
#### Foreword



#### Literary Societies

This year has seen a marked revival of interest in Literary work in the High School. At the beginning of the second semester two societies were organized to provide greater co-operation among the students and faculty, and to promote a spirit of rivalry.

Under the inspiration and leadership of Mr. Davis, who was formerly the Leader of the Ohio Wesleyan University Glee Club, a chorus of twenty voices was organized after the Christmas Holidays.

The first public appearance of the Glee Club was on April 1st, when it sang for the Richland County Teachers Association at Mansfield.

It was the Glee Club which was largely responsible for the success of the show given at the Chamber of Commerce on the night of April 1st. Besides the numbers given by the entire Club, several specialties and songs given in costume afforded a program which was exceedingly novel and enteartaining. Athletics

At the beginning of the season Coach Perman had four letter men as a nucleus for his team. After breaking even in the first four games, Mr. T. S. Davis who had recently become a member of the faculty, assumed charge of athletics. The season was finished under his leadership.

During the latter part of the season the team was greatly handicapped by the illness of Captain Frome, and Shields, while Blosser received a twisted knee in

the Willard game which disabled him for the rest of the season.

On the 24th of February, the Red and White participated in the Ohio State Basketball Tournament held under the auspices of the Ohio Wesleyan University at Delaware, Ohio. Although Plymouth went into the game as the favorite, Mt. Gilead would not be denied and won by a safe margin.

A careful study of the season's record reveals the havoc wrought by illness and injuries. This season marks the last appearance of Captain Frome, and shields, as wearers of the Red and White. They will be missed. However, with the return of Blosser, Hoak, Hough, Ruckman, Aslakson, Captain-elect Shepherd and the acquisition of Becker and Lofland to the squad, the prospects for a successful season next year seem very good.

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


