Injuries take toll, Vermilion bows to Lorain

LORAIN — Vermilion's ability to keep opponents off the scoreboard is predicated on two things...solid defensive play and a ball-control type offense.

The Sailors lost their top two tailbacks Friday and it proved to be too much to overcome in their Erie Shore Conference clash with Lorain Senior.

With Dennis Washington running rampant, the Steelmen inflicted a 30-21 defeat on the Sailors to foil any hope coach Ralph Mayer's veteran club had of qualifying for the Division II playoffs.

Washington exploded for 208 yards on 24 carries and caught a 44-yard touchdown pass in officially eliminating Vermilion from the conference title

"We use out tailbacks a lot in our offense and Jeff Weaver went down on the first play and Ryan Wilson was forced out later. We had to go with our third tailback who is a jayvee player. We rely so much on the tailbacks in hoping to control the football," Mayer said after the third loss in nine games.

"We realize the playoffs are out of the question now, but I know we have an excellent group of seniors who will come back next week against Sandusky and give it everything they have. Lorain is a vastly improved football team and Dennis Washington is truly an outstanding back," Mayer said.

"Hey, we were still in the game and had a chance to tie the score with 31/2 minutes to play, but we missed an extra point that would have enabled us to get even. The kick had plenty of distance, but it just went wide.

'Last year when we went to the playoffs everything seemed to go our way and this year it isn't. You have to be lucky as well as good in this game,' Mayer noted.

Lorain took an 8-0 lead on quarterback Shawn Reardon's 10-yard run early in the second period, but Vermilion knotted the score at 8-8 by halftime.

Quarterback Pete Shimrock, who had three touchdown passes for the Sailors, clicked with Marcus Jurado for the first one covering nine yards. Shimrock also hit Brian Wilson for the twopoint conversion to even the

"We get the second half kickoff and march right down the field and go up 15-8. Pete threw a touchdown pass for four yards to Chris Randall and Mike Surrento booted the extra point. We were in good shape at this point, but Washington got away from us twice and Lorain moved back on top," Mayer recalled.

Washington hauled in a 44-yard scoring strike from Reardon, then bolted over for the two-point PAT and Lorain was in front 16-15.

Washington returned early in the final stanza to rip off a 68-yard touchdown run, but Lorain missed the extra point and it was a 22-15 game.

The Sailors struck for their third touchdown of the game when Shimrock tossed an 11-yard strike to Randall and it was now 22-21. However, the try

for the extra point was no good. 'We were deep in our own territory with time running out and we had to try to pass to get another score on the board. They picked off one of Pete's passes and Washington then runs 24 yards for his third touchdown and they again get the two points on the PAT to put the game on ice," Mayer concluded.

Lorain had 415 yards in total offense, including 299 rushing and 116 passing. Vermilion, which picked off three interceptions and recovered two Lorain fumbles, had a good night in the running department despite the

Weaver suffered an ankle injury after gaining 14 yards on his lone carry of the game, and Wilson was bothered by a gimpy ankle before the contest, then reinjured it after taking over for Weaver who came into the battle with 648 yards rushing and 8 touchdowns to his credit.



The Eagles finished with 356 total yards as they added 100 yards on the ground to Smith's total of 256

Monroeville will be shooting for their first undefeated season since 1978, which was Ringholz's first year at the helm, as the Eagles close out at home against Crestview.

Monroeville finished that campaign with a 9-0-1 mark. It was a 0-0 tie with Edison in the fifth game that spoiled their attempt for a perfect 10-0 season.

'Cats assured of winning season

PLYMOUTH - New London cemented its first winning season in seven years Friday with a 16-13 Firelands Conference victory over host Plymouth in a wild fourth

The Wildcats suffered through a six-year record of 13-42-3 after a fine 7-2-1 season in 1980 under Paul Nestor. Included were 0-10 marks in 1982 and 1985.

Coach Joe Studer's veteran club scored twice on pass interception returns against the Big Red to improve its record to 6-3 overall and 5-2 in the conference with the nod. Studer had a 3-7 log in his first season a year

New London had a 6-0 lead after three quarters of play in a defensive struggle. However, it was a much different story in the final 12 minutes.

The only touchdown in the first 36 minutes came suddenly.

Plymouth quarterback Chuck Kosse's pass from deep in his own territory sailed into the arms of New London's Bob Wilson who dashed 29 yards into the end zone on the return which came with 3:29 left in the second quarter.

New London had another touchdown nullified in the opening seconds of the fourth period after driving 71 yards in 19

marched 57 yards in six plays after the kickoff. Plymouth regained possession four minutes later, but Kosse

threw his second interception of the contest, and again the Wildcats turned the theft into an immediate six points. Bill Radcliff was the villain this time and raced 49 yards to paydirt. Ash's kick gave the Wildcats a 16-7 lead with 5:02 left in the

New London got the ball back and ran valuable time off the clock before Plymouth took over on downs with less than one minute to play.

Kosse dropped back on the first play and found Fletcher racing between two defenders. The pass was on the money and Fletcher wound up dashing 76 yards to score. The kick failed and the scoring was complete.

Plymouth had the statistics in its favor. The Big Red had 240 yrds in total offense to 112 for the Wildcats, and they passed for 173 yards to 67 for the winners.

However, the Big Red had four turnovers, and two interceptions resulted in 13 New London points. Plymouth dropped to 3-4 in the Firelands and 4-5 overall.
