The 16th North-South high school basketball classic will be played Saturday, June 14 at the Marion Coliseum.

The Southerners hold an 8-7 edge, gaining that margin with a 73-70 victory last year. The South has won five of the last six games.

Wynford's Tim Steinhilber, 6-3, 190, will be a member of the North team, which will include stars Phil Hubbard of Canton McKinley, Dave Heck of New Philadelphia, Fred Balser of Elyria, John McCullough of Lima Senior, Fred Davis of Barberton, Greg Cobb of Olmsted Falls, Truman Claytor of Toledo Scott, Kevin Appel of Fairview and John Williams of Warsaw River View.

Headliners of the South squad are Jim Paxson and Bob Schaefer of Dayton Kettering Alter and Fred Poole of Columbus Mohawk.

The stars will be reporting to the Coliseum Sunday to begin daily workouts. The coaches' clinic will be held the morning of the game at Marion Harding High School. Coach Ron Barbo of Mansfield St. Peter's will begin the clinic, speaking on "Offense against the Full Court Press" and Matchup Press Defense."

Ashland's Eagles Play in Nationals

ASHLAND — Ashland College, finishing among the top 13 teams in the last three national college-division golf championships, has accepted an invitation to the first NCAA Division III Golf Championships to be held in Clarksville, Tenn., June 10-13.

Dr. Fred Martinelli, Director of the Division of Health, Physical Education, Athletics and Intramurals at Ashland College, accepted the invitation on behalf of the institution.

Gary Praht, in his first year as golf coach, guided the Eagles to the championship in the Indiana-Purdue Invitational and the top five in four other tournaments.

Praht said, "We are extremely pleased to be invited. It is an honor to again represent the college and this district. If we play up to our potential, we should place in the top five in the nation. We really haven't played up to our potential however."

The top Ashland golfers this season have been Senior Kim Mansfield of Mansfield with a 77.0-stroke average and Junior Rob Herron of Washington Court House with 77.6. Senior Terry Evans of North Canton has fired a 79.2 this campaign while Sophomore Jack Rendlesham

of Lyndhurst has tallied an 80.1 and freshman Tym Smithett of Elyria an 81.1.

Praht feels that the College of Wooster and Chico State (Calif.) should be definite contenders for the championship. Wooster has beaten Ashland three times this season while Ashland has won once and tied the Scots in another outing.

Ashland finished eighth in 1972, 12th in 1973 and 13th in 1974.

Ambitious Schedule

KENT (AP) — Kent State University says its 1975-1976 basketball schedule, which opens with a game against Notre Dame Nov. 29, is one of the most ambitious and challenging in the school's history.

Basketball Coach Rex Hughes said the 26-game schedule approved this week includes some of the strongest teams in the nation. South Carolina, Illinois, Bradley and Penn State are among the Golden Flashes' foes.

After the opener at Notre Dame, Kent plays six straight games on the road before returning home to entertain Delaware State Dec. 19.

She also received the most valuable in field events award, Vickie Briner, who tied the 220-yard dash record of 30.1, received the most valuable in running events award.

Stephenson cleaned up all the hardware in the baseball awards. Along with the MVP, he received awards for being the top pitcher and hitter.

His .552 batting average and seven home runs are tops in Lucas history. He fanned 54 foes in 51 innings and had a 2.28 earned run average.

Sophomore Randy Foss received the Most Valuable Track Team Member award as well as the most valuable in running events award after setting one record and tying another. He set the quarter-mile mark at 52.4 and tied the 100-yard dash record of 10.4. He qualified to the district in two events and accumulated the most points in Lucas history for a single season with 230. The Mid-Buckeye Conference 440 champion was undefeated in regular season dual and triangular meets.

Bruce Davis received the award for being most valuable in field events.

King Ace Inks Pact

BOWLING GREEN (UPI) — Tommy Harris, a former Lorain Admiral King All-Ohio basketball star, has signed a letter of intent to attend Bowling Green State University. Coach Pat Haley said.

Harris, a 6-4 guard who was second team All-American and the leading scorer on the Vincennes, Ind., Junior College basketball team, averaged 24 points a game last season to break the school's single-season scoring record held by Bob McAdoo, now playing with the Buffalo Braves of the National Basketball Assn.

Dayton Signs Kettering Ace

DAYTON (AP) — Jim Paxson of Kettering Alter signed with the University of Dayton to play basketball under a grant-in-aid program.

Paxson, a 6-foot-5 forward, averaged 20.7 points a game last season, leading Alter to a 24-1 season. The team lost to Columbus Linden McKinley in the state semifinals.

Wisconsin Club Tops Star Squad

CHICAGO (UPI) — Michigan's Big Ten champion baseball team and runnerup Iowa each placed two players on the all-conference team chosen by the league coaches. Fifth-place Wisconsin landed three players.

Named from the Wolverines were First Baseman Randy Hackney and Pitcher Chuck Rogers while Iowa's representatives were Third Baseman Brad Trickey and Pitcher Mark Ewell. Wisconsin Outfielders Steve Bennett and Lee Bauman and Catcher Duane Gustavson were named to the first team.

Other players named to the 11-man team were Second Baseman Joe Palamara of Michigan State, Shortstop Joe Kordosky of Minnesota, Outfielder Dave Wilson of Indiana, and Designated Hitter John Littlejohn of Ohio State.

Boston Gets Young Ace

BOSTON (UPI) — The Boston Red Sox signed right-handed pitcher Walter Bigos, the team's first pick in last January's free agent draft.

Bigos, a native of Fall River, Mass., who lives in Pico Rivera, Calif., recorded an 8-2 record this spring for Cerritos Junior College. He had 80 strikeouts in 101 innings and a 2.20 earned run average.

The 18-year-old pitcher will report to Elmira of the New York-Penn League.

Malabar Star Batting Leader

Malabar's Matt Boyle is the 1975 Mansfield schoolboy batting champion, and the senior outfielder barely missed winning the "Triple Crown."

Boyle accumulated a .461 batting average, stroking 38 hits in 79 at bat. He led the area with 25 runs batted in and missed the solo "triple" by deadlocking with Mansfield Senior's Rich Conard in home runs with four.

Boyle also had a leading 21 runs scored and his 38 hits beat Mansfield Senior's Mark Fisher by two safeties.

St. Peter's Greg Keller, in 44 times at bat, had a .432 average, and Fisher had three hits in Mansfield Senior's final game to raise his average to .404.

Rounding out the Top 10 were: Mike Johnson (.356) of Mansfield Senior; Larry Duke (.350) of Malabar; Bret Clark (.338) of Madison; Rich Conard (.329) of Mansfield Senior; Brian Foote (.325) of Madison; Bill Donaldson (.315) of Malabar and Mike Ashley (.289) of St. Peter's.

Madison's Mike Woogerd and Malabar's Steve Magas were the top winning pitchers with six and five respectively while Ken Nikolaus of Madison had the best earned run average of 1.40. Senior's Johnson was at 1.71.

Woogerd was the strikeout artist with 79 whiffs in 75.2 innings while Malabar's Marv Miller had 75 strikeouts in 58 innings.
