### Rains give Hershier 2nd chance


Chicago Tribune NEW YORK — Rivalry? What rivalry?

## Tigers register second straight shutout

# Defense leads Huron again

CLYDE — Huron has gained a reputation for a high-powered offense, but the story of the 1988 season is on the defensive side of the ball.

The Tiger defense stopped Clyde twice inside the Huron 10 and registered their second straight shutout, 8-0, in Sandusky Bay Conference action Fri-

day.
"I'm not surprised by the defense because they've been doing it week in and week out,' said Huron coach Tony Legan-

"It's not that I enjoy this, but we can play ball control because of the defense. Maybe we should have even gone to it earlier," Legando continued.

The win, coupled with St. Mary's loss to Perkins, pushes Huron into sole possession of first place in the SBC with a perfect 3-0 record. The Tigers are 3-3 on the season.

"We're sitting pretty in the conference," said Legando. "We're right where we want to

The Fliers fall for the first time in three conference outings and are now 3-3 on the sea-

son. "Clyde is a scrappy team," Legando said. "They were well-prepared and a good team in the pits. They will fist-fight you and I mean that as a compli-

ment." Huron got the game's only score on the opening drive.

Jeff Faflik started the drive by taking the kickoff 35 yards to the Clyde 49. Eight plays later, Scott Johnson went over from the three, and then hit Barry Esposito on the two-point conversion try.

The Fliers got their first chance inside the Huron 10 in the second quarter when the snap on a Tiger punt that sailed over Don Iscman's head. Clyde took over on downs at the Huron 13.

Troy Newsome picked up seven yards on the first play, but the Tigers stopped Jim Kramer on the next play for no gain. The Fliers followed with a pair of incomplete passes and returned the ball to Huron.

"We know from experience that when you get down inside the 10. Huron is tough on the run," said Clyde coach Bob Bishop. "We knew we had to throw the ball. The plays were there but we didn't execute well."

The Tigers were close to a score at the end of the first half, moving the ball inside to the Clyde 12 with 27 seconds remaining.

Esposito pulled down a Johnson passed on second-and-10, but was ruled out of the endzone. Huron followed with a three-yard gain by Gary Dowell and the drive stalled two plays later after two passes fell incomplete.

Clyde got its second chance

inside the Huron 10 after Duke Fultz recovered a Tiger fumble at the Huron 39.

The Fliers faced a fourthand-two at the six and Mike Carter's pass to Cory Distel fell incomplete to end the threat.

The Tigers opened the fourth quarter by driving to the Clyde seven, but Johnson's pass was incomplete on fourth-and-five to give the ball back to the

"We dropped a few passes," said Legando. "We had a couple of guys open and missed a few in crunch time but the kids get to feeling they'e learned the system so you've got to go back and stress fundamentals."

Clyde answered the Huron scoring chance by eating up nearly seven minutes on a 19play drive which stalled at the Huron 31. The big play for the Tigers came on a Clyde clipping penalty which nullfied a big gain by Johnny Montgom-

"Penalties have been a bug-a-boo for us this season," Bishop said. "We didn't have as many penalties this time, but they came at inopportune

Len Broughton led Huron by pounding out 55 yards in 16 carries. The Tigers had a total of 121 yards on the ground.

"Len Broughton is what you look for in a football player," said Legando. "It's not his size or speed, but his desire."

Johnson completed seven passes in 20 attempts for 84 yards but threw three intercep-

"We had the backs beat, but the balls were underthrown,' said Legando. "Scott would be the first one to tell you that but I'd rather look at the things we did well and work at the things we didn't do so well."

Newsome was the game's leading ground gainer with 95 yards in 19 carries, while Kramer had 33 yards in 11 tries. Carter was 5 of 16 for 37 yards and an interception.

Clyde returns to action Friday at Margaretta while Huron travels to Strobel Field on Saturday to face St. Mary's Central Catholic.

# Miracle finish for Oak Harbor stuns Margaretta
