Q. Who is the general manager of the Los Angeles Lakers? D.W., Mansfield A. Pete Newell is the general manager of the Los Angeles Lakers in the National Basketball Assn.

He had a .657 winning percentage in 14 years of college coaching at the University of San Francisco, Michigan State and the University of California. At Cal, he led the team to an NCAA championship in 1959, beating West Virginia. West Virginia had Jerry West as its big star. West later played with the Lakers. West Virginia's coach was Fred Schaus, who Newell later replaced as GM at Los An-

Newell also coached the 1960 U.S. Olympic team to a gold niedal. He became general manager of the San Diego Rockets in 1968 and went to Los Angeles

B.W., Shelby A. Tom Heinsohn, the current coach of the Boston Celtics in the National Basketball Assn., led the Celts in scoring three consecutive years beginning in the 1959-60 season. He averaged 21.7, 21.3 and 22.1 points per game in those three

In the 1962-63 and 1963-64 seasons, he led Boston in free throw shooting with .835 and .827 percentages and he also led the team in most personal fouls five different years.

Phoenix Seeks Better **Shooting Accuracy**

PHOENIX (UPI) - The Phoenix Suns with at least their backs to the wall if not one foot in the grave, were expressing cautious optimism Saturday that they are still contenders for the National Basketball Assn. championship but the emphasis was on caution.

"I really don't think we're out of it." said Suns Forward Curtis Perry as the Suns geared for the third game, and their first home appearence of the series, against the Boston Celtics Sunday afternoon.

"We'll have to play our best game of the season every game we play. We have to stop making mistakes.

So far, the Suns have made enough to last a season after their unlikely appearance in the championship series. The Suns, as one fan said, remain a team that is committed-or if not, perhaps

But Perry discounts such comment.

"They're always talking about how they can blow us out, how we can't play with them. 'he said. "Well, if we'd been shooting like we were all year, we'd be two games up on them."

But the Suns have not been shooting like that In fact there were times in the second game at Boston when they probabiy shouldn't have been shooting at all, as they agree.

Boston comes into the third game with a 2-0 lead and a penchant for forcing the Suns into hurried shots they would rather have missed—and have. The Suns shot 48 per cent during the first 13 games of their journey into the playoffs, but only 39 per cent in the first two games against Boston.

The Suns have to get their thing going-and Boston Coach Tommy Heinsohn said they might do it.

Their backs may be to the wall, but they ll be in front of that crowd," said the Boston coach "Our thing's the banners and flags flying," referring to the 12 championship pennants flying in the Boston Garden's rafters. The Suns have

never been in a championship series in their eight NBA seasons.

Phoenix Guard Paul Westhphal, a former Celtic, talked of the third period in the second game, when the Celtics both destroyed and demoralized the Suns. "I knew they were capable of it," he said, but we're capable of it too, which I hope we can show before this series is

What the Celtics were capable of was 98-87 thumping of the Suns in the first game and a 105-90 whipping in a second game that was not as close as the score

Because of the demands of national television, the third game tips off at 10.30 am Phoenix time at the Coliseum, which pains many of the local clergy Some have readjusted their Sunday hours to allow the worshippers to see the game.
