Ten More Indy Spots Available

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — Thirty or more 10-mile qualifying runs probably will be made Saturday or Sunday in attempts to win the last 10 open spots in the 33-car lineup for the Golden Anniversary 500-mile auto race May 30.

None of the unqualified drivers have shown any threats to the qualifying average of 165.899 m.p.h. made last Saturday by Italian-born Mario Andretti. Most of them would be satisfied with a strong 158.

All but three of last weekend's 23 qualifiers bettered 159, but only a few of the unqualified have been in that bracket. They include rookie Carl Williams of Kansas City, who was running better than 160 before he crashed Saturday in missing an out-of-control car. He was practicing at nearly 159 Thursday in the repaired Dayton Gerhardt-Ford.

Cassius Clay Predicting 'Clean' KO

LONDON (AP) — World heavyweight champion Cassius Clay claims he will knock out Henry Cooper in their May 21 title fight at London's Arsenal Soccer Stadium.

"I will knock Cooper cold with a good, clean punch," he told newsmen Monday.

Clay stopped Cooper with cut eyes in the fifth round of their previous London fight in 1963.

Asked if he planned to cut up Cooper again, Clay retorted: "I do not deliberately cut people. Cooper is too nice a man for me even to think of such a thing."

Clay put in six devastating rounds with sparring partner Jimmy Ellis at his White City Stadium gym Monday.

Cincinnati Reds Seek Even Break

CINCINNATI (AP) — The Cincinnati Reds hope to even their record of victories and defeats at the expense of the St. Louis Cardinals who are coming to Crosley Field tonight to begin a three-game series.

The Reds came home Thursday with a 14-15 record after winning seven of eight games on their road trip. Their final game at New York was rained out.

"I'm sidetracking (Jim) O'Toole for a couple of days," said Manager Don Heckner. "It will be (Milt) Pappas Friday night and (Jim) Maloney Saturday, with O'Toole a good possibility to work next Sunday afternoon."

Both Maloney and Pappas won two games during the road trip.

Going into weekend action, Miami holds a shaky lead with 30½ points while Bowling Green has 28, Western 21 and Ohio U. last year's Reese Cup winner, 20½. Then comes Kent with 17½ Toledo 11½ and Marshall 8.

BG dash star Henry Williams is the favorite in the 100 and 200 and the Falcons could prevail again in the 440-yard and mile relay events. The Falcons other strong threats are distance runner Bob Parks and long jumper Mike Weger.

The Broncos boast a flock of outstanding performers including Paul Seeley in the pole vault, Chuck LeMon and Ron Stratton in the 120-yard high hurdles; Clay Leek in the 440 intermediate and Ralph Stephenson in the 880. All but LeMon are defending champs.

Kent has a formidable array of stars headed by Sam Bair, the Golden Flash's one mile, two mile and three mile king.

Kent also has threats in Marty Eisner in the discus and shot; Denny Steele in the pole vault and Norm Curry in the high jump.

Miami banks heavily on distance men Jack Bachelor and Dave Bartel, hurdler Jim Sibold, sprinter Ray Kress, high jumper Ted Downing and Steve Brubaker in the 440.

Toledo's chief hopes lie with Aaron Hopkins in the long jump and Moses Newsome in the dash events while Ohio U. looks to John Tillman in the 880 and Emmett Taylor in the 440.
