

Scores late to best Port Clinton, 7-0

Clyde wins defensive duel

PORT CLINTON — If at first you don't succeed, try again.

And, that's exactly what Clyde head coach Bob Bishop did and it paid off handsomely for the first-year mentor.

The Fliers struck in the waning minutes of the game for a 7-0 victory over Port Clinton at True-Lay Stadium.

Originally, the game was scheduled for Friday night but was postponed with 4:37 left in the first period when a storm hit the area.

When action resumed Saturday, the two teams locked up in a defensive struggle and it appeared the contest was headed for overtime.

With just over three minutes left to play, however, Clyde junior defensive back Steve Miracle picked off a Doug Cooper pass at the Fliers 30 and came up with a 16-yard return to the 46.

After an incomplete pass,

Clyde senior quarterback Wendell Baker hooked up with junior Brian Chumley for a nine-yard gain and Baker came right back with three yards on a sneak for a first down at the PC 42.

With time winding down, Baker went up top again and found junior Dave Gregg wide open heading for the left sideline. The pass was right on target and Gregg streaked to paydirt as the Fliers broke the scoreless deadlock. Gregg added the conversion and Clyde held a 7-0 lead with 1:53 to play.

But, that didn't stop the host Redskins who roared back in the driving rainstorm.

Cooper completed passes of 13 yards to Lorne Searight and nine yards to Tom Sheppard for a first down at the 'Skins 42. A four-yard gain by John Crisologo and a nine-yard pickup by Cooper resulted in another first-and-ten at the Clyde 46.

Then, Cooper went to Scott Brewer for 24 yards and a first down at the Clyde 21.

However, disaster struck on the very next play as Crisologo fumbled after making the grab of a Cooper toss and Chumley recovered for the Fliers to stop the PC scoring drive.

"Gregg, while running a similar route, had been open twice in the first half but we missed connection. We just decided it would be a good time to go back to it. They (PC) started to cover Chumley and they had to miss an assignment as Dave was wide open and scored untouched," noted Bishop.

Also, it was the only catch of the day for Gregg.

"Boy, they (PC) sure have a tremendous defense and the two of us really battled back-and-forth. It was good to win one over them as they had beaten us in three straight heart-breakers," added Bishop.

Last year, the Redskins won by a 21-13 score and that came on the heels of a 27-22 win in 1984 and 14-7 triumph in 1983.

"The kids were really ready to go last night (Friday) and they came right back and played hard today. We had a couple of scoring opportunities but missed a pair of field goal attempts. But, it's sure good to be 2-0 in the SBC," added Bishop.

The Fliers, who share the SBC lead with Oak Harbor and Margaretta, are 3-2 overall while PC drops to 1-4 overall and 0-2 in the conference.

Clyde enjoyed most of its success through the air with Baker completing 13-of-24 passes with one interception for 205 yards. His favorite target was Miracle who caught five for 78 yards while Bruce Holmes grabbed two for 45 yards and Chumley nabbed three for 22.

Junior Gail Cunningham led the Fliers on the ground with 40 yards in six carries.

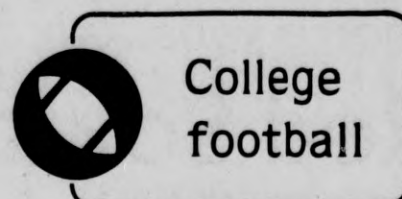
Clyde returns to conference action Friday, hosting Huron, while Port Clinton visits Edison.

Western holds off Monroeville

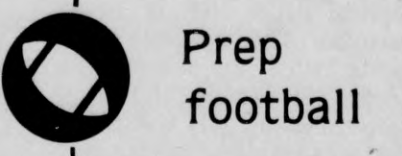
MONROEVILLE — Monroeville won the battle Saturday, but Western Reserve wound up winning the war.

Firelands Conference football game which was suspended Friday because of a violent lightning storm, the Eagles posted a 13-6 margin on the scoreboard.

However, Western had built a 16-0 lead Friday before play was called in the second quarter.

As a result, the Roughriders claimed a 22-13 victory to drop Monroeville out of first place in the conference and leave both teams with 2-1 records.

Monroeville's defense also did a much better job on Western's 175-pound senior halfback, Brennan Burke, when the game resumed.

But, once again, Burke had done the damage Friday when he rushed for 101 yards on just 8 carries in the first quarter alone...and scored twice.

The Eagles' defense limited Burke to a meager 33 yards on 12 additional carries after play was resumed, and the offense had complete control of the football.

However, the 16-0 deficit was too much to overcome.

Monroeville jumped back into the game with 13 points in the third period and ran off all but three offensive plays in the first 10½ minutes of the quarter.

Burke raced 25 yards to cap a 75-yard march following the opening kickoff Friday, then rambled 56 yards to paydirt with 24 seconds left in quarter. He also added the two-point conversion after the second score.

Monroeville came to life in the second half.

The Eagles struck for their first touchdown on the first play from scrimmage. Quarterback Kevin Smith went for the home run ball quickly, and hit slot-back Chris Pheiffer in the end zone for a touchdown covering 30 yards. The Eagles missed the two-point PAT and trailed 16-6.

Robinson truly one-man attack in Plymouth win

PLYMOUTH — Jason Robinson personally made sure Plymouth chalked up its first Firelands Conference victory Saturday.

The 152-pound senior split end scored three times on different type plays and accounted for all of the points in a 20-18 win over South Central.

The game started Friday, but was suspended because of lightning at the 6:19 mark of the second period.

Play resumed Saturday at 1:30 and again was suspended for 45 minutes because of an electrical storm.

When everything was said and done, both teams stand 1-3 in the conference and 2-3 overall.

Robinson's first touchdown came at the 4:59 mark of the first period when he picked off a South Central pass and raced 43 yards to paydirt. The kick failed and the hosts had a 6-3 lead.

South Central's Randy Kinney booted a 28-yard field goal at the 7:58 mark of the first quarter when the Trojans stalled after driving 54 yards in 9 plays following the opening kickoff.

Plymouth broke out to a 20-3 halftime lead, but had to hold off a late South Central surge which resulted in two touchdowns in the fourth period in a span of three minutes.

Robinson's second tally came with 4:50 to play in the first half. The Big Red lined up for an apparent field goal. Robinson was the holder. However, the ball came back to Robinson and he bolted two yards for the touchdown to cap an 18-yard drive in 4 plays after a South Central fumble.

Robinson struck again with just 14 seconds on the clock.

Quarterback Chuck Kosse fired a 27-yard scoring strike to Robinson, and the same combination worked for the two-point conversion to complete Plymouth's scoring. The hosts went 29 yards in just 3 plays following another interception.

South Central, victimized by 4 interceptions and two lost fumbles, cashed in on another unusual play.

Al Beekman recovered a Plymouth fumble, then latered to Mike Lowery and the latter dashed into the end zone to complete a 28-yard play with 9:12 left in the game. Lowery added the two-point PAT and it was 20-11.

Plymouth fumbled again, and South Central scored again with 6:10 remaining in the game. Greg Conaway hauled in a 19-yard touchdown pass from Beekman and Lowery booted the extra point to finish the scoring.

Robinson wasn't finished with his heroics.

The Trojans had one more chance to win, but Robinson picked off another pass to seal the victory.

The statistics favored the losers. South Central had 142 yards rushing and 59 passing with 11 first downs. Plymouth managed just 5 first downs and 122 yards in total offense, but was able to overcome two costly fumbles. The Big Red managed just two pass completions, but had no passes intercepted.

The hosts managed just 36 yards rushing and went to the air 37 times on the arm of Smith. They completed 14 for 189 yards, and the one score.

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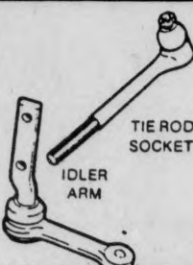
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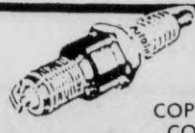
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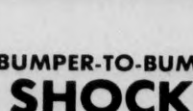
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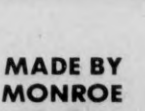
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
