FORT LAUDERDALE. Fla. (AP) - Sparky Lyle's left arm passed its first spring training test Friday, but Thurman Munson's right index finger may be causing a problem in the New York Yankees' training camp.

Munson missed his second straight game as the Cincinnati Reds edged the Yankees 5-4 and the All-Star catcher left the park with his finger in a splint, prompting speculation that he has a broken di-

However, a club spokesman said Munson merely jammed the finger in a popup drill and would be out 'two or three days," but would accompany the team Saturday on a five-day exhibition road trip.

Munson's injury points up the need for a No. 3 catcher. The Yankees have been trying to land a third backstop to join Munson and Rick Dempsey ever since they sold Ed Herrmann to California last

Meanwhile, the Yanks blew a 4-3 lead in the ninth inning when the world champion Reds scored twice against Dave Pagan on three singles and a throwing error by Third Baseman Graig Nettles, who had driven in two of the New York runs.

Lyle worked one perfect inning, striking out one batter. The relief ace, coming off a subpar year, will pitch an inning every other day until the season opens, the Yanks said.
