LOUISVILLE (UPI) - Seattle Slew nearly lost the Kentucky Derby Saturday before he even ran in it.

Authority for that startling piece of information was Jean Cruguet, the implacable French-born jockey who rode him to a 1%-length victory after he not only acted up going into the starting gate but also turned fractious once he was

All 14 horses in the race had to remain in the starting gate longer than usual and that bothered Seattle Slew far more than it seemed to most of the others.

"When he stay too long, he got too anxious," Cruguet explained in his Gallic broken English. "He give me some

That was only the beginning of Cruguet's problems however. Karen and Mickey Taylor's magnificent, sleek three-year-old got off poorly, failing to break smartly and almost being enveloped by the other starters. That worried

"I asked him to go between horses and he got angry with me," said the Frenchman. "I dunno who the other horses were but it was very close. If he was a slow horse, I'd have been in big trouble. But he has speed enough.'

But as they passed the 5-16 mark in the mile and one quarter race, Seattle Slew started to pick it up and For The Moment began slowing down, ultimately finishing eighth.

"My horse was going well at the start," said Cordero, coming into the jockey's quarters and asking for a towel to dry himself off.

"Whad'ya want a crying towel?" his valet kidded him.

"Yeah, I'm going to cry all the way to the bank.

There is a television set in another section of the jockey's quarters and when Cordero noticed that a rerun of the Derby was about to be shown, he bolted for a seat right in front of the screen. He watched his horse take the lead and then his expression became glum as Seattle Slew began to overtake his horse.

"That's where I took a look and said 'Oh, look who's coming to dinner!."

On the tube, Seattle Slew was now passing For The Moment and Cordero

"When he said goodbye to me, he killed my ego," muttered Cordero.

COLUMBUS - The results are in and except for two serious injuries Woody Hayes, Ohio State's hard-to-please football coach, is satisfied.

"The first thing we tried like the devil to do we didn't get done," Hayes told reporters following Saturday's annual spring intra-squad game. "And that's avoid injuries. Up until today we had only one serious injury."

George Hill, defensive coordinator at OSU since he joined the Buckeye staff in 1971, was injured in a freak accident when knocked down while standing on the sidelines on the first play from scrimmage. He suffered a dislocated left knee and was to undergo surgery

"I didn't see it happen," Hayes said. "The darn thing (knee) was out of place about three inches, so there has to be a lot of ligament damage. It'll be in a cast for about six weeks.'

Hill was to be inducted into the Denison University Hall of Fame Saturday night.

Even more damaging than Hill's injury was the injury suffered by Galion's Chip Durtschi. The junior defensive back suffered a compound fracture of

the lower left leg in the fourth quarter. Durtschi was rushed to Riverside Hospital and was to undergo surgery today.

On the plus side, Hayes said, "Except for the three times we didn't score in the first half, we moved the ball. I'd like to score every time we get the ball, but there are some pretty good football players on the second team."

The 5-10, 184-pound Logan, the Buckeyes' leading rusher last year with 1,248 yards, carried 20 times Saturday for 93 yards and a touchdown.

Jim Harrell started at wingback, Harrell, who decided to take an extra year of eligibility this season, caught three passes for 46 yards and a touchdown. Freshman Paul Campbell also alternated at fullback and gained 23 yards in six carries.

Rod Gerald quarterbacked the Red squad for the better part of four quarters. The 6-1, 175-pound sophomore from Dallas, who missed five games last season with a back injury, scrambled for 88 yards in 17 carries and completed seven of 11 passes for an additional 99 yards and a touchdown:
