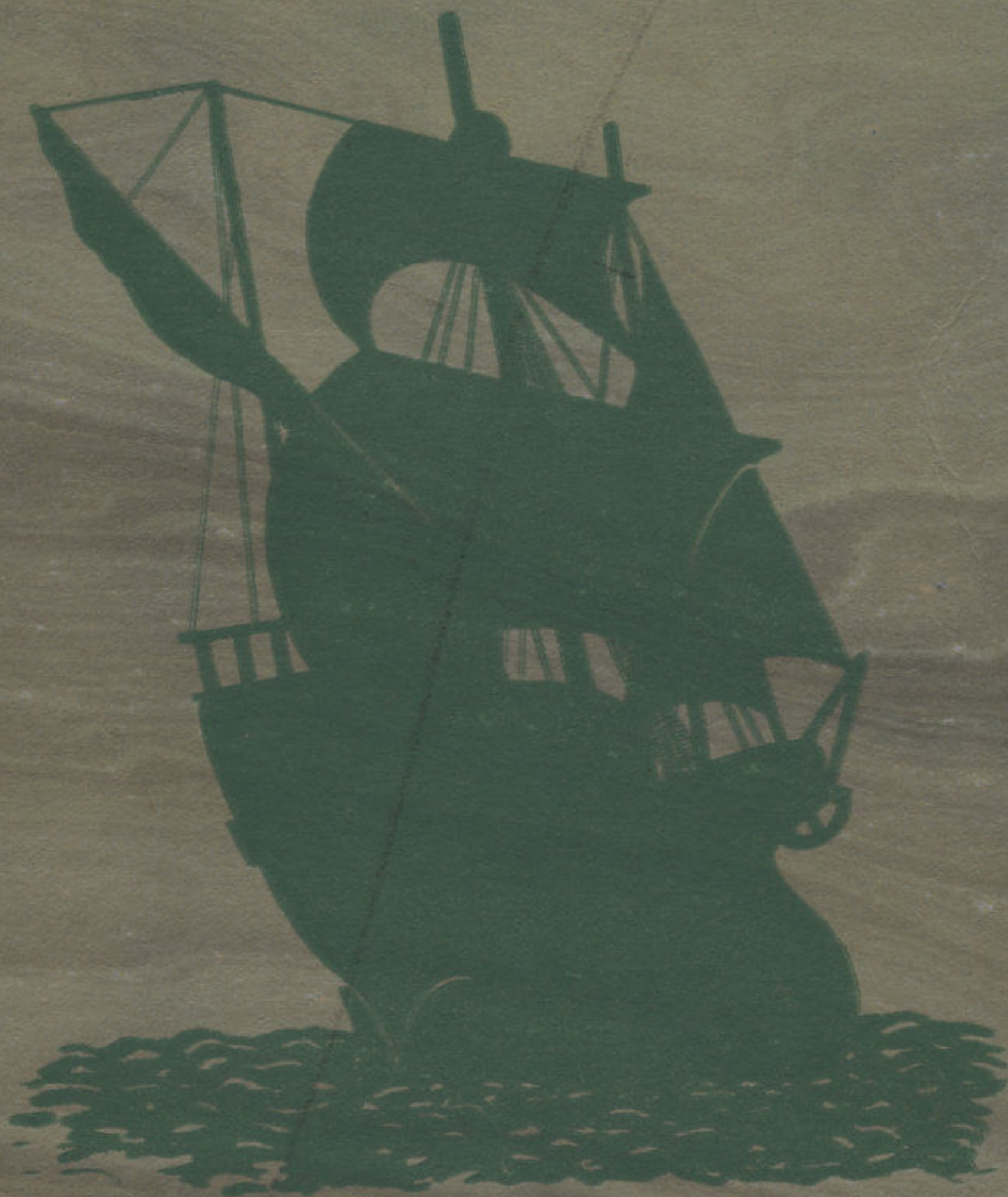

SYNOPSIS

Eventually, however, Stubby learns that the Count is a fraud and is really a notorious international crook, and also that he is the real husband of Luna. THE Mayflower puts into port the sixtieth time with a passenger list of twenty-four, the largest number to get off at once.

Looking back through earlier pages of the "Log" we find that we have eight passengers who have been on the ship during the whole cruise (James Coe, John Dick, Iden Jackson, William Moore, Wilson Weaver, Walter Mumea and Madeliene Smith.) Other passengers have joined us and left us along the cruise. At the end of the eighth lap twenty-nine came off for a three month stop-over. When the cruise was resumed only twenty-five reported. During the last four laps several changes have been made and at the end we found that we had the record number to complete the journey.

The Class of "32" has had rather successful athletic achievements. When in the fourth year Miss Fish organized and coached a basketball team. In the eighth grade they represented Plymouth in the Huron County Junior Tournament at Norwalk but were defeated by Norwalk in the finals after a hard battle. While in the eighth grade they were allowed to participate in the local Inter-Class Tourney and to the surprise of all (except possibly the team) they went undefeated until the finals when the Seniors stopped them. THE Pilgrims initiated the season by defeating the 1932 Huron County Champions, Greenwich, which was a nice beginning.

The Pilgrims bettered last years record by winning all scheduled county games. They did not fare so well with out-of-the county games but finished in the better half by winning four of the seven games. Sulphur Springs, who stopped the Pilgrims in the sectional meet last year, was among the victims. Two of the games we lost were on foreign floors.

Winning their games by a safe margin the Pilgrims sailed along smoothly until the county tournament. They drew the toughest teams for the preliminaries. 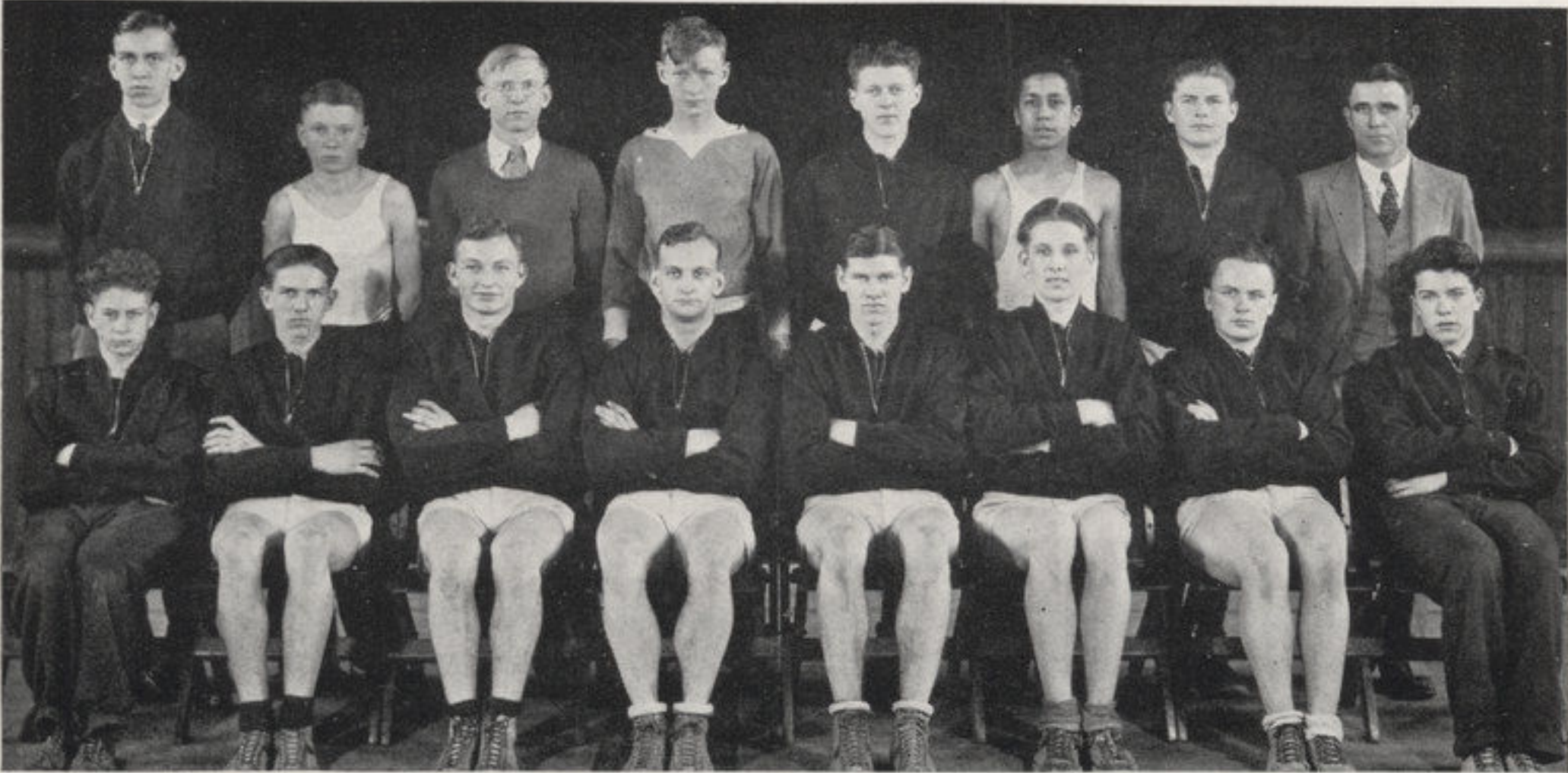

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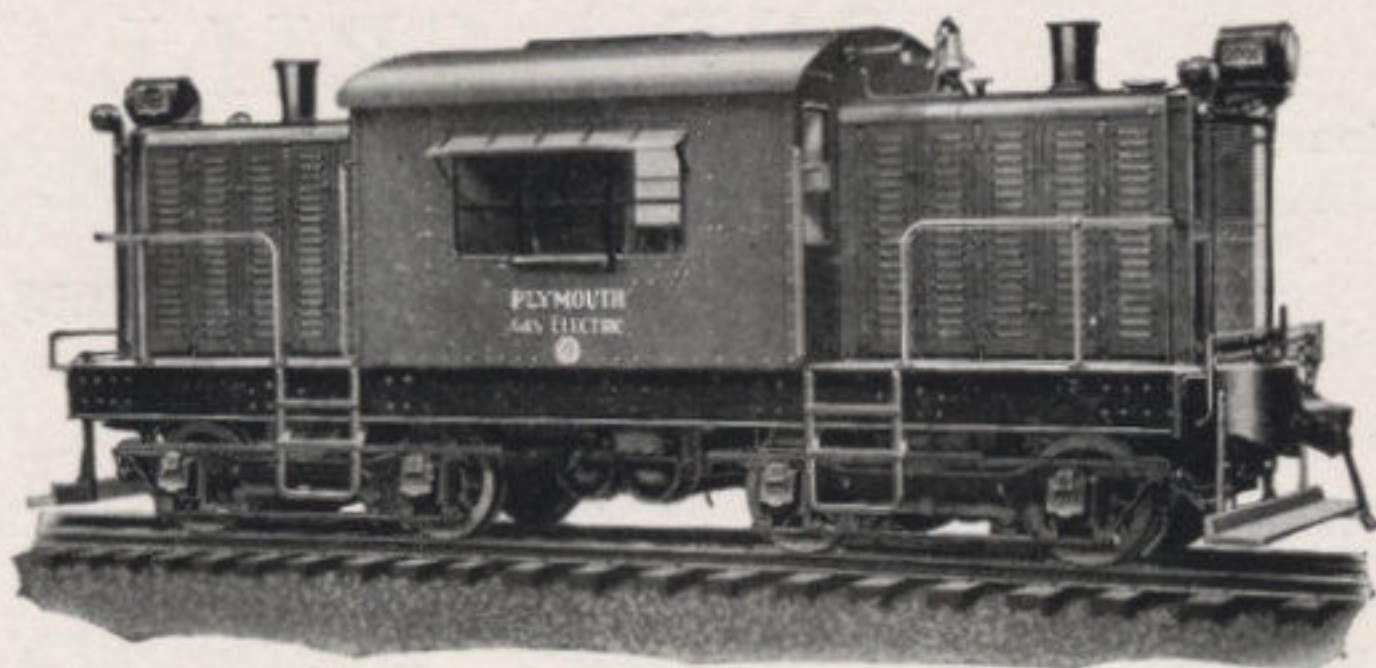
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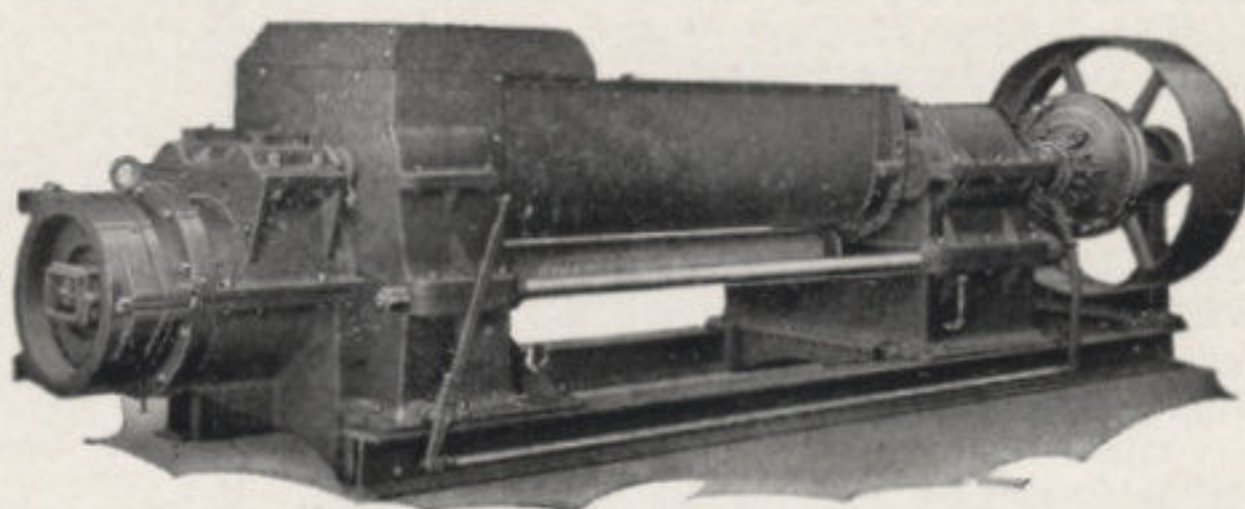
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
