Willard shocks Bellevue, 14-12

WILLARD — Willard continued its mastery of Bellevue, under third-year head coach Terry King, with a 14-12 upset win Friday night.

The Crimson Flashes have yet to lose to their rival since King took over the head coaching job in 1984.

But, Friday's win would certainly loom as the biggest of the three since the Redmen came in with a 6-1 overall mark and were tied with three others for the Northern Ohio League lead, at 3-1.

On the other hand, Willard has struggled this season and is only 3-5 overall, 2-3 in the NOL.

"Willard played a fine game. They executed well on both offense and defense. We never established offensive continuity and had two offensive breakdowns which cost us 14 points," said Bellevue head coach Terry Adams after watching his team lose for the second time in eight outings.

Bellevue scored first in the game, driving 60 yards in seven plays following a Willard punt. Jeff Hosang's one-yard plunge with 1:30 left in the quarter gave the Redmen a 6-0 lead after the point after attempt failed.

Willard came right back with a 60-yard drive, helped by three Redmen penalties. On third down, the Flashes went with the halfback pass and Billy Robinson was right on target to Don Bauman for 29 yards and the score. Jeff Jump converted for a 7-6 lead with 4:43 left before halftime.

On its next possession, the Flashes struck again in a big way as sophomore Shawn Barrison danced his way 68 yards to paydirt and Jump was again successful as the lead increased to 14-6 just 1:42 before halftime.

The Redmen came back in the third quarter with Hosang going in on a one-yard plunge with 5:50 showing on the clock but the try for two-points failed and left them short, 14-12.

As time was winding down in the contest, the Redmen moved close to the goal.

On fourth down, junior Brad Schubert came on to attempt a 38-yard field goal which was wide to the left.

"When we came back with Robinson at tailback and he threw the touchdown pass off the quick pitch action, that was the big key," said Willard coach Terry King.

"We needed that one. All year, our defense has been much-maligned but I can't say enough about our defense tonight. They did a great job. It was David Scott's first game at defensive end and he did a great job. In the fourth quarter, when they were facing a fourth and 10 at our 28, he blitzed their quarterback (John Oddo) and sacked him for a seven-yard loss which was a big play," added King.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UPI) — Iowa can expect everything from Michigan — because Wolverines' coach Bo Schembechler promises it.

"That's the last time we've lost," Schembechler said, recalling the 1985 classic between the two teams that provided Iowa with a 12-10 victory on a last-play, 29-yard field goal by Rob Houghtlin at a time when the teams were at the top of the rankings. "Now, we've got to win this game. We're going to put everything into this game. Everything."

This year's match will again be nationally televised with the winner an automatic favorite for the Rose Bowl berth that goes to the Big Ten champion. Schembechler agrees with that by inference.

Vermilion rebounds from lone loss

VERMILION — Vermilion ran its record to 7-1 Friday night with a 7-0 win over Toledo Macomber.

The only score of the night came in the second period as Jeff Weaver bulled in from the one. The Dave Eberhard kick capped off the scoring.

MONROEVILLE — Monroeville needed two fourth-quarter touchdowns to subdue Mapleton 23-18 in Firelands Conference action.

The Mounties took the lead with five minutes gone in the third period when Gordon Glenn raced 80 yards to score. The two-point conversion failed, but Mapleton had a 12-7 advantage.

Ten minutes later, the Mounties increased the lead to 18-7, when Daryl Young hit Mike Bricker for a 16-yard scoring strike.

From there, the Eagles took over. Kevin Smith scored his second touchdown of the night when he dashed in from 5-yards out. Smith came back and completed a pass to Jason Collins for the two-point conversion.

Monroeville got the game-winner with 3:27 remaining in the game as Chris Pfeiffer connected with Allen Lasch for a 23-yard scoring strike. Pfeiffer and Smith hooked up for the two-point to end the scoring.

Monroeville, who upped its season mark to 4-2 in the Firelands and 5-3 overall, were led by Pfeiffer, who gained 71 yards in 13 carries. For the game, the Eagles rushed for 175 yards and passed for 135 more.

The Mounties rushed for 114 yards on the ground, led by Brian Mahrman's 51 yards. Mapleton netted only 47 yards through the air.

Mapleton falls to 3-5 for the season and 1-5 in the conference.

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"Well," he said, "there are too many games left, too many teams left, too many close games left. But it'll help a lot, to win this one."

"I said before the season the success or failure of our season would be in the middle third of the schedule," Schembechler said, "Wisconsin, Michigan State and Iowa. We're not going to stand around and hope to be ready. We will be ready."

Schembechler was using the same determined tone of voice he usually reserves for Michigan State and Ohio State. Iowa is now commanding the same sort of respect as would any opponent whose coach is 3-3 lifetime against Michigan.

Last season the Hawkeyes showed the Wolverines a lot of

things they had not seen, nor prepared for. And Iowa had time — because of an early schedule that allowed it to focus on Michigan more than anybody else.

"We expect to see some different things from them," Schembechler said, noting parenthetically that Iowa's schedule again permitted this. "We're working on some new things, too."

Michigan's opinionated coach also repeated his wry observation from a year ago, when he voiced his irritation at the Iowa crowd noise interfering with his team's ability to hear signals.

"I remember him the following week complaining about the noise at Ohio State," Schembechler said, not snidely

but certainly not with humor. "I don't mind a guy complaining about noise — I just don't think he should unless he does something about it at home."

Michigan should have a full cast for Iowa with tailback Jamie Morris closer to 100 percent than he was for Michigan State. "When you heavily tape a thoroughbred," Schembechler said in a reference to the sore knee Morris operated with against the Spartans, "that slows him down."

Schembechler also is operating on the assumption that Iowa quarterback Mark Vlasic, who has missed the last two games, and fullback David Hudson will return to action.

"I expect they'll play," he said. "They can't save them any longer."

Fremont 27 Marion 8

FREMONT — Fremont Ross, behind the 113 yards rushing by Rob Egbert, rolled over Marion Harding 27-8 in Buckeye Conference action Friday.

The Little Giants (5-3, 3-1), who remain just one game off the pace, scored with 6:57 left in the opening quarter as Egbert rambled for 25 yards and the score. John Stierwalt's kick made it 7-0.

Egbert scored his second touchdown in the same period with 1:42 left as he went in from the eight. Stierwalt's kick made it 14-0.

Ross managed three more points before the intermission as Stierwalt hit on a 30-yard field goal to make it 17-0 at the half.

Marion scored first in the second half with Pat Scott going in from the eight. Alan Jones added the two-point conversion on a pass from Scott. This came at the 2:45 mark of the stanza to make it 17-8.

Stierwalt then proceeded to add another field goal, this from 36 yards out, to make it 20-8 with 9:56 left in the game.

The final score of the night came with 7:27 left with Jim Carroll rushing in from the 12.

The Little Giants racked up a total of 214 yards with 163 coming on the ground. The purple and white defense held Marion to 57 rushing yards and 4-of-10 passing good for 88 yards.
