Rothhaar erases Willard receiving records

NORWALK — Chris Rothhaar's sensational performance reached the Willard football recordbook Friday night in Nowalk.

The 185-pound split end caught at least one pass in each of the Flashes' five scoring drives on the way to a lopsided 32-0 win over hapless Norwalk which dressed just 21 players.

Coach Terry King's club scored the first four times they had the ball in the first half and built a 25-0 lead, then added another score in the third quar-

ter to post their sixth win in seven games.

They are still one gme behind Northern Ohio League Galion, unbeaten in seven games and 4-0 in the league.

Rothhaar wound up the night with eight receptions for 219 yards, but just one for a touchdown. Both the eight catches and the 219 yards are single-game receiving marks for the Huron County school. He also has a single season record of 34 catches.

Willard took the opening

kickoff and drove 62 yards in 14 plays with Kevin Hicks going the final yard. Rothhaar has two receptions on passes from Matt Harwood, for 17 and 16 yards.

The next time Willard had the ball, Mel Parson reeled off a 34-yard scoring jaunt on the third play. The drive covered 65 yards and Harwood connected on a 27-yard strike to Rothhaar. Chris Long kicked the PAT.

It was 19-0 95 seconds later. Norwalk punted to the Willard 22. On the first play, Harwood found Rothhaar uncovered and hit the talented receiver who ran the last 45 yards untouched to complete a 78-yard play.

With 3:27 remaining in the half, Hicks again bulled in from the one to cap a 49-yard march in five plays. Again, Rothhaar caught a pass covering 38 yards to the Norwalk 11.

Willard's final score came on another long drive in which Rothhaar had catches of 25 and six yards before Parson bolted the final 13.

Oddly enough, the Flashes were 8 of 10 in the air for 219 yards, all from Harwood to Rothhaar.




Tiffin 35 U. Sandusky 7
