

Willard shocks Galion as Tiffin grabs piece of NOL

WILLARD — “We got a little bit of revenge this evening after last years game (Galion 48 - Willard 0),” stated coach Terry King as his Willard squad defeated Galion in overtime, 17-14.

This was King's first win over the Tigers in his four year stint as head coach and the Flashes first victory since the 1983 season when they won 16-14 under coach Terry Toth.

“I can't say enough about Billy (Robinson). He had another outstanding game. His efforts make it easy to call the plays,” he added.

Willard broke the ice early in the second period as Robinson scored from the seven and with the Chris Elminger extra point it was 7-0 with 10:20 on the clock.

The Tigers tied it up at the 4:22 mark as Mike Dallas bulled in from the one. Steve Staton added the equalizer to make it 7-7.

Galion grabbed the lead for the first time at the 4:22 mark of the third period as Jeff Pennington scored from the three. Staton converted making it 14-7.

The Crimson Flashes scored on the first play of the final stanza with Robinson getting his 11th

touchdown of the season. It came from one yard out. Elminger's kick knotted the score at 14.

The defensive squads then controlled the rest of the contest as Galion's closest penetration was the Willard 28. The Flashes had their final drive of regulation bog down at the Galion 30 with an incomplete pass falling into the end zone at the final gun.

In the overtime Willard's score came on a 4th and 5 on the 16 as Elminiger booted home a 32 yard field goal to provide the victory.

“I felt very good about Chris's chances on the winning field goal. There was no doubt in my mind. I told him to go get the victory, and he did,” said King.

“At the half I told the defensive unit they were playing an excellent game and if they would give us another 24 minutes of that kind of play we could win the game. They did just that,” concluded King.

Robinson finished the game with 141 yards rushing. This raised the junior's season mark to 968 yards in eight games.

Willard (4-4, 3-2) now travels to Bellevue to face the Redman who support the number two rusher in the league in Ed Haynes who has recorded 927 yards and 10 touchdowns.

Galion (5-3, 3-2) entertains Upper Sandusky on Friday.

Bellevue 18 Bucyrus 7

BELLEVUE — Bellevue (6-2, 3-2) scored 12 first period points on their way to an 18-7 NOL win over Bucyrus.

This was the 15th straight win for Bellevue over Bucyrus with the last Bucyrus win coming in 1971 when they won 14-0 over a Lowell Shaffer team.

Scott Shaver got the Redman on the board at the 9:08 mark with a one-yard run and when the kick failed it was 6-0.

Ed Haynes, who was the games leading rusher with 104 yards in 13 tries, scored his first touchdown on the receiving end of a 23-yard pass play from quarterback John Oddo.

Bucyrus (4-4, 2-3) tallied late in the third stanza as Jeff Fisher hit Matt Caldwell with a five-yard scoring pass at the 1:09 mark. Ryan Zellner converted to make it 12-7.

Bellevue's final score came on a 58-yard run by Haynes with 2:37 left in the game.

Bellevue finished with 232 total yards with 151 coming on the ground and 81 up above on 4-of-11.

Bucyrus ended the night with 181 total yards with 118 coming on the ground. They hit on 7-of-17 in the passing department for 63 yards.

Bellevue's next encounter is against Willard while Bucyrus is at home against Tiffin Columbian who clinched at least a share of the title on Friday evening with a 24-7 over Shelby.

U. Sandusky 18 Norwalk 14

UPPER SANDUSKY — Upper Sandusky had to come from behind late in the final quarter in order to register an 18-14 win over Norwalk.

The Rams scored first at the 3:17 mark of the opening period as Jarrod Orians scored from one-yard out.

The Rams tallied next early in the second half as with 11:29 on the clock Ryan Frey scored on a nifty 59-yard run. The extra point try failed and it was 12-0.

The Truckers scored two quick touchdowns later in the same quarter to vault into the lead 14-12.

Joey Thomas fired a 37-yard scoring pass to Matt Taylor and with the Xavier Duncell point from placement, the Truckers were within five, 12-7 with 3:55 on the clock.

TIFFIN — Tiffin Columbian gained at least a tie of the Northern Ohio League crown Friday as they bested Shelby 24-7.

The Tornados now support a perfect 8-0 mark and stand 5-0 in the league with just two games to play. Bellevue, Galion and Willard all support 3-2 league marks.

The victory should help Tiffin maintain at least their second spot in Division II - Region Six computer standings as they trailed first place Cleveland Benedictine by just 2.47 points.

The Tornados were also ranked second this past week in the UPI Division II standings. Once again it is Cleveland Benedictine leading the division, 55 poll points over Tiffin.

Ben Fogle opened the scoring in the first quarter with a three-yard run and with the Matt Ash point from placement it was 7-0. Ash extended the lead to 10-0 with a 20 yard field goal in the second quarter.

In the stanza it was Duane Tyree scoring from the three and with the Ash kick it was 17-0.

Monroeville avoids Mapleton upset bid

NOVA — It certainly looked bleak for Monroeville Friday night.

After all, Mapleton raced from the gate to claim an 18-0 lead early in the second period and was also on top by a 24-7 count later on.

But, coach Steve Ringholz's Eagles rallied from the big deficit, eventually going ahead in the final period en route to a 35-24 win.

Thus, Monroeville retained a one-game lead over Western Reserve, a 38-0 winner over Ashland Crestview, in the Firelands Conference race.

The Eagles, eighth-ranked in the latest UPI Division V ratings, remained unbeaten at 8-0, 6-0 in the FC, while Mapleton falls to 4-4 overall, 3-3 in the conference.

Scoring runs of 90 yards by Bill Rutherford and six yards by Clint Hickey staked Mapleton to a 12-0 lead in the first period.

And, Jerry Krause helped the Mounties go ahead by an 18-0 score after returning a Kevin Smith interception 17 yards to paydirt.

Monroeville finally got on track later in the second period as Chris Gies hauled in a 38-yard touchdown pass from Kevin Smith, the first of three he threw in the contest.

Hickey came right back for Mapleton, bursting over the goalline from three yards away as the Mounties led, 24-7.

From that point on, it was all Eagles.

Smith plunged in from one yard away and tossed to Jason Collins for the conversion as the Mapleton lead dwindled to 24-15 by intermission.

The Eagles continued to inch closer following a three-yard scoring run by Jerry Morrow in the third period, drawing within two points (24-22).

Then, the conference leaders forged ahead for the first time in the game when Mike Lindenberg scooted in from eight yards out early in the fourth period.

And, the Eagles added insurance later on as Jeff Hales scored on a 10-yard pass from Smith with Lindenberg adding his third extra point of the game.

Just three yards separated the teams in total offense with Monroeville having 339 including 224 through the air as Smith went 16-of-27 with one in-

terception. The Mounties had 336 total yards, 249 coming on the ground.

W-Reserve 38 Crestview 0

ASHLAND — Western Reserve remained on the heels of conference leader Monroeville following a 38-0 rout of Ashland Crestview.

The Roughriders, 7-1 overall and 5-1 in the FC, scored in every quarter of the contest as the hosts fell to 2-4 in the conference, 2-6 overall.

Dane Burke got the Roughriders going in the first period, hauling in a 48-yard scoring toss from Chad Fairchild. Todd Eungard added the PAT for a 7-0 lead.

Then, Eungard broke loose on a 64-yard touchdown run which was his 11th TD in conference play and Burke ran the conversion as the lead moved to 15-0.

And, it was 21-0 at intermission after Fairchild had scored from two yards away in the second period.

In the third period, a four-yard run by Kevin Campbell and a 2-yard pass from Fairchild to Danny Thomas helped the Roughriders increase their lead to 35-0.
