Nebraska 42, Wyoming 7 LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI) — Jeff Smith ran for 170 yards and a score and Tom Rathman rushed for 108 yards and a touchdown to push No. 2 ranked Nebraska to a 42-7 victory over Wyoming.

With top-ranked Miami's 22-14 loss to Michigan, the Huskers likely will take over the top ranking in the United Press International Board of Coaches ratings

The Huskers relied heavily on the run, with Rathman and Smith accounting for more than half of Nebraska's 71 rushing attempts that netted 440 yards for the game. Sundberg and Turner combined to throw 11 passes, eight of which were completed.

Oklahoma 19, Stanford 7

Panthers blank Flyers by 13-0

The Flyers refused to quit and gambled from their own 8 on fourth down, but Bellamy barreled in to sack Meyer for a loss and the Panthers had possession at the 1 with 44 seconds left in the game.

ponents this week. The Panthers entertain Monroeville (2-0) Saturday at Strobel Field, and the Flyers meet Margareta (1-1) on the road Friday.


