CLEVELAND — The Ice Cube commeth — finally. USFL refugee Gerald McNeil

turned in one of the game's key plays as the Browns beat the Detroit Lions, 24-21, Sunday.

His 84-yard punt return was the longest in team history, breaking a 27-year- old record set by Hall of Famer Bobby Mitchell against the Giants (78

IT CAME at the right time for McNeil, who admittedly has been struggling. McNeil was the leading punt returner in the USFL in 1985 and had returned three for touchdowns.

"This is a high pressure job, but you've got to be able to control it" said McNeil, nicknamed the Ice Cube by teammate Jeff Gossett because McNeil is so slippery. And small (in stark contrast to "The Refrigerator," huge Chicago lineman William Perry).

He says he weighs 145 pounds, but privately he'll admit to being 138. Either way, he's the smallest player in the NFL.

"I've been having a tough time," he said.

"On his last kickoff return, I asked him what he was doing differently," said Coach Marty Schottenheimer. "He said, 'I'm letting some of those blocks happen.' I said, you're exactly

SUNDAY, HIS kickoff and punt returns were the Browns' biggest weapons until the effense came alive with 10 points in the fourth quarter. His record run wound up in

the west endzone where his fiancee Paula Harris was sitting. It was the first time she'd seen a football game in Cleveland and McNeil was waving the football and pointing to her.

"As I broke it, I only had the punter to beat," said McNeil. "I heard the crowd roar. It was the greatest sound I've ever heard and I thought, 'What a fantastic place to play.'"

"It was a return right," McNeil said. "The first two were to the left and I knew he'd try to kick it to his open inside (left). I got a short kick and it gave me time to set my blocks. I just try to make the first man miss, then you have a chance to break it."

"I needed this for my confidence," he said. "Once you have that, no one can stop you. I'm feeling a lot more comfortable now. I'm trying to slow myself down a half step for the blockers and then making my cut. My confidence started on the first kickoff return (29 yards)."

On the punt return, McNeil made a quick step to the right and broke down the right sidelines. He was virtually untouched with only one man - punter Mike Black left.

"I THOUGHT he'd better not tackle me," said McNeil. "I just gave him a move and they usually go for it." From then on he used his 4.4 speed to run away from the Lions. By the time he got to the Detroit 15 he raised his right hand (the ball was in his left) in triumph. When he got to the endzone, he ran through it - and pointed to his fiancee. The couple met in Houston

CLEVELAND—"Their player McNeil (Gerald) was exceptional today," Detroit Lions Coach Darryl Rogers praised after Sunday's 24-21 loss to the

"In fact, I felt the little guy (he weighs only 146 pounds) beat us himself. He was their main defense and offense."

The Browns' kick returner had 106 yards in punt returns, including a Cleveland-record 84 yards on a touchdown, and 54 yards in two kickoffs.

"The kicking game, all aspects of it, really hurt us. Our returns, their returns, our punts and other things. Defensively we did a good job. They only had 10 yards rushing through three quarters. But we repeatedly lost field position because of the kicking game."

EARLY IN THE GAME the Browns were going to settle for a field goal, but a roughing the kicker penalty gave Cleveland a first down and the hosts went on to score a touchdown. Then there was McNeil's long punt "You give them three points
