OPERETTA

"Riding Down the Sky," which was most efficiently played to a large audience, November 24, proved to be one of the most colorful and enjoyable operettas ever presented in Plymouth High School.

The plot was laid in one of the Spanish republics of Central America and concerned the trials of a president and his fair daughter, who were troubled by revolutionists. The country has been unable to pay the soldiers for a long time and they are in the mood to revolt. Suddenly some Americans appear on the scene, having made a forced landing because of trouble with their plane. The president's daughter falls in love with the airplane pilot, and refuses to marry the aged but extremely wealthy suitor that her father desires. All ends happily, for the revolutionists are thwarted in the end. Their attempt to bomb the water works leads to the discovery of oil, and the country is once more financially able to pay her soldiers.

Several seniors played important roles in the production. Greeta Keeler, as the leading lady, gave an outstanding performance. Charles Hockenbury took the part of the hero, and sang the tenor lead in fine style. Don Fox as the president showed his ability to act the part of an old man. Paul Fenner and Isabelle BeVier enacted the roles of an elderly senor and senora. Their musical effort in the "Charms of Middle Age" was perhaps the high spot of the performance. Clyde Lasch played the comic lead, and with his red tie, socks and ankle high trousers, his antics were good for many laughs. Cleta Lasch was the "revolutionary" spouse of the leader of the revolution. George France was the president's body guard. Lucille Echelbarger was charming as a gay Spanish Senor-Many other seniors augmented the chorus and added greatly to the fine musical work.

The musical end of the production was capably handled by Mr. Basil Alt. The costumes were in charge of Miss Alta Bancroft of the Home Economics Department. The manual training boys under Mr. John Maxwell's direction, designed the Spanish setting. Mr. Sherman Moist was in charge of the direction of the speaking parts.







Plymouth got off on a discouraging start, though they exhibited worthy team work against their larger opponents. In the first two games they found themselves on the short end of the score, with a 54 to 26 defeat by Bucyrus and a 37 to 21 upset staged by Shelby. But in the first league game, the varsity showed new ability and drubbed a highly touted New Haven five 25 to 14. New Washington took the Pilgrims into camp in the next contest by a 32 to 20 count, and again in non-league circles, Plymouth found tough sledding and lost to Attica in one of the most thrilling games of the season 39 to 30.

Back in league competition the Pilgrims found clear sailing and "sunk" their rivals almost at will. The outstanding game from the spectators' standpoint was the first Greenwich game played on the opponent's court. After leading 17 to 4 at the half, Plymouth faltered and had to stave off a last minute rally and squeezed out a 24 to 23 win. Another thrilling game was the final league contest with Shiloh. Before a crowd that fairly bulged out the Shiloh gym, the Pilgrims downed their rivals, who desired to spoil their perfect record, by a 34 to 28 score.

In tournament competition the varsity did not fair so well, losing the first contest to Shiloh 41 to 35 and another in the consolation tourney to Butler 25 to 21.

The Plymouth Reserves compiled a remarkable season's record, piling up nine wins against two defeats. They won the league trophy with but a single defeat chalked up against them. The players showed promising ability and keen sportsmanship, and promise to add much to next year's varsity.

In March, a banquet and dance were held to honor the teams. Superintendent Joseph of Shiloh presented the trophies on behalf of the league. This enjoyable social function climaxed the basketball season.

Special mention should be made of the Seniors who will be lost through graduation. Clyde Lasch, acting as captain, played stellar ball all season and was high scorer in league circles. Don Fox played consistent ball throughout the season. At guard, Charles Payne performed brilliantly. Wayne Gebert showed a steady game at the center position, and Paul Fenner added plenty of pep whenever he entered the game. Bob Nimmons was outstanding at his post as guard. Dick Coe and Le-Roy Briggs, the bulwark of the reserve attacks, will be greatly missed.

To Coach Maxwell goes unstinting credit for a successful season. In his first year of coaching, he displayed qualities which produce teams that show both aptness in the game and at the same time, and of greater importance, thorough sportsmanship.


