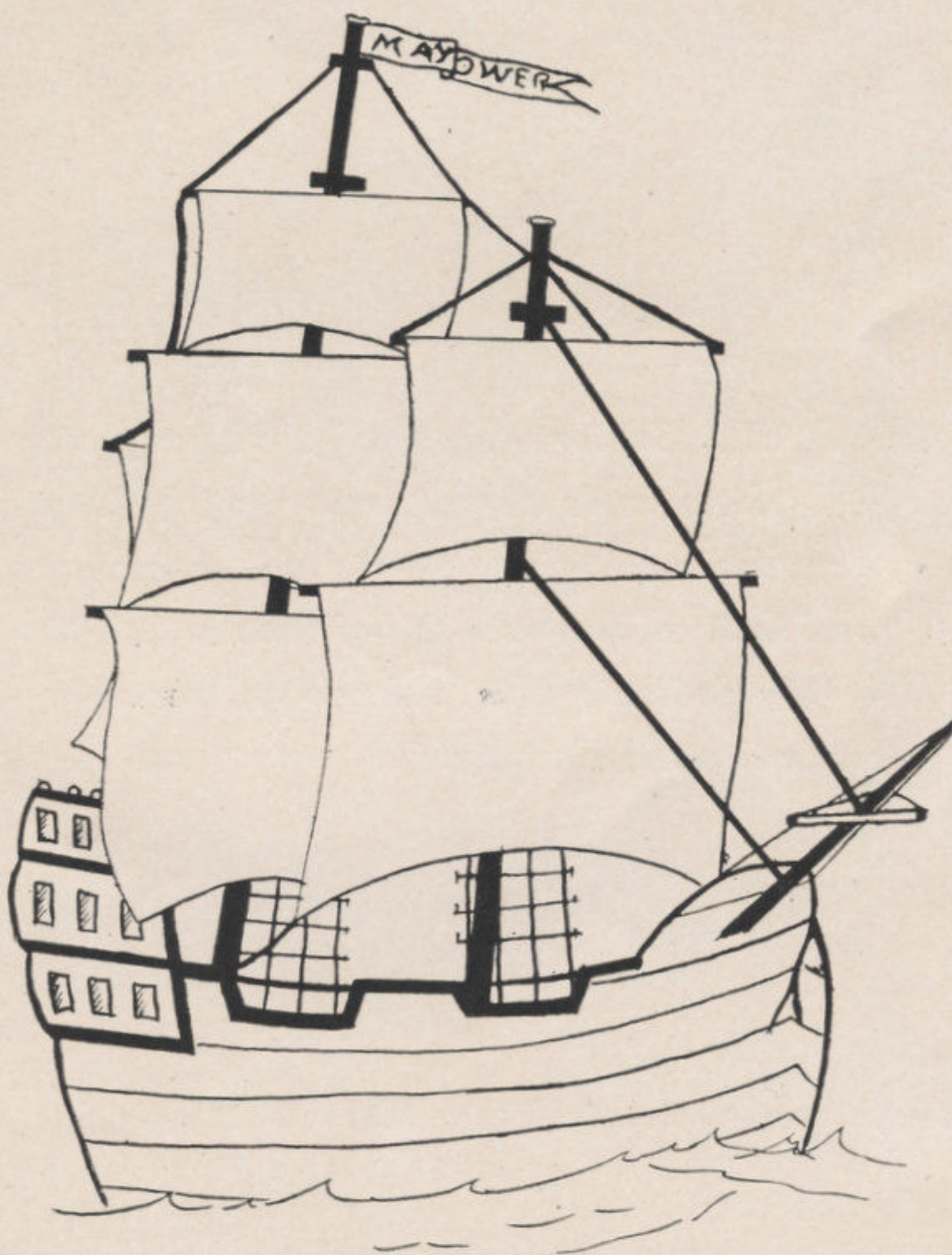

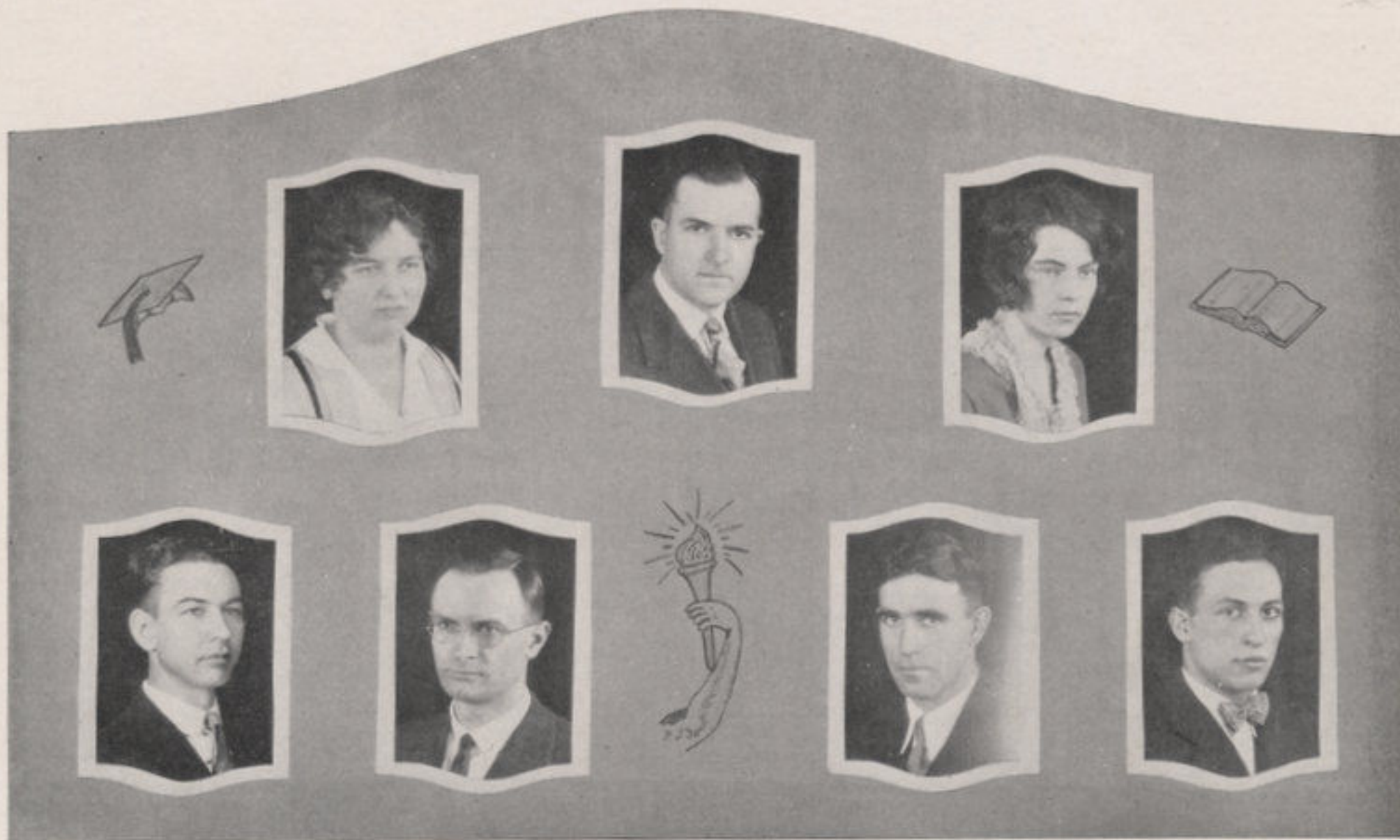

Our New Six Year High School

SINCE the old school building has but six full-sized rooms fit for school purposes, it will be used for grades one to six, and the new building will house grades seven to twelve. In school systems of the size of ours, the so-called six-six plan of organization has been found to be very successful. Since this plan will lend itself so well to our situation, Superintendent Miller recommended the organization of a six-year high school. The State Department of Education not only approved of the plan, but declared that it was the very best plan for Plymouth. The local board of education authorized Mr. Miller to go ahead with this plan, and in anticipation of it, the eighth grade has had their studies included in the High School this year. Mr. Derr, the former eighth grade teacher, completed his required schooling last summer and became the instructor of our newly organized commercial department. Miss Fenner, who taught the seventh grade during the past year, will attend school this summer in order to complete her requirements for a position in the new six year High School.

There will not be many changes in the subjects taught in the seventh and eighth grades; the chief difference will be in the fact that the studies will be departmentalized, i. e. each subject will be taught by an instructor who has made a specialty of that branch.

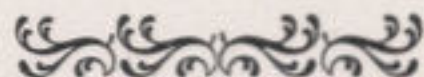
The most important change in subjects taught will be the addition, in the eighth grade, of manual training and of home economics. This plan has a two-fold purpose. First, these studies are to reserve as "finding courses," i.e., along with a course in vocational guidance, they are to help the pupils to find out what they are best fitted to do as a life work. Secondly, they are to be of practical value. For those pupils who do not wish to take up vocational work, but wish to go on with a classical course, this training in handicraft will be valuable, if for no other reason, to make better homemakers. They will have some training in keeping house and doing odd jobs about the home. For those who wish to go on with vocational work, these courses will serve as introductions. In anticipation of these additions to the eighth grade curriculum, our present seventh grade has completed the geography and history which were formerly carried over into the first semester of the eighth grade.

The upper four years of the new Six-Year High School will remain much the same as our present Four Year High School. The Freshmen Home Economics will be a more specialized advanced course for those who will have had an introductory course in their eighth grade. Likewise, the shop work which we hope to offer as that department grows, will, above the eighth grade, consist of specialized elective courses for those who desire that kind of work.

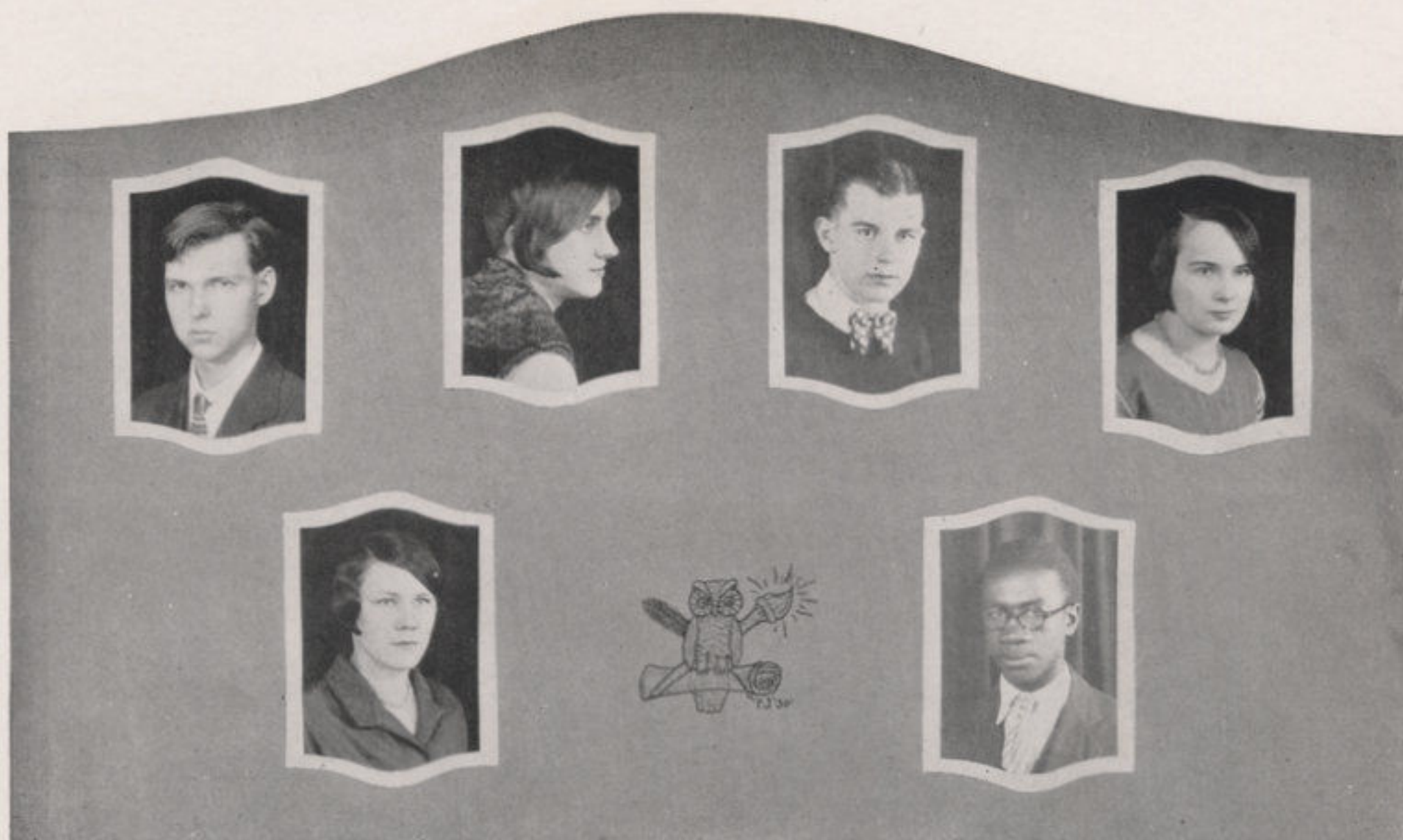

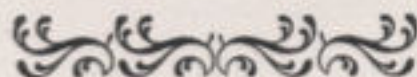

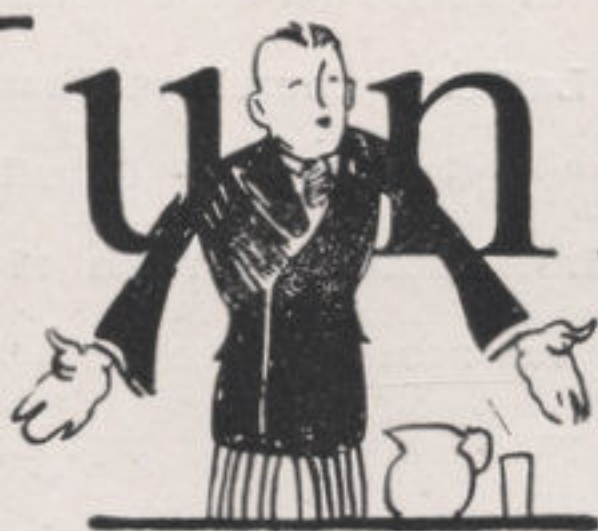


COMMENCEMENT

We sailed on through the strait where several were stricken leaving a crew of but sixteen. Walter Grimmer, Robert Baltzell, and James Shepherd joined us as we sailed into the "Sea of Ten." There were other casualties, but the ship struggled on with a crew of but twelve, until Vance Snyder came to share our hardships. So far, the ship has weathered many storms, but we expect it to withstand all the rest and in another year to drop anchor safe in port.

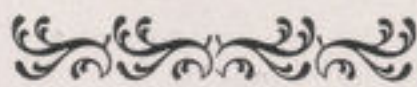
Our Eighth grade graduation play was "Treasure Farm." Twenty-nine pupils graduated from the grade school.

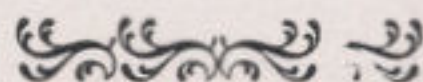

Physical Education

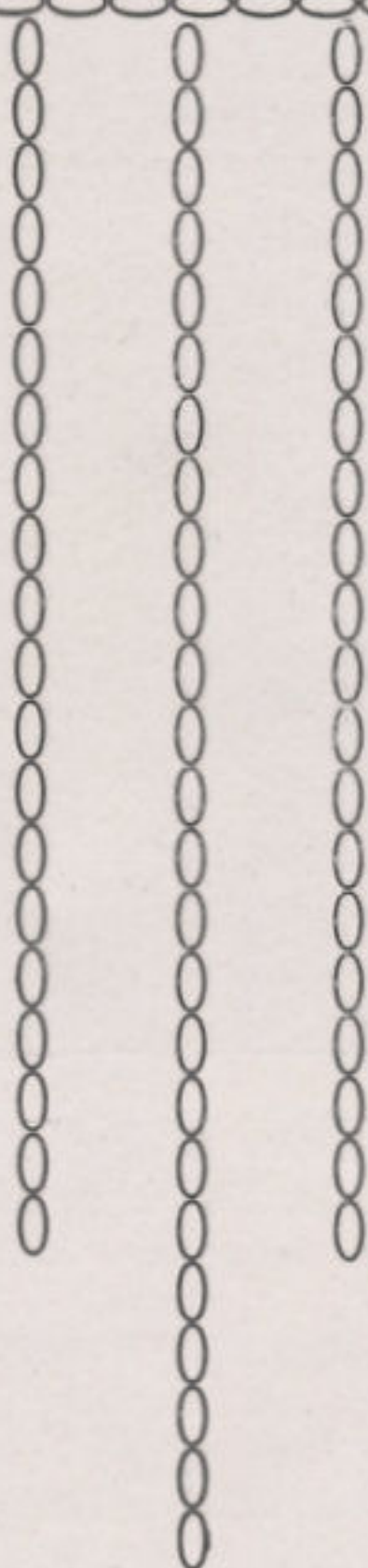
Sec. 7721-School Law of Ohio. "Physical Education in the Schools. All pupils in the elementary and secondary schools of the state shall receive as part of their instruction such physical education as may be prescribed or approved by the Director of Education, and the physical education provided shall occupy not less than 100 minutes per school week. Modified courses of instruction may be provided or approved by the Director of Education for pupils unable to take the course provided for normal children. Credits and penalties shall be applied for success or failure in physical education courses as in other school subjects."

The past has seen Plymouth Schools cramped considerably in carrying out the provisions noted above. Various games, such as basketball, kittenball, track and games for the smaller children have been used as extensively as possible by the administration when weather conditions permitted. But whenever inclement weather drove the children indoors the activity must need stop because of lack of place to carry on. Under these conditions the responsible authorities were very lenient with the school.

With the building of the new school full advantage will be taken of the gymnasium to meet the requirements of the state. In addition to the games that the public is usually invited to attend, there will be regular classes in formal physical instruction. Special classes will be formed for boxing, wrestling, tumbling and other forms of activity which will build the body and increase physical fitness. For girls as well as boys instruction will be along formal lines. Folk dances, drills and other forms will be used. Games will still be used but the play will be supervised and in some cases directed by the instructor.

Basketball Summary

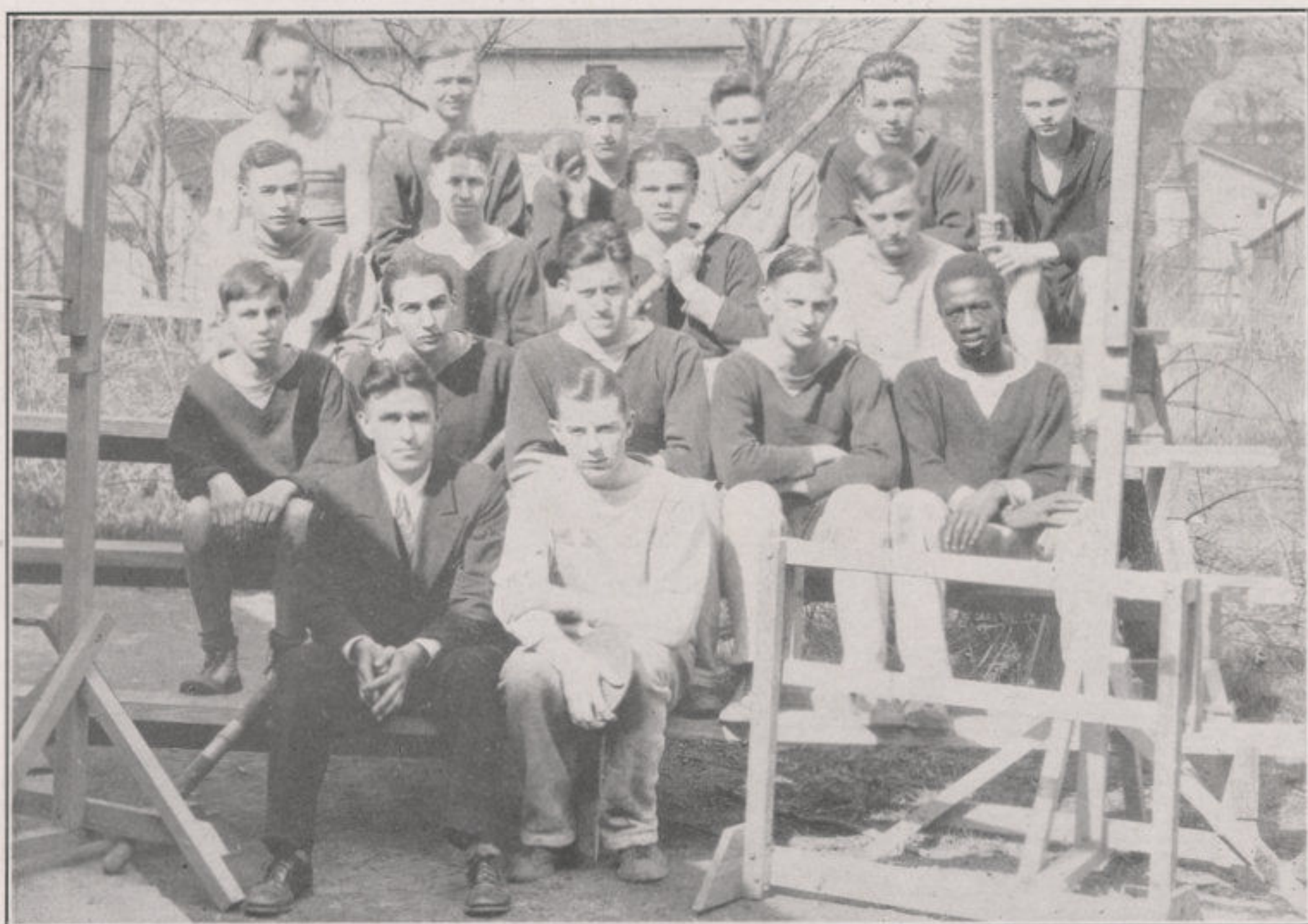
A final review of 1928-29 basketball season shows that the Red and White Basketball team won thirteen games and lost eight, in these twenty-one games the boys scored 585 against 467 for the opponents. Of our points three seniors of this squad scored four hundred and forty-six points, Captain Barber scoring 113 points, Lebold 120 points and Hatch 213 points. These three stars are lost this year and this a real loss to next year's team. But there will be six lettermen back to serve as a nucleus for next year.

The first game of the season, was easily won by a score of 51-16. The next, a game with Weller, was lost 41-14. The next four games were won, Plymouth defeating Greenwich 28-24, Willard 33-6, Shiloh 19-18 and Adario 28-19. The next, a return game with Willard, was lost 21-7. A journey to Bucyrus netted a victory over the Bucyrus Reserve 47-20. The next was lost to the Alumni 20-19. The next two were won by defeating Ontario 52-13 and New Washington 32-14. The last three games of the season were won, the Mansfield Reserves being beaten 32-27, Ontario 52-31 and Perrysville 32-20.

In the County Tournament at Mansfield our first opponent, Ontario, was defeated 14-11. Going to the semi-finals our boys were defeated by Madison 21-16.

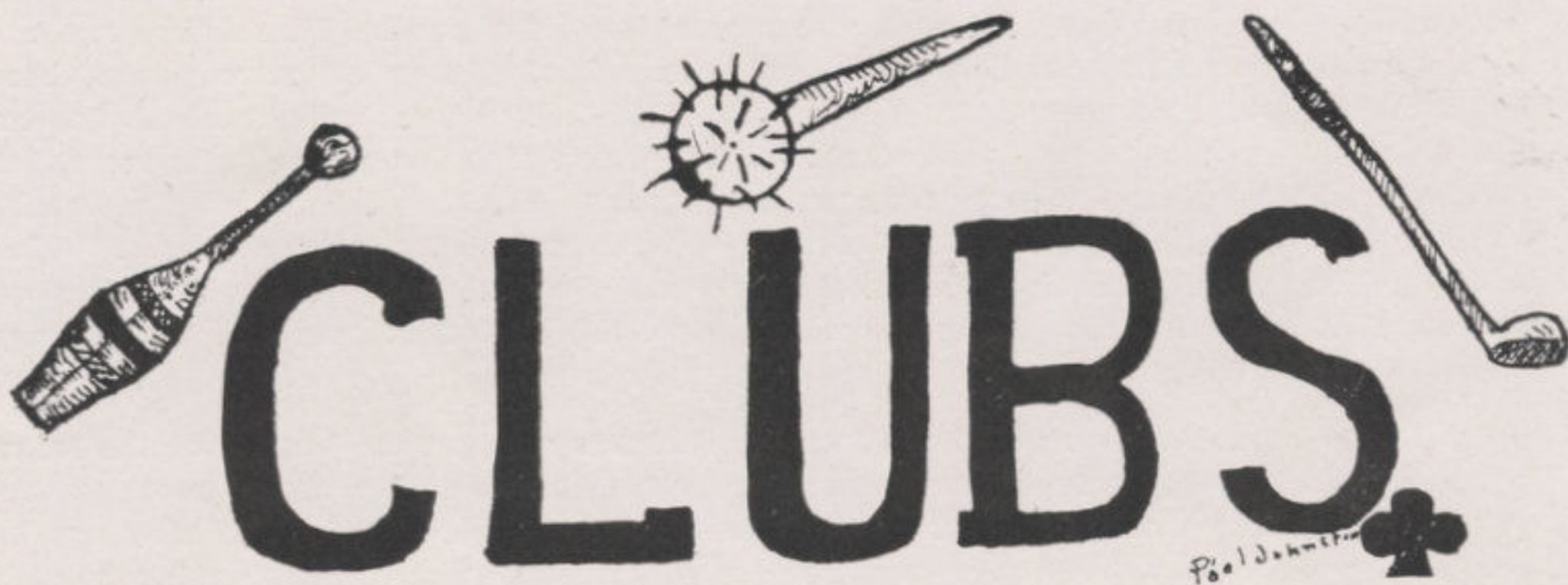
Next year a good track and plenty of good equipment will be provided.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Training in the proper use of leisure time is recognized as one of the worthwhile aims of education. Another aim is training in leadership. Yet another is the discovery and development of any latent interest or ability of a pupil. These aims are not always realized thru the regular curriculum of a school. In an effort to attain these aims, the present administration of Plymouth High School has brought about the organization of a number of extra-curricular clubs. Each club has a faculty sponsor, but the intention is to give a large measure of responsibility for their operation to the students. To bring about a better correlation, the extra-curricular activities which have been connected with the school have been made a part of the new plan. For example, in the list of clubs on the preceding page, the athletic teams and the literary societies are listed as clubs.

In order to make it certain that all of the students will get the benefit of the training which these clubs afford, a minimum of four extra-curricular credit points is required each year. Credits earned in this manner are not scholastic and may not be used as a part of the sixteen units required for graduation. Active membership in each club gives one extra-curricular credit point each year. In addition to club membership, there are certain other extra-curricular activities for which extra-curricular credit points are granted. Among these are student librarian, representative of the school in the Prince of Peace Declamation Contest or in any other oratorical contest, and any other activity which may be deemed worthy of such recognition.

THE LIBRARY

Due to the untiring efforts of the two student librarians, Doris Fenner and Harriett Cornell, our library has served efficiently in spite of cramped quarters. Each of the grade rooms has been made a sub-library, so it is now possible to know where each book is at all times. A system of reference books has been worked out to make these books more readily available.

In the new building, the library will be located in the study hall. This will make it possible for students to have access to the library during any of their study periods. The Senior head student librarian and the Junior assistant will continue to have general supervision over the library, but they will be aided by a staff of assistants, one of whom will serve each period under the supervision of the study hall teacher.

Some Economics stimulates interest in the problems of the Home, and gives greater desire for the solution of them; thus contributing to health, ease of home making, and the development of responsibility. The Home Economics Course in our school has been created in accordance with rules and suggestions offered by the State. The course includes two year's of work under the Smith-Hughes plan. Both the first and second year classes study about foods and textiles, and all phases of home making.

The main project carried on during this course is the Lunch Room work. The second year girls plan and manage the lunch room. One girl has the lunch to plan for the week while the first year girls cook the meals.

Home Project is carried on in both years, which lasts six months. Sewing, cooking and management of the home comes under this project. It is carried out in the form of a club.

The work this year is under the direction of Mrs. Harssema. The school board furnished us with aid in our work during the past year.
