Willard knocks off unbeaten Shelby in 29-20 NOL thriller

WILLARD-Dreams of an undefeated season...a possible computer playoff berth...and a outright Northern Ohio League championship fizzled when the Willard Crimson Flashes whipped the Shelby Whippets, 29-20, in a NOL battle contested Friday night at Willard High School before 4,000 fans, with the majority being from Shelby.

But there's still light at the end of the tunnel for the Whip-

pets who are now tied for the league lead with Willard and Galion at 4-1. Overall Shelby is 7-1 and Willard improves to 6-2. The next two weeks for the Whippets are 'must win' situa-tions in order to stay in the league race.

As for the Division II playoff battle...challengers Toledo Scott and Galion were both winners while Perrysburg was a 23-21 loser to Bowling Green. Dayton Chaminade-Julienne and Ket-tering Alter play tonight. The Whippet opponents of Tiffin Columbian, Galion and Madison chalked up wins to add another eight points to the SHS computer total. Depending on what the other competitors do along with their opponents, the Whippets could possibly still reign at the top or slip a few notches. Willard, which needed the win

for a chance at a playoff berth in Division III, picked up 17.5 points for their win and any additional points from their opponents. The Flashes were rated fourth in their region behind Lima Bath, Elyria Catholic and St. Mary's Memorial in that order.__Bath_lost__12-6__to__St., Mary's and Elyria Catholic plays tonight against Parma Padua.

As for the league champion-ship, two weeks remain and a tri-championship is a reality if the current leaders finish with

wins. But a possibility of a fiveway championship exists if Bellevue and Tiffin Columbian have any say in the matter.

From the opening gun the Whippets were in trouble as the Flashes pounded out a pair of first quarter scores against the Hungry Hound defense and then dodged SHS bullets in a wild fourth quarter.

The Flashes took the opening kickoff and drove 76 yards in eight plays with Bill McClendon scampering into the endzone from 19-yards out with 8:35 showing on the clock.

Shelby appeared to be on the move with the ball at the WHS 45-yard line when the Whippets fumbled and the Flashes eventually recovered at the Shelby 42-yard line. From there the hosts grinded out a nine play drive that was capped off with a one-yard plunge by McClendon with 2 06 on the timer. Curt Storts drilled his second consecutive PAT kick for a 14-0

Willard put the clamps on the Shelby offense for most of the first half until the Whippets caught the Flashes napping in the secondary and sliced the lead to 14-7 at halftime.

With 2:32 left in the first half the Whippets put the ball in play at their own 29-yard line and pieced together a 11-play drive

pieced together a 11-play drive that was completed with 24 seconds on the clock after a oneyard dive by Terry Baldridge over the right side of the line. Key pass completions in the drive went to Baldridge(12 yards) and Rick Reed(2 catches for 59 yards). One of Reed's catches was a 33-yarder down the right sidline where he was eventually knocked out of bounds at the Willard three-yard line.

The game looked to be on ice late in the third period when Bauman rambled in from oneyard out and McClendon burrowed his way in with the twopoint conversion for a 22-7 lead with 1:26 on the clock. The Flashes were unstoppable on the drive of 67 yards and 15 plays that initiated when a SHS drive ended on downs.

Things remained quiet until the Whippets broke the ice and scratched their way back into

scratched their way back into the contest, trailing 22-20 with 4:53 remaining.

After fielding a Willard punt at their own 17-yard line, the Whippets reached their own 41-yard line before quarterback Mike Stanford rifled a bomb to Baldridge good enough for 59 Baldridge good enough for 59 yards and the score with 5:25 left in the game. The PAT run failed with WHS clinging to a 22-13 lead.

The Whippets then recovered the successful onside kick attempt at the Willard 48-yard line and the SHS offense went to its bag a tricks with a one-play strike into the endzone Baldridge took a handoff from Stanford and went right while Stanford raced into the Willard secondary toward the left sideline with no WHS defenders in sight. Stanford hauled in the pass off his finger tips and ran untouched into the endzone. Tim Amstutz then booted his second of two successful PAT attempts that had the Flashes dazed for a moment.

Willard bounced back by returning the kickoff to the Shelby 25 but were penalized 15 yards for unsportsmanlike conduct. Aided by a questionable roughing the kicker penalty the Flashes drove for the game winning score, an 8-yard run by Mc-Clendon that was iced on a kick by Storts with 3:11 on the clock

The Flashes defense paralyzed the Shelby running attack early and since the Whippets were forced to play catchup for the most part were held to a paltry 22 yards total, nearly 225 yards below their game average. Stanford riddled the WHS defense for 197 yards with

Baldridge being his top target The Whippet junior snagged three passes for 82 yards and Reed had two catches for 59 stripes in the first half.

McClendon ran over and through the Shelby defense en route to a 124-yard evening on 21 carries. Bauman blasted his way for 94 yards on 27 totes Jason Jump was six of 14 passing for 112 yards and Don Schaffer was the top WHS receiver with five catches for 91 yards Several of Schaffer's recepts got the Flashes out of trouble in the first half.

"We were outplayed by a bunch of kids who played a hell of a game," praised losing coach Bill Varble of the Willard effort. "They (Willard) outdid us in everything to win with outstanding efforts from Mc-Clendon and Jump We'd do something good and then Willard would come right back after us with something better '

The Whippets will now return home for a pair of home contests to wrap up their league schedule. Next Friday Shelby hosts Upper Sandusky

Sportmanship biggest loser in Plymouth-Black River game leading the attack with 146 yards

PLYMOUTH-Sportsmanship was the big loser at Friday night's football contest between Plymouth and visiting Black Fork as a stands-clearing brawl marred what had been an exciting game.

For those who were wandering about the massive traffic jam in Plymouth and extra police cars near the high school Friday evening, the situation reflected some sad circumstances.

To quickly get the first bad news out of the way, the Plymouth gridders will not be return trip to the Firelands Conference post-season encounter after losing 29-24 to Black River.

Plymouth's final drive started on their 15-yard marker and with the aid of a 43-yard pass from Troy Keene to Steve Hall, the ball was down to the Pirate's 25-yard line with less than two minutes remaining.

A motion penalty later pushed the ball back to the BR 16 where it was fourth and 13 for the Big Red with only 40 seconds showing on the clock.

The crowd was silent as Keene rolled back to pass. He saw an open man in the endzone and rifled the ball, but Dave Savick picked off the pass on the twoyard line and the rest was unbelievable.

From there Savick zigzagged his way down the field and walked into the endzone not knowing what had transformed behind him. He turned around to see a bench-clearing brawl in pro-

gress that put the NFL's player fracases to shame.
Two flags were thrown during

the final play, one was a clipping call and the other was a unnecessary roughness call, both believed to be against Black The latter of the two calls

stemmed from a Pirate player striking Keene. The PHS quarterback retaliated and brought the Pirate head coach sprinting across the feild. He then leveled Keene from behind to trigger the bench- and standsclearing brawl.

The few Plymouth policemen at the game for security reasons called in reinforcements and attempted to dispurse the crowd which became unruly as tempers flared. The officials called the game with 20 seconds still remaining on the clock and made a quick exit to safety.

The fighting went on for approximately a half hour before the stadium could be cleared.

The game got off to a quick start as the Pirates stormed down the field in four plays and scored on a Jim. Foky 33-yard scamper and the point after was kicked through to give Black River an early 7-0 lead.

Late in the second quarter Foky rushed for 30 more yards and another Black River score as the Pirates took a 23-0 lead with 2:34 showing on the clock.
Plymouth had the ball on their

48 with fourth and seven and

elected to punt, or so it seemed.
Punter Rodney Beverly went back into his usual stance and as the ball was snapped he turned around and acted like it was snapped over his head.

But the ball was snapped to Larry Brooks who-was blocking with Steve Hall to prevent the punt from being blocked. Brooks discretely handed the ball between the legs of Hall. As half the team chased the punter and the other half chased Brooks, Hall sifted his way 31 yards downfield to keep the drive alive for Plymouth.

Three plays later Scott Ryman took his first and longawaited carry and punched it in from 11 yards out to put his team on the scoreboard. The PAT attempt failed as Plymouth trailed, 23-6, at the half.

Gambling on a fourth and ninth call in the third period, Keene spiraled a 56-yard bomb closer, trailing 29-12 with 2:20 remaining in the third period.

Ryman's second-to-last to Hall and as Plymouth inched

touchdown was a five-yard scamper that cut the BR lead to 11 points with 7:32 remaining in the game.

Missing the bonus points after each touchdown was the difference in the game as Plymouth couldn't dig up, a single PAT attempt, going 0-4.
Following the kickoff the Pirates fumbled the ball away two plays later as PHS

recovered on the Pirate 16 with 6:48 showing on the clock.

Tim Deskins pushed his way for 14 yards and two trys later Ryman had his third touchdown of the night from one yard out with 5:30 remaining to set up the unfortunate finish.

Plymouth gained 140 yards on the ground as Ryman had 12 carries for 46 yards. Black River rushed for 308 yards with Foky on 12 carries. Teammate Larry Ensign had 110 yards on 22 trips. The Big Red's passing attack netted of 268 yards in the air as

Hall snagged seven aerials for 171 yards. The Pirates were held to only two pass completions for 33 yards.

Misery loves company— Bengals, Browns to meet

CINCINNATI (UPI) - What used to be called the "Battle of Ohio" becomes the "Struggle of Ohio" when the anemic Cleveland Browns and lethargic Cincinnati Bengals wander into each other Sunday.

Both teams are 1-6 and dazed. They can't figure themselves or each other — out.

"It's been frustrating for us and I think the Browns have to be saying a lot of the same things that we're saying," figured Bengals' coach Sam Wvche.

He's right. "This is one of our most frustrating seasons and I think Cincinnati thinks the same way," echoed Browns' boss Sam Rutigliano.

Back to you, Sam. Thank you, Sam.

So, it seems appropriate that two quarterbacks who throw with the wrong hand (that's just a joke, southpaws) will oppose each other when the two struggling clubs search for answers at Riverfront Stadium.

"Gee, I can't remember ever starting against another lef-thanded quarterback,'' Cleveland's Paul McDonald said of his assignment against Cincinnati's Boomer Esiason. 'Maybe that'll be a trivia question someday.

Ohio's two alleged NFL teams have lost 12 of their 14 games.

Rutigliano figures the Bengals' problems stem from the loss of powerhouse fullback Pete Johnson and the ineffectiveness of veteran quarterback Ken Anderson.

Bengals went to the Super Bowl. Kenny Anderson was having a great year," he said. "Pete Johnson's departure represents the loss of a lot of critical

yardage.
"Plus, you can't lose people like Dan Ross and Jim_LeClair (to the USFL) and Ken Riley (to retirement) And, they're now going into their eighth game and they're going with their third quarterback. I think that's dif-ficult for the team. The quarterback is in the eye of the storm

But Wyche notes that Cleveland also has had quarterback woes.

"Early in the season it looked like McDonald had a couple of games where he didn't have a hot hand," Wyche said in diplomatic fashion.

Neither Rutigliano nor McDonald would argue with that.

"Interceptions (McDonald has tossed away a dozen) and poor judgement really didn't do much to help us win some close games," said Rutigliano. "But in his last two games he threw for over 600 yards and only had one interception. He's beginning to do the things we think he's

capable of."
"I think I made significant improvements the last two weeks," added McDonald. "I'm not making poor decisions like I was earlier.'

Wyche also points out that penalties have crimped Cleveland.

"They've had a lot of personal fouls that have hurt them," he said after studying films of the Browns' games. "They will be stopping people and all of a sudden they foul the quarterback, they hit somebody out of bounds. they pile on, they rough the passer."

Rutigliano this week fined safety Al Gross \$1,000 for a personal foul that helped the New York Jets beat the Browns last Sunday and has warned him not

One of Cleveland's biggest problems is a poor running game (the Browns have been outrushed 881 to 580 yards) and Rutigliano puts the blame squarely on the offensive line. which has been weakened by injuries to 6-foot-7, 280-pound Cody Risien and 6-5, 250-pound Doug Dieken

"The loss of Risien has had a devastating effect on our of-fense," said Rutigliano "We've just not had the kind of play from our offensive tackles that we've had in the past The Browns have the No 1

defense in the AFC, but Rutigliano says he can't call it "great" because of the 1-6 record.

"A great defense is one that wins games for you," he noted "We were ahead of Denver 14-0. ahead of New England 16-3, ahead of New York 20-17 and tied with Los Angeles 17-17, but lost all of them

Cleveland's all-time leading receiver Ozzie Newsome set a pair of club records with 14 receptions for 191 yards last Sunday and Wyche will have his defenders keying on him

"You've got to concentrate on stopping Newsome," said Wyche "You've got to shut him down to some extent, but I don't think you can shut him out

As for the rivalry, both coaches feel it's still there despite the sorry records

"It's a legitimate rivalry, not just another NFL contest, sisted Wyche "It would be a tremendous lift if we beat Cleveland "

"Ohio is a great football state," said Rutigliano "For example, we played at Kansas City after they had lost two straight games and they drew 40,000 We played at home after we had lost three straight and drew 80,000 "
