Brother Act Shines in 61st Relays

Seven-Foot Barrier Pierced

By JERRY LISKA DES MOINES. Iowa (AP) - Texas A & M, led by the speedy Mills Brothers and busy Rocke Woods, dominated the 61st Drake Relays which roared to a finish Saturday with seven new meet marks and a two - day total of 14, plus a world 880 relay record.

In the windup at Drake University stadium before a sun - splashed, wind - swept crowd of 17,500, Texas A & M grabbed two more baton title and blazed to a meet record 40.0 victory in the 440 - yard relay.

The Aggies, who Friday set a world 880 mark of 1:21.7, wound up with three of the eight major baton titles. Rice took two titles, Saturday winning the university spring medley and mile relay crowns.

The day's 21 - final windup also produced new Drake records in six individual events, including a snappy 4:01.4 mile victory by Rex Maddaford of Eastern New Mexico and a 16-634 pole vault triumph by Brigham Young's Altii Alarotu, Finnish Ölympian.

Onlt double winner of the two - day meet was distance star Jack Bachelor of the Florida track Club, who repeated a 1969 sweep of the three - mile and six - mile runs. Bachelor Saturday crossed the six - mile finish line hand - in - hand with teammate Jack Shorter.

Drake's seven - foot barrier in the high jump was pierced for the first time as Ray McGill of Kansas State cleared 7-1.

The only two other defending champions besides Bachelor also retained titles. Missouri's Mel Gray won the 100 in a windslackened 9.5 to complete a Texas - Kansas - Drake Relays sweep in the century. The other repeater was shot - putter Karl Salb of Kansas with a toss of 63-914.

Although Curtis Mills. NCAA 440 champ, anchored Friday's 880 world record relay effort by Texas A & M. Woods ran on all three victorious Aggie Baton teams including Saturday's 480 - yard shuttle hurdles foursome.


In the college division, Texas Southern won three of the six relays events, Saturday adding the 440 and sprint medley titles to the 880 crown won Friday.

Other new Drake marks Saturday came in the marathon, hammer throw and 3,000 m e t e r steeplechase. won by Jerome Liebenberg of Western Michigan with an 8:54.6 clocking for the jump and run grind.

Arkansas State's Tom Hill matched the Drake 120 high hurdles record of 13.6.

Villanova Sweeps To Five Victories

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Villanova, the only team to win five relay races in the 76 - year history of the Penn Relays, did it Saturday for the third straight year. The Wildcats added the mile, two - mile, four - mile and sprint medley to Friday's distance medley triumph.

While Villanova dominated the distance races, it had to share honors with meet record breaking teams of Texas -El Paso in the 440 and 880 - yard relays. In all, six records were broken in the two - day meet, with UTEP's Vince Monari the only individual double winner. Monari took the discus and shot put.

Coach Jim Elliott's Villanova runners capped Saturday's performance with a 3:07.9 victory in the mile relay, last even on the 132 event program which featured more than 7,000 athletes. Hardge Davis, Greg Govan, Lamotte Hyman and the mighty burner, Olympian Larry James, led all the way to win by six yards over Rutgers, with Tennessee third. James ran a 46 flat anchor leg.

GOOD LEG

About an hour earlier, Villanova won the two - mile over UTEP with the help of a 1:48.1 anchor leg by Marty Liquori. Liquori, who anchored the winning distance medley and four - mile teams, was a yard back when he took the baton. On the turn into the backstrech he gained the lead and won by seven yards. Villanova was clocked in 7:28.1.

UTEP's attempt to challenge Villanova in the distance events fell far short, but the sprinters from the Texas school lived up to their clippings. Harrington Jackson, Mike Fray, Paul Gibson and Clyde Glosson ran a record 40.1 in the 440 they also did it in the qualifying race Friday, and turned in new mark of 1:23.3 in the 880. The Texans beat Johnson C. Smith in the 440, and Ohio State in the half - mile.
