughed up the football and appeared to have lost their chance to score, but the Rams then became generous and fumbled a pitchout as Byran Kreinbrink put the crunch on Madison runningback Bob Kipp and Ken Greter pounced on the loose ball with even and a half minutes to play in the third period.

Operating from the Madison 31-yard line, Shelby punched the ball across the goal line five plays later.

On fourth and two from the Madison 23, Scott Martin bullied his way for three tough yards to keep the drive alive with a first down at the Ram 20.

Passing for the first time in the game on first down, quarterback Chip Fugate found receiver Tom Keller on a flag pattern for a 20-yard touchdown pass with 4:57 showing on the clock. The PAT kick was nullified on a bad snap and kicker Jeff Ebersole was tackled in the back field.

With Shelby leading 6-3, the Whippets ended up with the ball one second later on a quite unusual play which couldn't have

been acted better from a Hollywood script. On the kick-off after the Whippet touchdown, kicker Jeff Ebersole followed orders to keep the ball away from speedy returner Steve Taylor who piled up 100 yards in the first half for Madison.

Ebersole's kick dropped behind the front line of Madison with Ed Yetzer recovering the loose pigskin at the Ram 35-yard line for the successful onside kick.

Twelve plays later the Whippets .put added pressure on the run-oriented Rams with a final score with nine seconds left after Martin raced into the endzone from one foot away. The PAT kick was wide to the right.

On fourth and two from the Madison 27, Martin kept the last TD drive alive with a seven-yard burst around his left end down to the 20-yard stripe.

On the same drive another fourth down play involving inches this time was turned into first and goal at the nine with Martin receiving the call and fighting for a very tough one yard.

For the second 24 minutes, the Whippets gave up a total of 16 yards.

Martin worked the Madison defense over very well, grinding out 132 yards on 29 carries. Martin rambled for 76 yards in the second half.

The defense put on an impressive first half display, twice stopping Madison scoring drives in four down territory.

Madison drove to the Shelby 19-yard line and bruiser Bob Kipp missed the Madison first down by less than an inch and then Shelby rose to the occasion in the second quarter when a fourth down pass fell incomplete at the SHS 32.

Madison's only score of the night came during a 12-play drive which began at Madison 46 yard line and ended at the 4:50 mark on a field goal by Brent Nardo from 32-yards out in the opening period. Other than a 62-yard run by Taylor, the

Rams were stymied by a punishing, lightning quick Whippet defense which responded to a challenging misdirection Madison offense.

"We played fair defense in the first half against Madison except for the 62-yard run," said a satisfied head coach Bill Varble.

"We missed some key blocking assignments on offense down around the Madison five-yard line and failed to get a first down and I thought that series would come back to haunt us," said Varble. "I was satisfied because I felt we moved the ball very well in the first half.'

The drive Varble was talking about started at the Shelby 26 with the big play being a 32-yard line. Four plays later the drive stalled when Martin was tackled at the line of scrimmage with 14 seconds left in the opening 12 minutes.

"At the end of the half we came out down 3-0 and were still in the game. We were dominating at the start of the second half and as the game wore on we started to wear down Madison," said Varble.

Varble felt that Martin had an outstanding game and the senior tailback made the tough yardage for the Whippets when they needed it to maintain control of

Fugate was a perfect three of three on the day while Baldridge was zero for one. Madison passers were three of nine for 41 yards. All that yardage came in the second half when Madison was forced to

Seniors Rick Coleman and Mike Roberts controlled the trenches for Shelby with 10_ tackles each while Tim Hess had nine stops with one quarterback sack.

The game was the 32nd meeting between the two schools and Shelby now holds a 18-14 edge in the series.

The game was especially sweet for the seniors who had never beaten a Madison team since playing organized football




