Monroeville wins

It was in the cards for Monroeville to win Friday's Firelands Conference opener at South Central.

Since Steve Ringholz took over as head coach of the Eagles in 1978, Monroeville has won conference openers in each of the even-numbered years while losing on the odd-numbered.

And, the Eagles kept the streak alive with a 12-0 blanking of South Central in the conference opener.

"It was kind of frustrating. We had almost 400 yards total offense and still could only put two touchdowns on the board. We're just not able to reach the end zone for some reason or another. One of these days, though, we'll break loose," noted Ringholz.

The Eagles, unbeaten in four outings, gained 143 yards on the ground and passed for an additional 213 enroute to 356 yards total offense while South Central came up with 120 yards rushing and 100 passing.

"South Central is a good 1-3 ball team. The score was close all the way. We had several opportunities to score but just couldn't do it," added Ringholz.

Senior Dave Keszei had another good night throwing the ball with an 18-of-30 showing for 213 yards. Mark Stacey was his favorite receiver with nine receptions for 154 yards while Scott Jones grabbed six for 63

Roger Smith, who scored the first Monroeville touchdown from one yard away in the second period, was the leading ground gainer in the game with 142 yards in 22 carries.

During the first touchdown drive, which consumed 11 plays, Smith had a 33-yard gainer.

The 6-0 score held up until the fourth quarter when Stacey scored on a six-yard run. Earlier, he hauled in a 35-yard pass from Keszei and it took the Eagles just four plays to go 70 yards.

"Our defense did an excellent job. We stopped their big running back (Mike) Tuttle on just seven yards in five carries. But, they used himas a decoy much of the time which opened the door for the other backs," noted Ringholz.

PLYMOUTH - Last year, Plymouth won its conference opener and went on to claim the


Firelands Conference crown. Head coach Dick Roll is hoping for a repeat following a 12-8 FC opening win over New Lon-

Cook: Findlay too strong

Sandusky High football coach Larry Cook was concerned about the difference in size between his club and Findlay going into Friday's Buckeye Conference clash at Strobel Field.

"I was worried whether or not we could stop them. We felt we could move the ball ourselves, but the big concern was whether or not we would be able to stop them. They were so big and physical," Cook said after the Streaks dropped a 26-20 decision to fall to 2-2 for the season.

"I'm proud of the kids. They kept battling and gave it everything they had. We have a depth problem and when you lose two key players like we did in Tom Fresch and Tony Sargent from our defensive unit, that really hurt us. Findlay was so powerful and then ran from an unbalanced line in the second half to get another blocker in there, and we just couldn't stop them," Cook said.

"We are paying our dues for somebody else. We need a strength and weight training program which has been lacking. These kids should be on free weights and we have some ordered and you can sure bet we will have them," Cook stated.

"I looked at John and he was okay, then I looked back and he almost passed out. I don't know what the problem is but he is still getting tests." Cook said one hour after the game ended.

"Tom Fresch is one of our captains and a fine young man who was an excellent leader. He worked hard during the offseason from what I was told in order to become an outstanding player for us. 
