

### No. 2 Miami tames No. 1 Oklahoma, 28-16

MIAMI (UPI)—Oklahoma Coach Barry Switzer said he doesn't want a rematch. He doesn't want to play Miami in the Orange Bowl Jan. 1, or ever again.

Switzer has had his fill of Miami, following the secondranked Hurricanes' 28-16 victory over the No. 1 Sooners Saturday. If Switzer has his way, the next time he sees Vinny Testaverde throw a pass

will be when the Miami quarterback joins the NFL next year.
"I don't want to play them again," Switzer said. "I never want to play them again.

"Miami is a great team. Testaverde is too good. They shouldn't stub their toe the rest of the way with the schedule they have.' Miami may not face another ranked team until Jan. 1. No. 20 Florida State is the only rated school remaining on the Hurricanes' schedule and the Seminoles will probably fall out of the Top 20 after

# McNeil sparks Browns victory

CLEVELAND (UPI)—Between 1952 and 1957, Detroit and Cleveland met four times for the NFL Championship.

The Lions won three of those games, the final coming on Dec 29, 1957, as Tobin Rote passed for four touchdowns in a 59-14 victory at Briggs Stadium

Since then, the Detroit-Cleveland tradition has been left on the sideline. Sunday's meeting, won 24-21 by Cleveland, was the first meeting in three years between the teams and only the third in 17

This game was hardly a clash of titans, but maybe it did provide a start of a tradition for us," said Browns head coach Marty Schot-

The big gun for Cleveland was its smallest player-5-foot-7, 146-pound Gerald McNeil, who returned a punt a team-record 84 yards for a touchdown to ignite a lethargic offense

"It felt great to make that return," said McNeil, nicknamed 'Ice Cube.' "I got the ball, I got the blocks, we got a touchdown and we

"After I scored, I found my fiancee (Paula Harris) in the stands and waved the football at her. She deserves credit for keeping my spirits high after my slow start. She's expecting our baby in May, and this is her first visit to Cleveland so we have a lot of reasons to

Matt Bahr added a decisive 24-yard field goal 4:01 into the fourth quarter, and the Browns won despite Lions quarterback Eric Hipple's three touchdown passes.

Hipple had a team record 33 completions of 48 passes for 251 yards but Detroit fell to 1-3

The Lions led in numerous categories—first downs (25-15), total yards (333-254) and time of possession (a whopping 40:10-19:50)—but could not capitalize despite an ironic fact that McNeil's run equalled the entire output of the Browns' rushing

attack.
"(McNeil's return) took a lot out of us because it gave them six quick points and our offense had to go back out with no rest," said Hipple. "My stats? They mean nothing if you lose and I'm much more concerned with that.

"We can't afford to lose like this. Our fans aren't exactly 100 percent behind us to begin with."

With the score tied 7-7 in the third quarter, Cleveland forced

Detroit to punt from the Lions 46. McNeil, the leading punt returner in the USFL with Houston last year before being signed by Cleveland, danced around a lunge by

Rob Rubick at the Browns 30 and cut back toward midfield Punter Mike Black moved to intercept McNeil at the 50, but the latter froze the Lions player with a head fake and sped into the end zone at 5:20 to electrify a Cleveland Stadium crowd of 72,029.

"The little guy beat us by himself," said Detroit coach Darryl Rogers. "He was exceptional and I'm not surprised since he had three touchdowns off punt returns (in two USFL seasons) As for

myself, I'm angry. We need to be more aggressive. 'Someone will have to step in and fill a leadership role. Once upon

a time, a Detroit-Cleveland game meant great football. That's what we have to strive for.'

The punt return was the longest for Cleveland since Bobby Mitchell had a 78-yard return for a touchdown against the New York Giants on Dec. 6, 1959.

Detroit answered with a 47-yard drive in nine plays, with Hipple tying the game 14-14 four seconds into the fourth quarter by flipping

a six-yard scoring toss to James Jones. Quarterback Bernie Kosar then marched Cleveland to the Detroit 6 before Bahr booted the field goal, his 39th straight from 30 yards or

The Browns' Curtis Dickey added his first touchdown in two years with a 1-yard run with 7:45 left. Hipple closed the scoring with 14

seconds remaining as he passed four yards to Carl Bland. The victory was costly to the Browns, as running back Kevin Mack re-injured his bruised left shoulder in the second quarter. He

finished with only 12 yards on four carries. Cleveland took a 7-0 lead 3:19 into the second quarter as Mack

fumbled at the Lions 2, but Brian Brennan fell on the ball in the end

Detroit roared back to tie the game 7-7 as Hipple threw his first touchdown of the year, a three-yarder to Leonard Thompson at
