

Second half surge helps Monroeville foil upset bid

GREENWICH — South Central tried to end Monroeville's 21-game winning streak one week after finishing off its own 20-game losing skid.

And the Trojans were able to gain a 7-6 lead at the half.

But the Eagles were not quite ready to stop their winning ways, putting up 16 third-quarter points to pull away for a 29-15 victory in Firelands Conference action Friday.

"In the second half, we did a nice job executing our offense," said Monroeville coach Steve Ringholz. "And our defense didn't allow South Central's passing game to control the tempo."

"We felt going in that we needed to take away their long passing game and I was real happy with our ability to do that."

The Eagles are now 2-0 on the season, while South Central falls to 1-1.

"I think we tried a little bit too hard, and when you do that, you start to forget things," said

South Central coach Scott Valentine. "We're not satisfied with just playing with them."

Monroeville opened the scoring late in the first quarter when Rick Bryant bulled over from the one.

The Trojans answered the score with a 14-yard touchdown pass from Ryan Teglovic to Mike Sanders with 4:03 left in the half, and Calvin Conway added the extra point to give the squad the lead.

Monroeville regained the lead on a 1-yard plunge from Bryant, and then tacked on the two-point conversion on Sean Smith's run. Three minutes later, the winners put the game out of reach when Smith hit John Anderson on a 19-yard scoring strike.

The Eagles added the two-point conversion on a pass from Smith to Jeff Camp to make it 22-7.

PLYMOUTH — Norwalk St. Paul bounced back from last week's season-opening loss to St. Mary's Central Catholic with a convincing nod over Plymouth Friday night, 34-6.

The Flyers, 1-1, struck for a score in the opening period before breaking the game open with three touchdowns in the second quarter to gain a 27-0 halftime lead.

And, both teams hit paydirt once in the second half of the Firelands Conference opener.

Senior quarterback Greg Rogers was on target early, hooking up with Mike Davis for a 59-yard score in the opening 12 minutes of play. Larry Fisher booted the PAT and the lead was up to 7-0.

It was the first of four touchdown passes thrown by Rogers in the game as he completed 7

of 14 passes for 151 yards and suffered just one interception.

And, the Flyers were clicking on the ground, too.

In fact, they picked up 211 yards on the ground with Craig Coe leading the way with 23 carries for 159 yards.

It was Coe who scored the second touchdown of the game for the Flyers on a 22-yard scamper to the end zone.

And, St. Paul added two more scores through the air before halftime. Rogers found John Wasiniak for a 9-yard touchdown and came right back with a 29-yard toss to Davis. Fisher converted after both scores for the 27-0 lead at intermission.

The lead grew to 34-0 when Rogers fired a strike of 26 yards to Wasiniak and Fisher added the PAT in the third period.

Plymouth, 1-1, avoided the shutout in the final period when Steve Power broke loose for a 55-yard burst to the end zone.

Tigers need 12 to turn back Indians

DETROIT (UPI) — When a pitcher whose team can't score him any runs works against a team that can't score for anybody the result is predictable — extra innings.

Gary Pettis, who had driven in just 11 runs all season, lined an RBI single to right center with the bases loaded and two out in the 12th Friday night to enable the Detroit Tigers to break a 12-game losing streak with a 2-1 victory over the Cleveland Indians.

Though Detroit had lost 12 straight times, never leading after the sixth in any of the games, Cleveland started hard luck pitcher Bud Black.

The Indians' lefty was just two outs from being shut out for the fourth time this year when Joe Carter belted his 29th home run. Still, the home run meant Cleveland has scored just one run for Black in five of his starts.

"It's tough right now," Black said. "But you've got to give credit to the other guys that we're playing. Frank Tanana pitched a great game and their relievers did a great job."

"My job is to try to give up as few runs as possible. That's

any pitcher's job. I'm solely concerned with holding the opposition down."

The Tigers came into the game with 17 scoreless innings behind them and quickly ran it to 22 before busting out with a one-run rally. They still have only three runs in their last 29 innings.

"Sometimes you're not allowed any mistakes," Tanana said. "I made one and it cost me a win. I got a pitch to Carter out over the plate — not far enough away or low enough."

The two teams combined for just 10 hits in the game (two for extra bases) and 18 strikeouts.

It looked like the game might go on forever when Chet Lemon struck out to begin the 12th. But Fred Lynn walked and pinch-runner Mike Brumley raced to third when Mike Heath grounded an 0-1 pitch to left for a hit an run single.

Dave Bergman pinch-hit and was walked intentionally to load the bases before Doug Jones, 6-8, struck out light-hitting Doug Strange for the second out. Pettis then lined a 1-2 pitch to right center to end the game.

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
