Late field goal helps Eagles nip Flyers

MONROEVILLE -Monroeville proved opportuntistic Friday night in keeping its record perfect at 3-0.

The Eagles, also unbeaten in the Firelands Conference at 2-0, cashed in on a pair of second half mistakes by Norwalk St. Paul for a 10-8 triumph.

"St. Paul had a heck of a game plan both offensively and defensively and we weren't sharp, for some reason," said Monroeville head coach Steve Ringholz.

After a scoreless defensive struggle the first half, Monroeville capitalized on a St. Paul mistake to take the lead.

With 3:19 left in the period, the Flyers were forced to a punting situation. The snap went over kicker Matt Camp's head and Jim Chupps recovered for Monroeville. Chris Pheiffer booted the conversion and a 7-0

But, it didn't take St. Paul long to counter the scoring after Todd Berry returned the kickoff from the 35 to midfield.

The Flyers opened the drive with three straight runs by quarterback Paul Myers for 21 total yards. Gary Sprague picked up 12 to the Monroeville 13 and followed with a nine-yard gain to the four-yard line.

On the last run, Sprague was injured and forced to leave the contest. His replacement, Chip Ward scooted in from four yards out with 11:43 left to play

Mark Volchek came on to boot the point after. Instead of trying to kick because of an injury, he tossed a two-point pass to wideopen Todd Berry as the Flyers went on top, 8-7.

And, there was no further scoring until late in the game. With 1:42 left to play, St. Paul faced a fourth-and-four at the

Monroeville 49. The Flyers decided to try for the first down with Jeff Nickoli making the necessary yardage only to fumble with Kevin Smith recovering.

On the next play, Smith passed 33 yards to Rich Landoll at the St. Paul 21. Another pass to Jason Collins was good for six yards as Monroeville moved to the Flyer 15.

After two incomplete passes, the Eagles went for the field goal and Pheiffer split the uprights from 32 yards away with 52 seconds to play for the game-winner.

"There were a couple key factors in the late going. Landoll made another key reception for us and we ran the two-minute offense after the defense got us the ball. Pheiffer had missed three field goal attempts last week and one earlier in the St. Paul game but he wasn't about to miss this one. The snap was perfect from Scott Steinmetz and Bart Colohan had a perfect hold, too," added Ringholz.

UPPER SANDUSKY — Upper Sandusky put on a display of ball-control Friday against

The hosts Rams ran off 67 offensive plays to only 37 for the Fliers on the way to a 22-6 win over the Sandusky Bay Conference representative.

Upper, a member of the Northern Ohio League, completely dominated the first half in scoring all of its points. The hosts had a 35-13 bulge in offensive plays before intermission in wearing down Clyde's defensive

Upper Sandusky, coming off an impressive 15-8 win over Fostoria last week (the same team that manhandled Tiffin Columbian Friday), had three long scoring drives.

Quarterback Tom Martin capped a 62-yard march in the opening period to score from the two on an option play. Kent McGuire kicked the PAT.

The surprising Rams, who were 0-10 a year ago, came back in the opening minute of the second quarter to score again. Martin climaxed a 67-yard drive with a one-yard plunge. The Rams added the two-point conversion when Martin passed to Nate Walton.

The score soared to 21-0 with 2:35 left in the half on a fleaflicker pass play. Wide receiver Jim Knapp wound up throwing an 18-yard touchdown pass to Jeff Swartz as the Rams caught Clyde's secondary by surprise. McGuire's kick completed the Rams' scoring.

Clyde, which managed 15 yards rushing and 89 yards in total offense, averted a shutout when Wendell Baker fired a 26-yard touchdown pass to Steve Miracle with 1:33 left in the

Clyde's passing game was ineffective. The losers connected on just 4 of 18 passes for 74 yards, and had three intercepted.

Upper featured a strong game which netted 183 yards, including 85 in 27 rushes by Ryan

Josh Bell then scored on a 39 yard jaunt followed by another Reiser to Regusa scoring pass to close out the scoring.


