

Plymouth remains perfect

GALION — Plymouth's Dick Roll must feel he's having a flashback.

Friday, the Big Red held off Northmor, 17-14, to remain undefeated at 3-0.

That's an identical showing to the start registered two years ago when the Big Red went 10-1 and captured the Firelands Conference crown.

Next week, they open conference play at New London which is winless in three outings.

The Big Red took the opening drive, scoring off it and they never looked back.

Steve Hall climaxed the 15 play, 75-yard drive when he hauled in a 17-yard aerial from Troy Keene and Randy Myers booted the conversion for a 7-0 lead with 5:29 left in the quarter.

Plymouth padded its lead before intermission, scoring twice in the second quarter.

First, Billy Castle plunged in from one yard out with 11:26 left in the period and Myers booted the conversion. Then, Myers added a 22-yard field goal with just 1:17 left before intermission.

Both Northmor scores came in the second half.

Shayne Yeater rambled in from 31 yards away as the hosts marched 80 yards with the second half kickoff.

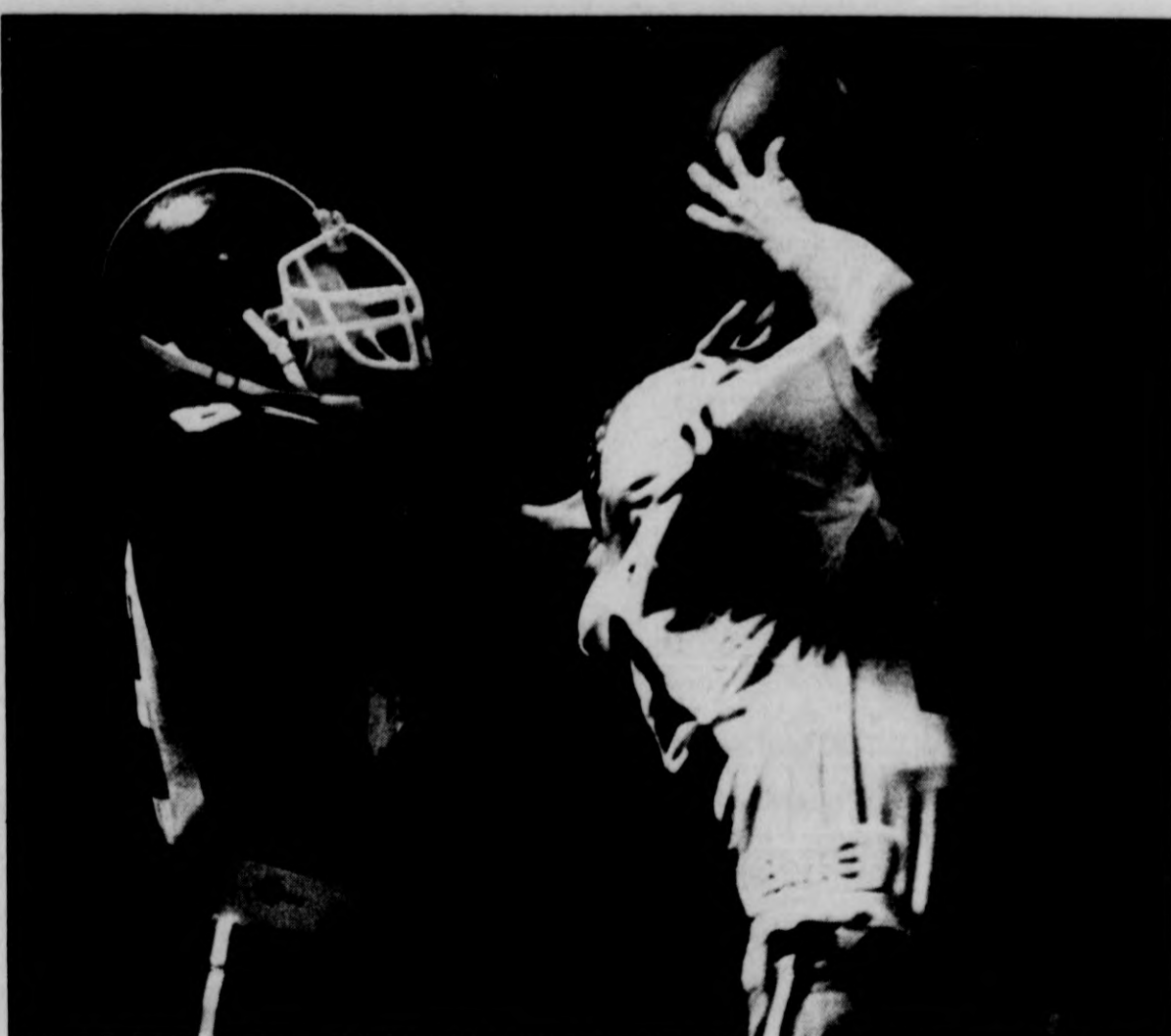
But, they were unable to mount any other threats until David Sedmak hauled in a four-yard pass from Adrian Wilson to climax a 99-yard driveth 4:39 left to play. Yeater ran for the two-point conversion but they were unable to get any closer than the final 17-14 score.

Thad Howells moved the ball to the Redmen 19, Ambos appeared to be going left on a keeper. And, Bellevue's defense got caught thinking the same as they converged on the junior signalcaller. That left Wheeler alone in the end zone and Ambos fired a strike as the two hooked up for a 9-yard scoring pass with just 11 seconds left in the opening period. The conversion missed but the Pirates had a 13-0 lead.

"We were able to gain momentum in the first quarter. Ambos ran the option well and was cutting up inside for big gainers. We wanted to make them (Bellevue) throw the ball at the beginning and take them out of the running game," added Stauffer.

Bellevue missed connection on its first six passes and the running game was just as ineffective

with six first period rushes netting just eight yards.

Following a Bellevue punt, the Pirates struck like lightning after gaining possession at their own 40.

Howells picked up two yards and that set the stage for a flashy 58-yard run to paydirt by Ambos who also ran the conversion for a 21-0 Pirate advantage with 10:12 left in the second period.

Ambos finished as the game's leading rusher with 98 yards in just seven carries and the Pirates totaled 202 yards on the ground. Also, he completed 6-of-8 passes for 104 yards.

Disaster again struck the Redmen on their next possession.

Wheeler was able to break through and block Strayer's attempted punt. After making the block, Wheeler scurried to the ball, picking it up and racing 21 yards to the end zone and Ambos converted for a 28-0 lead with 8:40 left before halftime.

Bellevue made its strongest penetration of the half, moving to the Pirate 31 on the next possession only to stall out as quarterback Chris Turner was sacked for a four-yard loss by Brian Brown on a fourth-and-10 situation.

With just under five minutes left, the Pirates staged another quick drive.

First, Ambos found Steve

Schuster for a 35-yard gain. Following a pair of running plays, Ambos went back to his favorite target Wheeler, who went up and took the ball away from a Bellevue defender and raced in for what proved to be the final score of the night, a 25-yarder which was his seventh touchdown of the season. Ambos converted and the count went to 35-0 with 3:19 left before intermission.

It was the seventh touchdown of the year for Wheeler, six coming on the receiving end of Ambos passes.

"They just gave us a good old fashioned whipping. They played extremely well and took it to us. There are no excuses, the best team on the field won," said Bellevue head coach Terry Adams.

"We were riding the crest of a No. 10 ranking (UPI ratings earlier this week) and a 2-0 mark and this is not a proven team. I think the high rating was certainly a deterrent to this team. But, it doesn't take anything away from Perkins. They had excellent field position and were able to make the big play and it snowballed from that point," added Adams.

Both teams begin league play next Friday. Perkins entertains Margaretta in the Sandusky Bay Conference opener while Bellevue hosts Shelby as the Northern Ohio League season gets under way.

Seneca East strikes early in whipping South Central, 23-6

ATTICA — Seneca East continues to pile up the victories under coach Mike Cool.

The Tigers marched 69 yards after the opening kickoff to open an 8-0 lead and coasted to a 23-6 win over visiting South Central Friday for their 11th straight conquest, and 18th in the last 20 games.

Seneca East used 16 plays and 5½ minutes before striking paydirt on an 11-yard pass from outstanding quarterback Jim Reesman to end Joe Miller. The key play came on Bruce Herman's 17-yard jaunt.

Reesman passed to Herman for the two-point conversion at the 6:32 mark.

The Tigers increased the lead to 15-0 by intermission.

Woody Kidwell's fumble recovery at the Trojans' 35 set up the second score. The hosts went 35 yards in just 4 plays and Reesman fired his second scoring strike of the night, this time to Jeff Brooks covering the final 24 yards. Brooks added the extra point.

Seneca East cashed in on a poor snap from center on a Trojans' punt attempt in the third period to hit paydirt again. The punter finally downed the ball at his own 33 and the Tigers drove the distance on 7 rushing plays.

Tom Werling scooted the last 7 yards to make it 21-0, then Reesman clicked with Werling for the two-point conversion on a broken play. A vad snap on the placekick attempt resulted in Reesman picking up the ball and

then locating Werling for the PAT.

South Central averted a shutout early in the final period as John Vogel bulled over from the 1 with 8:54 left in the contest.

The Tigers, who open defense of their Lakeshore Conference crown next Friday against Danbury, relied primarily on the running of Herman and Werling. They combined for 157 yards on 33 carries and Reesman chipped in with 36 yards on 9 carries.

Meanwhile, South Central was unable to mount a running attack and went to the air 20 times and completed 8 for 60 yards. However, Reesman and Scott Depinet came up with interceptions for the winners.

Durr's 297 yards keys Willard win

WILLARD — "Tonight's game was a big shot in the arm for us, however, we did make a number of second half mistakes," said Willard coach Terry King as his Flashes won their second game of the young season downing Tiffin Calvert, 27-13.

"Our inside game was weak (Durr, the game's leading ground gainer with 297 yards in 25 attempts, picked up most of his yards on the outside routes) and our passing game was not up to par, but it will get better. Thompson (Willard's junior quarterback) has a great arm and needs just to get more experience," he added.

The Flashes got off on the right foot as Ryan Durr rambled 69-yards for a score on the very first play of the game. Curt Storts booted home the extra point to give Willard a 7-0 lead with just 31 seconds off the clock.

The Senecas came back and tied the score late in the period as Greg Smith hauled in a 60-yard pass from Jim Ruehle. Dave Szablewski kicked the extra point to make it 7-7.

Durr then put the hosts back in the lead to stay with a 13-yard jaunt at the 10:33 mark of the second stanza. Willard failed to convert the bonus points and

held a 13-6 lead at the intermission.

Durr tallied again in the third quarter this time on a 30-yard run and a Chris Thompson to Pudge Maudsley pass made it 21-6 with 10:33 left in the period.

Tiffin Calvert got their final score of the evening in the fourth quarter when Aaron Smith darted in from the four with 10:35 left in the game.

Durr recorded his fourth six-pointer of the evening as he rambled in from the 35 with 3:04 remaining.

"Ryan needed this game to help build his confidence and his performance sure gives Columbian (Willard's first opponent in the NOL) something to look for next week," concluded coach King.
