PLYMOUTH - Western Reserve put together a strong second (26 points) and fourth quarter (13 points) on its way to a 45-0 Firelands Conference


The win was the Rider's fourth of the season and their second straight in the league.

Western's Todd Eungard scored the first touchdown of the night as with 5:14 left in the opening period he rushed in from the three. It was an eight play 60-yard drive that made it


Eungard then went to work again as he scored three of the four Rider six-pointers in the second stanza. They came on runs of 8, 9, and 4 yards.


