

Garland Under Pressure

CLEVELAND - How'd you like to be in Wayne Garland's shoes?

Here it is, the eve of your pitching debut with the Cleveland Indians and it's the 1977 home opener for the Tribe.

Municipal Stadium will be jammed with over 60,000 baseball fans, some of them to see the '77 Indians battle the Boston Red Sox and old Cleveland favorite, Sox righthander Luis Tiant.

But mostly, they'll be passing judgment on your right arm, and arm that accounted for the best winning percentage (20-7, .741) among all American League starters in 1976.

Only you did it with the Baltimore Orioles, for whom you toiled at a mere pit-tance compared to what the Indians shelled out on the open market to land vou via the historic free agent re-entry draft last Nov. 19.

At that time you signed a 10-year contract worth an estimated \$2.3 million to pitch for the Indians. Not any pitcher in Cleveland history received that kind of money, not Bob Feller, not Early Wynn, not Gaylord Perry, not even Tiant who won 20 games or more four times.

It kept him on the shelf for the better part of two weeks when all he could do was run and throw easily against the outfield wall at Hi Corbett Field in Tuc-

So his fraining period was set back and everyone from manager Frank Robin-But until last season, you were a relief son to general manager Phil Seghi pitcher who started only seven major fretted but tried not to fuss.

Arm Feels Strong

"My arm feels great now," declared Garland, who has thrown hundreds of batting practice pitches in the past two weeks. "There's no problem there. The soreness is gone and the arm feels strong. I just need to pitch."

Robinson believes Garland's trouble was the result of his "not pitching winter ball for the first time in a long time and not knowing how to pace himself more slowly in spring training."

When the Indians won their first two games in Boston, Garland saw what can happen to one of "those millionaire free agents" when they fail to live up to what's expected of them.

Boston relief pitcher Bill Campbell, who won 17 and saved 20 games with the Minnesota Twins in 1976, became the first free agent to sign with a new team in 1977, in this case the Red Sox, who desperately needed a bullpen stopper and paid \$1 million for five yeart to get

Cleveland fans may recall Campbell not only failed miserably in his first two appearances for Boston, but was shelled

by the Tribe in each game. Fenway Park fans and Boston sportswriters scorched him unmercifully.

"I just hope what happened to Campbell doesn't happen to me," Garland managed a sick smile and rapped his knuckles on the wooden table top.

"What they did to him was brutal," he added. "The fans were very unfair to him, but the Boston writers can take the blame for a lot of that. The people were
