



Galion rips Tiffin 40-14 for NOL title

The Galion Tigers claimed the 1985 Northern Ohio League championship with an impressive 40-14 win over previously unbeaten Tiffin Columbia Friday night.

The Tigers, 10-0 overall, were ranked seventh in the latest United Press International Coaches Poll, while the 9-1 Tornados were listed ninth.

The NOL championship was the first for Galion since 1978 when the Tigers were 10-0 that year.

TIFFIN—An estimated 8,000 fans watched the unbeaten Tigers coast to a 26 point lead early in the third quarter for their tenth win of the year.

Galion opened the scoring with 6:36 on the first quarter clock on Rob Monnett's three yard run.

Just into the second frame, Galion scored again on a four-yard burst by Carl Johnson and Dave Weithman kicked the second of his two PAT kicks for a 14-0 lead at 10:38.

Monnett answered with a one-yard plunge with 4:14 showing for a 20-0 lead and Jeff Remy gave the Tigers a 26-0 lead on a 27-yard run with 7:18 to play in the third stanza.

Tiffin got on the scoreboard with 5:14 in the third quarter on a 10-yard pass from Dave Gardner to Dave Kin and Adams Engle booted the PAT.

Galion scored with time running out in the third period on a three-yard run by Monnett for a 32-7 lead.

Jeff Bierly accounted for the final Tiffin score on a five-yard pass from Gardner and Engle kicked the PAT.

The Tigers ended the scoring in the game with 4:56 to play on a five-yard run by Johnson. Marc Hottenroth snagged the PAT pass from Johnson.

Galion grinded out 444 yards of rushing and Johnson passed for another 99 yards. Monnett led Galion with 205 yards on 19 trips while Remy had 200 yards on 21 carries.

Bierly led Tiffin with 50 yard rushing. TC had 102 yards rushing and passed for another 106

Galion tallied 25 first downs to Tiffin's 10.

WILLARD—Willard scored in every quarter to end the season with a 35 point victory over the Bucyrus Redmen.

The win gave Willard third place in the NOL standings.

Curt Storts rushed for 200 of the 219 Willard rushing yards in the game on 26 carries. Storts scored on a pair of two yard runs while Pudge Maudsley caught a 25-yard TD pass from Chris Thompson for another score while Thompson and Clay Stephens scored for the Flashes on three and one-yard runs, respectively.

Bucyrus was held to 45 yards rushing and passed for 94. Bill Cherry had 31 yards on 16 carries for the Redmen.

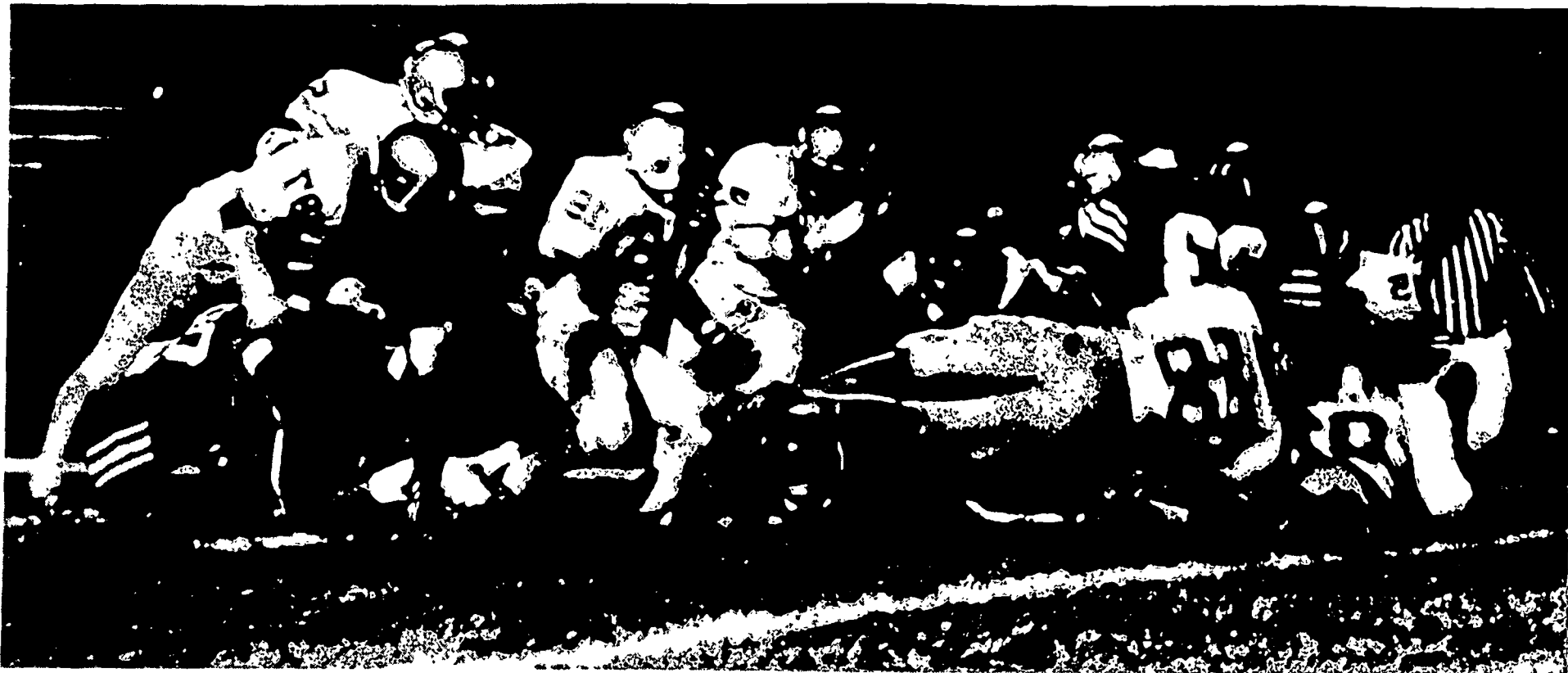
Bellevue 43

Whippets rush for 257 yards

Shelby rips Upper Sandusky 30-6

UPPER SANDUSKY—Intensity propelled Shelby to a 30-6 season-ending victory over Upper Sandusky on a cool, windy Friday evening before a gathering of 2,000 fans.

The win snaps a two-game losing streak and SHS finishes the year with a 6-4 mark under first-year coach Ron Stepsis. In the Northern Ohio League the Whippets were 4-3 and took fourth place in the standings.

Upper Sandusky completes the year without a single win—going 0-10 in all games and 0-7 in the NOL.

"We as a coaching staff are proud of the way our young men finished the season with a victory over Upper Sandusky," coach Ron Stepsis said following the contest.

"I believe we had a fine group of individuals and the team's disappointed we weren't able to get a few more wins for the seniors," Stepsis added.

Following losses of 42-21 to Galion and 24-12 to Willard, the Whippets were very fired up, limiting the Rams to a 157 yards of total offense.

Shelby racked up 257 yards rushing and passed for another 42.

Senior runningback Terry Baldrige sparked the Whippets with 123 yards and scored the first two touchdowns of the game.

Following a punt of four yards by Upper Sandusky, SHS marched 28 yards in seven plays as Baldrige swept into the endzone from four yards out and

Tim Amstutz booted the point-after-touchdown kick with 7:30 to be played in the first quarter.

Midway through the second stanza Upper Sandusky marched from its own 38-yard line to the Shelby 12 and was faced with a third-and-seven situation. On the next play Jeff Swartz was hauled down for an eight-yard loss and a pass play to Swartz from Tom Martin on the next play ended the drive at the 20-yard line.

From there the Whippets marched 80 yards in 12 plays, scoring on a five-yard-dash around the right end by Baldrige with 5:50 left in the first half. Amstutz split the uprights and vaulted SHS on top 14-0.

With 4:45 remaining in the first half, Shelby's Mike Lybarger landed on a Ram fumble at the US 26-yard line. Six plays later the Whippets were at the one-yard line and fumbled the ball back to the Rams on the next play at the one-foot line.

SHS scored a safety with 53 seconds remaining in the first half when Martin was tackled in the endzone by the Hungry Hound defense for a 16-0 Shelby advantage.

A 47-yard drive by the Whippets late in the third period pushed the bulge to 23-0 when Rick Reed blasted his way into the endzone from one-yard out with 1:52 on the timer. Amstutz was then perfect on his final PAT of his high school career.

Against the substitutes the Rams first-team offense netted its only points of the evening on an 80-yard drive that covered 16 plays. A one-yard run by Martin with 3:30 cut the gap to 23-6.

Upper attempted the onside kick, but the Whippets recovered at their own 45-yard line.

From there Shelby went 55-yards in seven plays to complete its scoring. Andy Cole did the damage for the Whippets on that drive as the reserve wingback collected 40-yards on the march. Cole's biggest gainer was his 26-yard TD run on a reverse with one second remaining on the clock. Wes Beighley's PAT kick was the final score of the 1985 season for SHS.

During the game Shelby used a total of eight runningbacks and two quarterbacks while three different players threw one or more passes in the game. Collecting rushing yards for Shelby besides Baldrige were Brad Glaze (5-35), Beighley (5-10), Reed (7-33), Doug Noblet (3-4), Brad Parsons (2-2), Steve Ousley (1-4), Cole (2-40), Larry West (1-6).

Passing-wise for the Whippets, starting quarterback Randy Fagg was two-of-four for 27

yards with one interception. Baldrige was 0-for-2 and Ousley was 1-for-6 for 15 yards. Jeff Rickens was on the receiving end of all three completions.

The SHS defense also had a blocked punt to its credit. Reid Lederer was the player who blocked the kick and teammate Brad Butcher recovered the ball at the Upper 26 with 45 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

In the third quarter the Rams were held to 20 yards of offense by the stingy red and gray defense.

Shelby totaled 16 first downs to Upper's 12 and punted one for a 33.0 average. The Rams punted four times for a 14.5 yard average.

"This was the first time in quite some time that our offensive line did a heckuva job controlling the line of scrimmage. It opened some big holes for our runningbacks," Stepsis said. "Defensively we came around and got off the blocks quickly and swarmed to the ball."

"I was very pleased with our

turn-around," Stepsis praised "One thing I was impressed with was coach John Reed of Upper Sandusky. He kept his team together. They've been through an awful lot of adversity, but he did a nice job with that ball team," said Stepsis.

ASHLAND—Mapleton grabbed a four-touchdown lead in the first half and coasted to a 34-14 win over Firelands Conference rival Plymouth Friday evening.

Plymouth wraps up the season with a 6-4 slate finishes with a 3-4 mark versus league competition. Mapleton improves to 5-5 overall and 2-5 in the FC.

Brian Mohrman spotted Mapleton a 6-0 lead following an eight-yard run and Darrel Young fired a 27-yard pass to Dan Moore for a 12-0 spread. Young then hit Terry Gerwig on a successful PAT pass in the rout.

Dane Bowersock and Mohrman added TD's in the second quarter on runs of 16 and 3-yards to push the score to 28-0.

Before halftime Plymouth got on the scoreboard following a one-yard plunge by Troy Keene. Keene then worked with Steve Hall for the two point conversion on a pass.

The Big Red cut the gap to 28-14 in the third stanza on a 15-yard pass from Keene to Hall, but Mapleton iced the win in the fourth quarter on a TD pass from Young to Gerwig covering five yards.

Plymouth passed for 147 yards and the PHS rushing attack was held to minus-seven yards.

Mapleton ran for 259 yards and passed for 48. The Mounties had 15 first downs to Plymouth's seven.
